Win With Simple Bid

South's bidding is worthy of study. He merely overcalled with one diamond to start because he knew the bidding would not stop there.

His original intention was to show his spades later on, but when North raised his diamonds and East bid spades South simply jumped to five diamonds to put pressure on West.

West felt no pressure. He had a completely balanced hand with an apparent trump trick and 12 high card points. His double looked like money from home.

South's play was even better than his bidding. He won the first heart; played the ace of spades, ruffed a spade, ruffed a club to get back to his hand, ruffed a second spade, ruffed a second club and led a fourth spade on which West discarded a club.

Now South made one of those plays that separate the men from the boys. He carefully ruffed that spade with the ace, not the ten of diamonds. Then he led dummy's ten of diamonds and overtook with his jack. West won with his king whereupon South showed his hand, announcing, "I have to lose a heart, but as soon as I get the lead I will draw the rest of the trumps and my ten of spades will be good."

Actually, South could have ruffed with the ten of diamonds and still made the hand provided he did not then lead out dummy's ace, but his line of play was simpler by far.

The car, driven by L. Sexton, 18, Route 1, Box 576, was not damaged, while the bike received only minor damage.

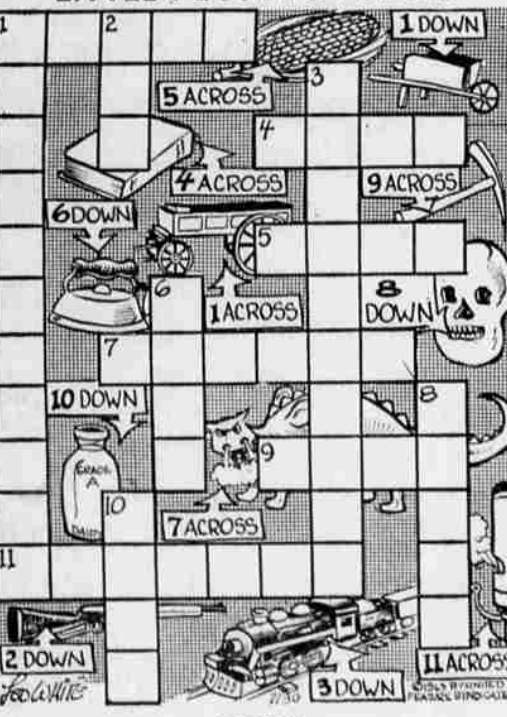
Local Bridge Victors Told

administrator for appraisal. He is a former vice president of Northwest Orient Airlines and Slick Airways.

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Keating Tells Sources Of Cuban Info

WATERTOWN, N.Y. (UPI) — Sen. Kenneth B. Keating, R-N.Y., said Saturday 3 per cent of his information on Cuba comes from refugee reports.

Keating, who became a national figure last fall with his warnings of the Soviet arms buildup in Cuba, said the other 95 per cent was from government sources.

The New York lawmaker has been under attack by Democrats who say he got his information from newspaper articles.

Interviewed while on a weekend tour, Keating said refugee reports that Russia still has bases in Cuba are "likely accurate." He said his sources report there are still 17,500 Russians in Cuba.

He said there is no proof that all missiles have been removed from Cuba because the nation is "dotted with caves."

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Government Buys Road Rights, Ranger Tells Mt. Shasta C of C

MOUNT SHASTA—James Shiro, head ranger of the U.S. Forest Service, reported to Mount Shasta Chamber of Commerce members that the government has purchased the right-of-way on the South Fork road and that re-appraising of the road and timber is underway. Until the timber is sold, there will be no new road.

The first three-quarters of a mile involves all new construction, as South Fork has always been a private logging and recreation road until the government purchase. At the present time, Robert O'Hair and Al Boss have control of traffic over the road, and permission must be obtained to travel it. A portion is four-wheel drive or "jeep road" and leads to Gumbo Lake and Mumbo Basin.

An informative pamphlet which includes a picture of Mt. Shasta, map, and access roads off the freeway leading into the city was presented by Frank Melo and Robert Cornwall. The folder will be distributed to travelers by businesses in the city.

Jake Lindner of the budget committee gave his report of a total proposed income of \$3,100 and possible disbursements of \$4,050 for the fiscal year. The budget was tabled for further study.

The chamber voted to sponsor a booth at the Siskiyou County Fair, and it was announced that Mount Shasta needs a girl to represent it in the "Miss Siskiyou" queen contest. Melo, Lindner, and Cornwall are on the committee.

The chamber received a letter of appreciation from the California Association of Airport Executives, Inc., regarding the success of its recent convention in Mount Shasta. Literature was also read from International Paper, Inc., explaining its position in the current lumber strike.

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
