

Thirty-Two Records Shattered In KBAA's Giant Track Meet Saturday

The Klamath Basin Athletic Association played host to about 200 track aspirants Saturday in a big All-Corners meet which will help the KBAA officials decide the athletes to be taken to the Emerald Empire Games in Eugene Aug. 9-10. Several records were broken and several new ones established in the meet held in the morning at Modoc Field. All broad jump winners were given records because the broad jump hasn't been run off this season. Thirty-two records were broken in a good display. The older boys' group found Bonanza's Monte Burnett copping the 220-yard dash in 23.5. Daryl Hale set a new record for the 13-14 age group with a 26 flat clocking. He just turned 13 recently and is a fine prospect. He also won the 440-yard dash in a mediocre 64.9. He has much better times but wasn't pushed in this race as the second place ran a 73.4. The girls did poorly in the broad jump, but it was the first time any of them had attempted the event. Donette Zimmerman set a new record in the girls' high jump in 8 and under bracket at 2-6. Chris Brosterhouse won again in the 13 and over group which is only four seconds behind the Eugene record. They also won the 440 dash in their groups. Miss Brosterhouse set an even better clocking than on the first time she ran it. She ran Saturday in an amazing 77.4. It broke her old mark of 1:15.5 and it is far ahead of the 62.2 for the Eugene record. Barbara Ward ran a fine 80.7 in the 13 and over group which is only four seconds behind the Eugene mark. Janis Narramore clocked 12.1 in the 13-14 girls low hurdles to break her own mark of 12.2. Resa Narramore clocked a very good 33.5 in the 220-yard dash which is only one-tenth of a second behind the Eugene record. Dick Scott topped the 17 and over boys in the hop-step-jump with a very good 39-foot effort. That tops the Eugene mark by two inches. One other fine effort was a 13-6 pole vault by Chuck Hightower in the 17 and over group. It beat the old record by Bud Lummus of 12-0. Bill Mills hurled the shot 38-10 1/2 to win easily in that event. He won the discus easily also with a 136-3 effort which was a one throw affair for Mills who is one of the best in the state in that event. Don Piper was tops in the 17 and over broad jump at 19-4 and Scott was second at 17-11. Wayne Dennis of OTI won the high jump for seniors at 5-10 with Scott and Fred Kelley tied at 5-6. Don Graham topped the hurdles in 9.4 to win the 17 and over event. Burnett won the 100 in 10.3 with Bob Rice second at 10.3. The senior mile run was won by Tom Quirk. Hans McAllister won the 13-14 mile in 5:07. The complete results of the meet will run in Tuesday's edition of the Herald and News. Those chosen to go to Eugene will be announced in the sports section as soon as possible.

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Terrell Upsets Folley In Heavyweight Fight

NEW YORK (UPI) — Heavyweight contender Ernie Terrell, Chicago giant, speared veteran Zora Folley with long left jabs and shook him with rights Saturday night in their nationally televised fight at Madison Square Garden for a unanimous 10-round decision and his eighth straight victory. The bout was so one-sided that many of the 2,200 fans booed in the seventh round and at the finish. Terrell carrying 294 pounds on a six-foot-seven frame, threatened to put away 31-year-old Folley of Chandler, Ariz., in the second and fourth rounds when long left jabs and whistling rights to the head had the seventh-ranking contender staggering briefly. Folley, 203 1/2, looked like a small boy fighting a man in many of the sessions because of Ernie's towering height. Terrell, 24, not only landed by far the most punches but he also leaned over his six-foot-one opponent and strapped his long arms about Zora and tied him up tightly at close quarters. Terrell, ranked eighth among contenders, was hurt only once. That was in the eighth round when Folley landed his best punch of the night, a left hook near the end of the session and knocked big Ernie into a sideways lurch. Despite that punch, Terrell won the round on two of the three score sheets. There were no knockdowns but Folley suffered a cut at the corner of his right eye in the seventh round. They went into the ring at "even money" in the betting; but the ring officials favored Terrell on a rounds basis as follows: referee Zack Clayton, 7-2-1; judge Bill Recht, 7-1-2; Judge Art Adala, 7-3. The United Press had Ernie ahead 7-2-1. It was Folley's seventh defeat in 73 fights and Terrell's 31st victory in 35. 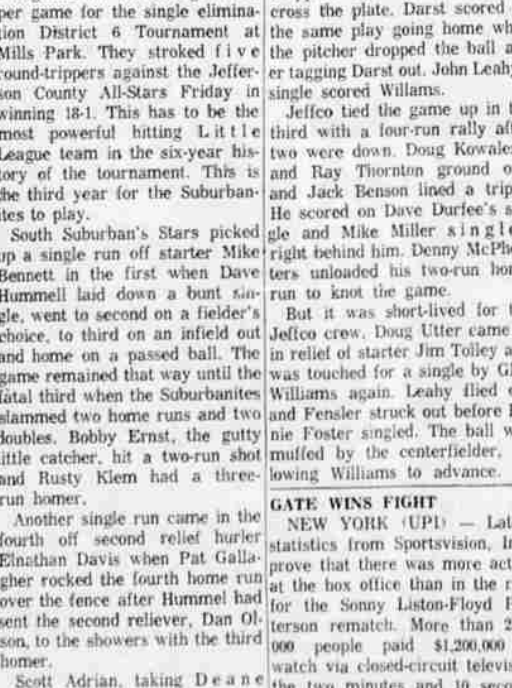


Cal-Ore Upset By West

Suburban Stars Use Homers To Gain State LL Tourney

By JERRY WAGGONER The South Suburban Little League All-Star team, using their bats like the mythical Paul Bunyan would have handled a giant fir tree, literally slugged their way into the state Little League Tournament Saturday afternoon by breaking the six-year hold by the City Stars. The Suburbanites lambasted the City Stars 13-4 by hitting seven home runs in the most awesome display of batting power ever seen by a Little League team in these parts. The Suburban team will be in Portland for the state tournament Wednesday. Their first game will be Thursday at 6:30 p.m. at Whitaker Field against the District 5 winner. The field is located at 5135 N.E. Columbia Blvd. The winners connected for a grand total of 12 home runs in two games for the single elimination District 6 Tournament at Mills Park. They stroked five round-trippers against the Jefferson County All-Stars Friday in winning 18-1. This has to be the most powerful hitting Little League team in the six-year history of the tournament. This is the third year for the Suburbanites to play. South Suburban Stars picked up a single run off starter Mike Bennett in the first when Dave Hummel laid down a bunt single, went to second on a fielder's choice, to third on an infield out and home on a passed ball. The game remained that way until the fatal third when the Suburbanites slammed two home runs and two doubles. Bobby Ernst, the gutsy little catcher, hit a two-run shot and Rusty Klem had a three-run homer. Another single run came in the fourth off second relief hurler Elanathan Davis when Pat Gallagher rocked the fourth home run over the fence after Hummel had sent the second reliever, Dan Olson, to the showers with the third homer. Scott Adrian, taking Deane Fisher's place in the fifth, hit two consecutive home runs and Mike Davidson hit the seventh one.
