

Roseburg's Williams Shatters Falcons' Dreams, 2-0

ROSEBURG—Summer American Legion baseball ended on an unhappy note for the Klamath Falcons here Monday night.

Dick Williams, a wily right hander who turned the same trick on the Falcons last season in the final playoff game, did it again Monday night and in brilliant fashion as he four-hit the Birds and struck out 17 in winning the thrilling and well-

played game, 2-0, before a crowd of 2,321.

Williams, who the coaches said threw the finest game of his career, had to do just that because he was locked tightly in an exciting pitcher's duel with Jim Jackson of the Falcons who went the distance and lost on another four-hit game. It was his first loss of the season after six wins.

It was a near flawless game with the Lockwood Motors team

making one miscue and the Falcons one. The one the Falcons made, however, didn't hurt them as it turned out.

Thus ended a fine season for the Falcons. They finished with a 28-8 season record before losing out in these quarterfinals. It took two extraordinary pitching performances to beat them out of the state running. Roseburg is perennial champion.

The game was just a case of

the breaks. Both teams deserved to win the game in the way that they played. The nine-inning game, as sufficient proof, lasted only one hour and 40 minutes. Roseburg will now host North Salem Post 9 in the quarterfinals, beginning Thursday.

The Falcons hurt themselves at the bat by whiffing 17 times. Ran Cool struck 19 of them out in the first contest. But the Falcons were hurt by taking the called third strike seven times.

The four hits came scattered except the final two in the ninth inning with two away.

Klamath got a base runner in the first inning off Williams when Larry Binney popped an opposite field single to left field. There was one out and he died there as Williams proceeded to strike out second sacker Lanny Guyer and Mike Kitching. Jackson had the first three batters for Roseburg to ground out.

Jackson, in fact, got the first

11 men to face him and all were ground out except one strike out and one pop up.

The 12th batter, Bob Manning, slammed a triple but died on third in the fourth when Jim Beamer flew out deep to left.

After both John Gray and Jackson had ground out to Williams, LeVoy Young beat out an infield hit for the second Klamath hit in the third frame. But Binney flied out to deep center field to end that brief threat.

Nothing more happened except quick outs until Gray reached first on an error in the fifth and died there when Williams made a very fine stop of Jackson's hard shot back at him.

Then came the fatal sixth. The Falcons went down in order but the Lockwood Motors didn't. Williams himself led off the inning by working Jackson for a walk, the only walk he gave up all night. He was sacrificed to second by Mike Blom-

berg and took third when Jay Paxton dropped the third strike to Artie McDonald and had to throw to first to get him out. But Manning singled sharply to left to score Williams with the first run. He stole second base on Jackson despite Paxton's fine throw to the bag. And Beamer lined the second single of the inning to left and Manning romped home. Jackson got the side out by Tom Morrison's fly to Kitching in center.

The Falcons got a base runner in Gray in the eighth when he got Williams' first free pass, but it ended when Jackson ground into a double play.

There was a rally in the ninth, but too late and too little. Young and Binney led off the inning with strikeouts and Guyer beat out an infield hit. Kitching then sliced a single to right field. John Paristoto worked Williams to a 3-2 count and even fouled off one or two, but struck out to end the game.

That finished the Falcons for this season. The cry went out in the locker room to "wait until next year." The Falcons lose only catcher Jay Paxton and reserve outfielder Larry Smith. Everyone else is back.

Giants Take Second Spot; American Gets Pitching

Yankees Blanked By A's

Notice how those American League managers always are crying about lousy pitching?

Notice, too, how they're not saying one single word today?

They couldn't possibly, because they wouldn't have a leg to stand on after one look at Monday night's boxscores.

For example:

—Robin Roberts and Mickey Lolich tangled in a pair of two-hitters until Dick Brown hit a pinch two-run homer with two out in the ninth for a 2-1 Baltimore victory over Detroit.

—Joel Horlen hurled hitless ball for 8 1/3 innings, then wound up losing a two-hitter when Don Lock's two-run homer with two out in the ninth brought Washington a 2-1 win over Chicago.

—Dean Chance of Los Angeles held Cleveland hitless until the seventh and settled for a two-hit 11-0 victory.

—Radatz shines again

Dick Radatz came up with another one of his brilliant relief jobs to nail down a 7-5 triumph for Boston over Minnesota and Dave Wickersham of Kansas City pitched his first major league shutout to stop the Yankees, 5-0, in the other AL games.

Roberts' two-hit victory over the Tigers was the 23rd of his major league career and his ninth of the year for the Orioles. Lolich had a one-hitter and a 1-0 lead until pinch hitter Al Smith singled with one out in the ninth. The Detroit rookie then got Luis Aparicio on a fly ball but Brown came off the bench to deliver a two-run homer that dealt Lolich his sixth setback in 10 decisions.

Heart-breaking loss

Horlen's loss to the Senators was equally heart-breaking. Recalled from the minors last week, the White Sox right-hander held Washington hitless until Chuck Hinton singled over second base with one out in the ninth.

Larry Osborne grounded out for the second out but Lock then drilled his 17th homer into the left field bullpen.

Lock's homer made a winner of knuckleballer Ronnie Kline, who relieved starter Steve Ridzik in the eighth.

The only Cleveland hits off Chance were Fred Whitfield's bloop single in the seventh and Woodie Held's single in the eighth after Los Angeles had already clinched the game with an eight-run rally in the third.

Felix Torres highlighted the Angels' outburst with a grand slam homer off Jerry Walker, who had relieved loser Dick Donovan. Chance struck out 12 batters and walked two in bringing his record to 10-10. Donovan now is 6-9.

Monbouquette won 14th

Bill Monbouquette registered his 14th victory for the Red Sox although tagged for four homers by the Twins. Radatz came to Monbouquette's rescue in the eighth and struck out three of the six batters he faced.

Loser Jim Perry ran into a five-run Boston rally in the first, marked by Dick Sturtz's 22nd homer with two on and Ed Bresoud's 13th homer with the bases empty. Roman Mejias doubled home two more runs for the Red Sox in the third. Bob Allison hit his 23rd homer for the Twins. Earl Battey hit 21st, Vic Power his sixth and Don Mincher his 10th before Radatz made his 44th appearance of the season.

Palmer Grabs Western Open Meet With Bogey

CHICAGO (UPI) — Usually a bogey won't win a duffer a beer, but for pro golfer's leading money winner, Arnold Palmer, a bogey was good for \$11,000 and the Western Open championship.

Palmer won with a bogey because Julius Boros got a double bogey. The third playoff contestant, Jack Nicklaus, also got a bogey.

The over-all performance of the trio on the 205-yard 17th hole at Beverly Country Club Monday may have been the worst ever on network television or in the final round of a \$57,200 tournament.

Palmer, who wound up with a one-under-par 70 for the 6,867-yard course, said he had "seen worse," however. Boros finished with a 71 and Nicklaus with a 73.

Palmer, who said he played "pretty well for 13 holes—and then I wasn't too sharp," started

ing a 12-foot birdie putt, but Boros missed his birdie try from seven feet to lose his comeback chance.

The trio tied for first place after the regulation 72 holes with 280, four under par, to set up the playoff.

Palmer's victory increased his 1963 earnings to \$96,955. Both Boros and Nicklaus earned \$4,450 for the round with Nicklaus increasing his 1963 earnings to \$79,590 and Boros to \$69,996 to run two-three behind Palmer. The trio contributed their 50 per cent of the day's gate receipts to the Chick Evans caddie fund.

It was Palmer's sixth win in 11 playoffs and the second playoff defeat for both of his opponents, in four tries for Nicklaus and five for Boros. It was the seventh playoff in 30 tournaments on the PGA tour and the fourth for Palmer in his last five tournaments.

Hit Into Trap

Palmer hit into a trap and Boros into the rough behind the green. Nicklaus' tee shot stopped five feet from the pin.

Palmer's blast from the trap went 35 feet past the pin and Boros dubbed his approach and his ball stopped 22 feet short of the flag. Both missed their first putts.

This set up a situation in which there could have been a three-way deadlock if each player sank his next putt. Instead, Nicklaus missed and three-putted for his four. Palmer sank his putt for the bogey. Boros, barely 18 inches from the flag, missed and three-putted for a five.

This hole wrapped up Palmer's sixth tourney championship of the year. On the 18th he parred, missing a 12-foot putt, but Boros missed his birdie try from seven feet to lose his comeback chance.

Spahn Nearing Strikeout Record For Southpaw Hurler

Warren Spahn now ranks as the all-time left-handed strikeout king of the majors — but you'd better put an asterisk in front of that.

Until Friday, anyway.

That's when Milwaukee's superlative 42-year-old southpaw is due to work next and since he'll go against the Mets that night, he'll probably dispel any existing question.

Actually there should be no question even now. To all intents and purposes Spahn broke the strikeout record for left-handed pitchers by fanning five batters in an 8-2 victory over Cincinnati Monday night.

These five strikeouts upped his major league total to 2,378. No argument there. But there is some argument over Rube Waddell's record.

Record Books Differ

Most record books say the former Philadelphia Athletics' southpaw struck out 2,375 batters during his career but in some books his total is listed at 2,381.

Obviously that was all settled 17 years ago when Bob Feller was officially recognized the single season record-holder after striking out 348 batters for Cleveland in 1946. Feller was acknowledged to have broken the record even though Waddell was credited with 349 strikeouts for the 1904 season in some books and 343 in others.

Those six strikeouts by Waddell are the same ones under question now even though it was all supposed to have been settled in 1946. According to the Little Red Book of Baseball, Waddell's total was 2,375. But some purists insist on going by "One for the Book," which lists Waddell's total as 2,381.

Needs Four Strikeouts

Regardless, Spahn has a much better chance of getting rid of his asterisk than Roger Maris has. All the veteran southpaw needs is four strikeouts against the Mets Friday night and he'll be the new record-holder in everybody's book.

Spahn held the Reds to six hits Monday night in posting the 340th victory of his major league career and his 13th triumph of the season compared with five defeats.

Hank Aaron's 30th homer of the season with one on and Lee Maye's eighth homer with one on, both off loser John Tsitouris in the first inning, proved enough margin for Spahn, who later yielded solo homers to Vada Pinson and Frank Robinson.

The Los Angeles Dodgers

snapped their four-game losing streak and maintained their 4½ game lead with a 6-2 victory over the Philadelphia Phillies while the San Francisco Giants won their eighth straight by beating the Pittsburgh Pirates, 5-4, in the only other National League action.

Threw Five-Hitter

Sandy Koufax checked the Dodgers' backslide with a five-hitter over the Phils that earned him his 17th victory against four losses. Koufax struck out seven and walked four. Two-run homers by Tommy Davis and Willie Davis sent 37-year-old Cal McLish down to his sixth defeat compared with 10 victories.

Willie Mays' 24th homer with two on gave the Giants their victory over the Pirates and marked the third time within a week that Mays has delivered a game-winning homer. His blow wiped out a 3-2 deficit and came off Vern Law, who also gave up a solo homer to Chuck Hiller in the third.

Jim Duffalo, second of four Giant pitchers, was credited with the victory, his third without a defeat. The loss was the 10th straight for the Pirates at Candlestick Park dating back to last season.

Germans Favored Over Yanks

BRAUNSCHWEIG, Germany (UPI) — The touring United States women's track and field team takes on the German national team today in the opening of their two-day meet with the host nation favored to hand the Yank girls their third straight loss.

West German publications are predicting victory for their team and there is little to indicate that the German girls will fall. However, the American girls, who lost by a lopsided score to Russia and then made it close against Poland last weekend, were expected to make perhaps their best showing of the tour, although even American officials traveling with the team would not go so far as to predict a victory. The American men are undefeated in two starts. They beat the Russians by just five points, 119-114, but routed the Poles, 125-83.

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Gonzalez Named Cup Captain

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Former world net champion Richard (Pancho) Gonzalez, who once turned down a Mexican offer on citizenship and a cinch berth on their Davis Cup team, will be trying to help the United States squad defeat Mexico in the upcoming Davis Cup zone playoffs.

Gonzalez, 35, who became a U.S. Davis Cup player after rocketing to national fame in 1940, was appointed coach of the U.S. Davis Cup team by captain Robert J. Kelleher Monday.

When Gonzalez began pulling major upsets on Los Angeles Tennis courts in 1947 he was told he would be assured of a Mexican Davis Cup berth if he would take Mexican citizenship. As the son of Mexican parents, he was eligible, but the young Gonzalez turned it down and went on to dominate world tennis, first amateur, then professional, until he retired in 1961.

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
