

Miss Indian America Proves Beautiful Ambassador

The West Wind, blowing gently, brought forth the first of the Indians of old. It urged the salmon to the fish traps and sent the deer into the open. It promised rain when the forests were dry and fair days when the trails with the small ones were abroad. It guided the unsure to the great mountain for counsel. It touched the dark braids and the golden skin of maidens. It blew small smouldering campfires at night into tiny flames of reassurance and promised heaven to those tired ones about to leave the tip for the journey into the great unknown.

Wind, blowing at the time of birth, promised many things to the young ones, a sure hand on the bow, light feet upon a forest trail, knowledge of healing nature and sometimes far travels.

Surely the West Wind blew on that February day at Klamath Agency in Klamath County when Ramona Edith Soto, the Miss Indian America of 1963 was born, for she has been from the Pacific to the Atlantic oceans, and has crossed the borders of many states during the year of her reign.

She has been seated with notables and has conversed with the great... she has been offered affluence and position by those who have heard her voice and seen her poise, yet she has not been turned aside from her spoken goal nor been overcome by acclaim.

Ramona Soto's reign as representative of the tribes of all American Indians, will end in August when the 10th Miss Indian America will be chosen at Sheridan, Wyo., and a silver and turquoise necklace of royalty will be given to the new representative of the Indian people.

Ramona's duties have been numerous. It has been a grueling year in spite of the excitement, the fun, the honors, the travels. She has been a good ambassador, not only for the Indians but for Oregon and her hometown of Klamath Falls. She has lauded the beauties of the state, the friendliness of its people, and the opportunities in Klamath Falls. Her audiences have listened and have learned of Oregon's greatness.

In her travels Ramona has spoken to many groups on Indian problems, especially the Klamaths whose ties with the United States government have now been terminated. She spoke too, of her hopes to study law, the better to serve her tribe.

From the telegraph wires and the telephone has come unchallenged word of her travels, the favorable impressions she has made, and of her spirit of adventure.

She was introduced to Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy and the two Kennedy children in the private Kennedy quarters at the White House by Bob Burnett, executive director of the National Congress of American Indians. She found the First Lady, "elegant and gracious."

She met Attorney General Robert Kennedy and Stewart Udall, Secretary of the Interior, responsible for the Bureau of Indian Affairs and they talked of the Indian and his future... she has appeared on national television shows, and with equal enthusiasm, has been present in small towns for Indian sports tournaments and hometown interviews.

She was in Wisconsin for the Oneida Indian Pow-Wow and in Hoopa, Calif., for basketball competition.

Students in high schools and colleges have heard her speak. Civic groups and women's organizations have included her on their programs. She returned to Oregon for the Indian Arts Festival in La Grande and the Fourth of July parade in Klamath Falls.

Oregon State legislators from Klamath County and the Herald and News were her hosts at a visit to the legislature in Salem. Her hometown sister met her with a reception after she was chosen at Sheridan.

Ramona has worn the traditional buckskin dress and beaded accessories of the plains Indians on her travels. Her long black braids are her own.

She was offered the part in Flower Drum song, played on Broadway by Nancy Kwan and declined it as a fleeting honor... was invited to be a hostess in the American Indian Pavilion at the New York's 1964 World's Fair... was offered a scholarship with full tuition and fees to any Eastern college of her choice but chose to return to the mountain country of the West to continue her education.

Communism Danger Rising In Italy Reports Scribe

EDITOR'S NOTE: Western observers are concerned by the new vitality and renewed popularity of the polls of the Communist party in Italy. In this dispatch, a veteran United Press International reporter in Rome examines the situation.

ROME (UPI) — The Communist danger in Italy today is greater than it has been since 1948.

Many have been saying in recent years, especially since the country's economic boom in the Common Market, that Italian communism was dead. But in the Italian general elections in April, the Communists picked up one million more votes than in the last election.

The massive gains, which no one has yet thoroughly explained, put Italian Communist leader Palmiro Togliatti back in the limelight of world communism and put him in a strong position at home.

A number of commentators feel that responsibility for the Red advance rests at least as much with the shortsightedness of Italian democrats as with Togliatti's shrewdness. But even Togliatti himself seemed to be surprised by his massive election gains. Although now he has taken a "knew-all-along" attitude and speaks with the assurance of a man who feels communism's final climb to power in Italy is only a matter of time.

Some blame Church
Some observers, both inside and outside Italy, have blamed the Red advance at least partly on the Catholic Church's "softer" approach to communism during the reign of Pope John XXIII. But this ignores, or grossly underestimates, the independence and individualism of the Italian voter. Catholicism in religion, most of them may be. The question is one for the politicians, the educators, the civic leaders, not for the church.

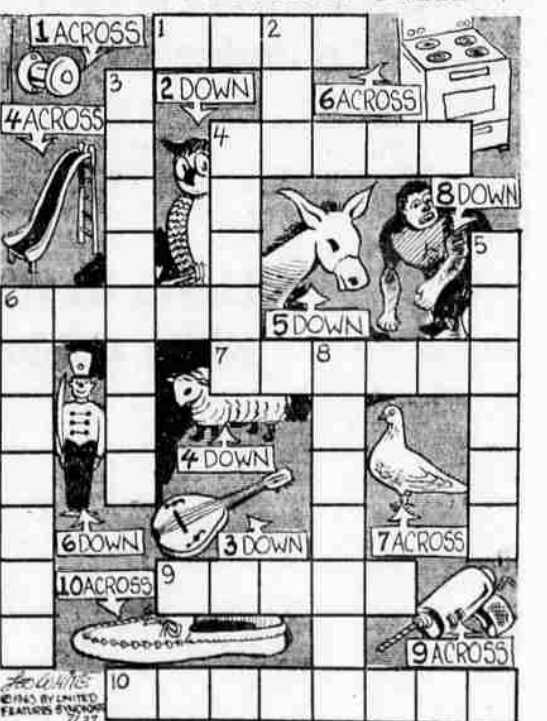
If you ask any Italian why the ruling Christian Democrats lost votes and the Communists gained, a typical answer is: "Because the people were fed up." The same Italian will note that the million votes gained by the Liberals — a moderate rightwing, staunchly democratic and pro-Western opposition party — had much the same meaning: a protest against the way the country was being run.

The "protest" itself is vague. It apparently is aimed against the tantalizing slowness of Italian bureaucracy, against recurring financial scandals — some over the Sino-Soviet split and true, some manufactured — against other aspects of Nikita Khrushchev's policies. Togliatti might well have been embarrassed in years did not seem to assuage specific things to fight "for."

This has shown itself in Italy in the fact that the Communists have been plagued over the past few months by a steady trickle of defections of minor provincial party officials who searched their minds and found that they were not Communists any more.

But unlike the Marxist-schooled party officials, Italian voters are uncomplicated. With many of them, Togliatti's campaign against government "inefficiency" and "corruption" was a hit. The Communist vote skyrocketed from 6.7 million votes in 1958 to 7,767,001 in April, the highest Italy's Reds have ever polled. For the first time since 1948, the Communists and Socialists combined outpolled the Christian Democrats 39.1 to 38.3 per cent.

BLM Sales Hit Record

In the last 12 months the Bureau of Land Management sold 1,573,159,000 board feet of timber for \$36,414,738 in Oregon. That is an all-time record for BLM timber sales, said Russell E. Getty, BLM director for Oregon and Washington.

Getty pointed out that the multiplier effect of these sales is about 20:1 on the normal output of end products. Expressed in another way, each million board feet of timber harvested provides 12 man years of labor and each dollar's worth of timber sold has an end product value of about \$20.

Two Escape Red Germany

BERLIN (UPI) — A hot-rodging South American sped under Communist barriers in a low slung sports car to free his East Berlin friend in the second such escape of the year, West Berlin police disclosed Saturday.

The escape was made in a drenching rainstorm at 3 a.m. Friday with the 22-year-old girl carried up in the small trunk of the car as the man, 26, zigzagged past barriers and zipped under the 38-inch-high Communist barrier poles at the Friedrichstrasse crossing point.

Denies Visit

BUDAPEST (UPI) — The Hungarian Foreign Ministry has denied newspaper reports that Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev would visit Hungary next month.

A foreign ministry spokesman termed Western press reports "untrue" in their claims Khrushchev would make a short stop here prior to his scheduled August trip to Yugoslavia.

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
