

Civil Defense Preparing Fund Request To Board

SALEM (UPI) — The Oregon Civil Defense Agency will ask the State Emergency Board for \$46,119 next Friday.

At its meeting last week the agency's advisory council decided to seek enough money to hire three more employees.

Adding the three employees could make the state eligible for federal matching funds which would mean an additional six persons on the state staff.

The recent legislature slashed the Civil Defense staff from 18 to three and the federal government refused to provide any matching funds for employees.

The Civil Defense advisory council said that three more persons are needed if some county civil defense programs are to continue.

The request to the emergency

board, which allocates money set aside by the legislature for emergency use, calls for \$43,170 for administrative expense of the agency and \$2,940 to acquire mobile equipment.

Also at the Friday meeting the state treasurer will ask \$35,650 to finance new duties brought on by the passage of the property tax deferral law.

The Department of Justice is seeking \$21,857 to pay for new duties added by the new uniform supervision of trustees for charitable purpose act.

The emergency fund now stands at \$2.2 million.

At its meeting the Emergency Board will also be asked to release money the legislature has approved for construction of the Portland State College Science Building and the Eastern Oregon College Science - Mathematics Building.

The legislature required final plans for the buildings to be approved by the Emergency Board before the construction money is made available.

Fishermen On Strike

VANCOUVER, B. C. (UPI) — Talks between the British Columbia Fisheries Association and the United Fishermen and Allied Workers' Union in Vancouver broke down Friday and a strike by 10,000 salmon fishermen, tendermen and shore workers continued.

Provincial Government Conciliation officer Reg Clements had indicated after an earlier meeting that he was "hopeful" of settlement. But late Friday there appeared no basis for agreement. Sources said the strike began July 13.

Salmon fishermen tendermen and shore workers went on strike to back up demands for higher salmon prices. The B.C. Fisheries Association has since made a new settlement offer, but the union executive refused to allow a membership vote on it.

The communist-led union, meanwhile, received a setback as rebellion mounted with the union rank-and-file.

Capt. Steinar Antonsen, owner of a halibut boat, obtained supreme court injunction after the union refused his crew permission to make a trip to the fishing grounds when the strike began.

The union moved tied up more than 50 halibut boats and threatened to idle the halibut fleet at a cost to workers and boat owners of \$1.5 million.

The court ruled Friday that the halibut fishermen were ordered to join the striking salmon fishermen without having a chance to approve or disapprove of strike action.

Engineers Set Port Studies

PORTLAND (UPI) — The Army Corps of Engineers announced Friday it has started surveys of port facilities at 12 seaports in Oregon, Washington and Alaska.

The surveys will include Coos Bay, Ore.; Grays Harbor, Port Angeles, Olympia, Tacoma, Seattle, Everett, Anacortes and Bellingham, Wash., and Anchorage, Seward and Ketchikan, Alaska.

Maj. Gen. W. W. Lapsley, North Pacific Division engineer, said the surveys will be published by the Government Printing Office for use by agencies interested in port facilities.

The survey team is headed by William N. Alexander, chief of the Domestic Ports Branch of the Board of Engineers for Rivers and Harbors.

Hearing Set On Appointee

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A hearing on the nomination of David S. Black, Everett, Wash., to the Federal Power Commission will be held before the Senate Commerce Committee on Aug. 5.

Black, currently general counsel to the Bureau of Public Roads, was named by President Kennedy to succeed former Oregon Public Utilities Commissioner Howard Morgan on the commission.

He is a former Washington State attorney general and counsel to the State Public Service Commission.

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Olson Hits BPA Record

BOISE (UPI) — An Idaho Power Company official says southern Idaho has made greater economic progress than areas where Bonneville Power Administration dominates the electric power supply.

E. A. Olson, assistant central division manager for the company, told a meeting of the Capital City Kiwanis Club in Boise Friday the economic progress in the south demonstrates "conclusively that so-called 'cheap' government power is not a guarantee of industrial and economic growth."

Olson said claims that the Idaho economy is decadent and that "the only cure is federal power" are "misinformation."

The private utility official said southern Idaho's economy compares favorably with the BPA area states of Oregon and Washington by such "yard sticks" as unemployment, value added by manufacturing, debt and tax levels and new industries gained.

"Certainly, a comparative record of this kind provides no warrant for downgrading or holding up to scorn the economic and industrial growth of Idaho compared with Oregon and Washington," Olson said. "To the contrary, Idaho's economic growth record far exceeds that of the neighboring states."

Olson said 116 new industries employing some 5,500 persons located in southern Idaho and Eastern Oregon between 1955 and 1961. In contrast, he said, the industrial development record in the BPA area for 10 years shows it "added a net of exactly two industrial customers."

Nilsen Denies City Request

PORTLAND (UPI) — State Labor Commissioner Norman Nilsen ruled Friday that he has jurisdiction to hear a civil rights complaint against the city of Portland.

Nilsen denied a motion by the city to dismiss a petition asking for a hearing, which was filed last week by Portland Negroes Samuel Macon and Nathan Jones.

Two other motions by the city, one to strike out certain points of the complaint and the other calling for a finding of fact before the hearing, will be taken up next Tuesday, Nilsen said.

The hearing is scheduled Aug. 1 in the State Office Building here. Macon and Jones claimed they were discriminated against in applying for jobs with the city's parks department as recreation workers.

Macon later was offered a job. However, Macon's attorney said his client would not accept it until second class employment restrictions against him were lifted. He charged that Macon was ordered watched if he took the job.

Policy Decision On Birth Control Faces Commission

SALEM (UPI) — A planned parenthood group which will distribute birth control information will go into operation in Portland Sept. 1, the State Public Welfare Commission was told Friday.

Rep. Grace Peck, D-Portland, said she had been informed of the plans of the new private program and wondered what the state commission's policy toward it would be.

Members of the commission took no stand on the question pending further information.

State Welfare Administrator Andrew Juras explained the commission would be faced with two policy decisions.

One would be what to do in case a welfare recipient asks for birth-control services from the new organization and the other whether or not caseworkers should have the discretion to tell welfare recipients who haven't made any requests about the service.

Juras said that information regarding fees and the clinic's operation would have to be obtained before a policy could be recommended.

Commission member Clay Meyers, Portland, said the views of the public should be obtained before the commission makes a decision.

Mrs. Peck said she wanted to have more details about the clinic and the views of the Catholic Archdiocese of Portland before taking a stand on the clinic.

Staff To Train
Planned Parenthood League of Oregon is the group which plans to establish the new clinic.

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Case scheduling in the three counties will start in October and the new program will go into operation in February.

The new case classification program was authorized by the recent legislature to give more caseworker attention to cases where help can lead to people getting off welfare rolls.

Staff orientation for the program in Clackamas, Washington and Yamhill counties will start Aug. 12 with programs in these counties also to begin in February.

Fire Damage Cause Found
The fire that damaged three railroad ties on the OCE&T tracks at Fargo Street and Peck Drive July 21 was started by a Molotov cocktail flung by a 15-year-old Klamath Falls youth, City Juvenile Officer Ray Howard has determined.

The fire was noted about 9 a.m. Sunday and was extinguished by the Suburban Fire Department after it caused minor damage to the ends of the ties.

The Molotov cocktail, a gas bomb used effectively by the Soviets in combating Nazi tanks during World II, was concocted by a 15-year-old youth who threw the object at the bridge abutment, resulting in the fire.

City police learned of the incident from a youngster who had observed the youth playing with similar bombs at various other times. Juvenile Officer Howard later reported the incident to County Juvenile Officer Francis Mathews, who then discussed the case with the boy and his father.

The case will not come before the juvenile court because the damage to the railroad was minor and "we believe the boy's parents can handle the situation," Mathews said.

G. A. Nichol, special investigator for the Southern Pacific Railroad and the city police assisted Howard with his investigation.

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Lumber Strike Continues; Negotiations Set Monday

PORTLAND (UPI) — Some 27,000 lumber workers remain idled today throughout the Northwest as the lumber dispute continued into its 32nd day.

Washington and Oregon Pope and Talbot, Inc., operations, were struck Thursday and Friday by the union action followed a break in negotiations with the timber Operators Council, of which Pope and Talbot is a member. Talks with the group ended Thursday with union officials demanding a wage increase of 33 1/2 cents over a three-year period, and management offering a 25 cent hourly increase.

A TOC spokesman has quoted union officials as saying they will close all 196 members of the council, one-by-one if necessary, until the strike is settled. Another TOC member, the Edward Hines Lumber Co., had plants closed Thursday at Westfir and Dee, Ore. The Friday strike against Pope and Talbot idled operations at Oakridge, St. Helens, Ore., and Kalama and Port Gamble, Wash.

The only future meeting scheduled between management and the striking unions, has been set for Monday at Portland. Scott Paper Co. officials will meet with representatives
