The first degree murder trial of Archie Emil Foster, 22, charged with the April 22 slaying of Mrs. Richard Biss near Beatty, has been reset from Tuesday to Monday, Sept. 9, in the circuit court of Judge Donald A. W. Piper.

Foster is charged with the murder of Mrs. Biss as she was seated in the rear of an automobile parked on the outskirts of Beatty. The bullet, fired from a rifle, struck the victim on the cheek and exited through the back of her head, killing her instantly.

The shooting was the climax of a three- or four-day drinking party in which Foster, Mrs. Biss and several others participated, police records indicate.

State police and sheriff deputized Foster to a suburban motel and then to a house on Crest Street, where he was arrested two days following the shooting.
