Not Necessary To Hike Debt Ceiling, Dillon Says

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Treasury Secretary Douglas Dillon told Congress today that new sparkle in the nation's economy would make it unnecessary to raise the national debt ceiling to a new record high this summer.

He said the "most gratifying experience" of finding the economic pulse much more rhythmic in recent months means the Treasury can get by if Congress will just continue the present debt limit of \$309 billion through November.

This was expected to avert another wrangle for the time being, at least inasmuch as simple extension of the existing limit for three months past its Aug. 31 expiration date is not likely to sth up much fuss.

Dillon and budget director Kenneth Gordon, appearing before the House Ways and Means Committee, made clear, however, that they would be back in the fall to request another record hike. They declined to predict how high a ceiling they felt would be needed.

When Dillon viewed the economic improvements, which put the Treasury into a better cash condition as heartening, it was somewhat embarrassing for him to tell Congress about it.

He had forecast only a few months ago that a boost in the debt limit to \$320 billion would be needed before the summer was over. Economizers — Republicans and some Democrats — viewed the revised computations a proof that treasury estimates were not reliable.

Neither Dillon nor Gordon would give any revised estimates of the budget deficit for the current fiscal year. The deficit figure has not been changed officially since January when the President estimated it at a record \$11.9 billion.

Gordon said, however, that the budget revisions submitted piecemeal to Congress since January would, if approved without change, add about \$100 million to Kennedy's proposed record budget of \$98.8 billion.

He said that budget cuts proposed by the administration in foreign aid and other programs would cut spending estimates by about \$200 million. This would be offset, however, by new spending proposals in the President's civil rights message which would boost spending by \$300 million.

Favoritism Shown In TFX Award, Senator Claims

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Sen. Milward L. Simpson, R-Wyo., charged today the Pentagon's handling of the controversial TFX fighter plane contract was "shot through with political interest and favoritism."

Simpson told the Senate that Navy Secretary Fred Korth should have disclosed his connections with the winning contractor, General Dynamics Corp., before the multi-billion dollar contract was awarded last November.

"Did Korth reveal to his confederates his staggering conflict of interest? If he did not, he should have. The July 23 testimony of Sec. Korth is shocking almost beyond belief," Simpson declared.

Simpson leveled the criticism as the Senate investigations subcommittee scheduled more closed hearings for Tuesday with Air Force Secretary Eugene M. Zuckert as the chief witness.

Billions Involved

The subcommittee, now in its fifth month of hearings, is investigating why the contract, expected to exceed \$6.5 billion, was given to General Dynamics rather than to the Boeing Co.

Simpson noted that Korth acknowledged that he was president of the Continental National Bank in Fort Worth and approved a loan to General Dynamics.

"It was axiomatic that much of the money lent by Korth would be spent in Korth's state, if General Dynamics got the TFX contract," Simpson said.

He added that the "whole transaction would greatly enhance the Fred Korth image in the banking circles he hopes to rejoin when he disentangles himself from the Kennedy."

Disclosure Shocked Him

"I was shocked," Simpson asserted, "to see spelled out publicly the obvious business and political cross currents which figured in Secretary Korth's judgments on the aircraft contract."

The Republican senator said the TFX case was taking on the proportions of the Dixon-Yates power scandal and there "are facts pointing to the misuse by some of the trusts and responsibilities which repose in public office."

He urged that the hearings be continued "until all parties involved have made full disclosures of the motives for their judgments in this gigantic contract."

Crews Battle Brush Fires In Klamath River Area

A brush fire believed started by electricity from a power pole broke out in the vicinity of Salt Cave, near the Klamath River, about 2:30 p.m. Saturday, less than four miles from where firefighters of the Klamath Forest Protective Association, U. S. Forest Service, and lumber operators were battling another fire, KPFA Supervisor George Wardell said Monday.

The fire-fighting teams had been suppressing a fire which had broken out Friday in the vicinity of another power pole, about three miles west of the river, when KPFA received a radio report from the Pacific Power and Light Company that another brush fire had started in the same area.

A six-man KPFA crew battling the initial fire which swept across 35 acres of hilly terrain during Friday and Saturday were dispatched to Salt Cave and extinguished the more recent blaze after it burned about 3.4 acres.

The fire started within an area bounded by a creek and a road and was bombed with fire retardant from two Yreka aircraft and a Klamath Falls PBY. Wardell said today that the blaze "probably would still be going if it hadn't broken out between such natural fire breaks as the road and creek."

The fire was first observed by a group of University of Oregon archaeological students seeking artifacts at the cave. Wardell said they heard electricity arcing across the top of the power pole and noted that flames had broken out under it. The students then radioed the PPL office for assistance from a power company radio-equipped vehicle they had driven into the area, and the firm, in turn, contacted the KPFA.

As fire-fighters were suppressing the second blaze, other teams resumed mop-up work on the initial blaze which was being continued Monday by a six-man KPFA crew equipped with three pumper trucks.

Two other fires that broke out on KPFA lands during the weekend were suppressed before they caused serious damage.

The first was sighted by the Applegate Butte lookout who reported a burning lot near the Williams River, northwest of Chiloquin, on Sunday.

The other was a spot fire discovered and extinguished by R. W. Rock, Pine Grove Road 2, Klamath Falls, nearly one-quarter mile south of Lake of the Woods, about 1:30 p.m., the same day. Rock reported the incident to the KPFA and asked that it check the site to be sure the fire was out.
