Jury Returns Guilty Verdict As Ward Takes Pill Overdose

LONDON (UPI) — Dr. Stephen Ward, 50, was convicted today on five charges after he attempted suicide with an overdose of drugs.

A jury of 11 men and 1 woman found the society playboy osteopath guilty on two vice counts and innocent on three others.

The osteopath, whose introduction of pretty girls to some of Britain's most prominent men exploded this country's greatest sex-and-security scandal of the century, had been tried on three charges of living on the earnings of prostitutes and two charges of procuring young girls for vice.

Ward was in a coma at St. Stephen's Hospital when the jury reached its verdict. During the night he took an overdose of sleeping pills and was rushed to the hospital this morning two hours before court opened.

Justice Sir Archie Marshall completed his charge to the jury without Ward being present, and the jurors began their deliberations.

The jurors found the society osteopath and artist innocent of living off the immoral earnings of two admitted prostitutes—Ronna Ricardo, 23, and Vicki Barrett, 20.

Moscow confirmed Tuesday that Philby had defected to communism, asked for asylum in Russia and requested Soviet citizenship. It described him as a "leading" member of British intelligence.

On July 1 Lord Privy Seal Edward Heath identified Philby as the mysterious "third man" who had warned turned diplomats Guy Burgess and Donald Maclean they were under British surveillance.

Burgess and Maclean fled to the Soviet Union in 1951 after years of security service in the British Diplomatic Corps. Shortly thereafter, Philby was forced to resign because of his Communist connections.

In 1955 Macmillan, then foreign secretary, told Parliament there was no hard evidence Philby tipped off Burgess and Maclean. Later Philby was given a job on the London Observer, a Sunday newspaper, at the suggestion of the Foreign Office. He became the paper's Middle East correspondent.

Philby remained in Beirut until Jan. 23 when there were reports that he had disappeared. Heath said there was evidence he had worked for Soviet Russia before 1946, and indications he had gone behind the Iron Curtain.

In London, there were widespread press reports that Philby had been sent to the Middle East as a British agent but that actually he was a "double agent" in the employ of the Communists. The Soviet government newspaper Izvestia, which confirmed his defection, had claimed earlier this year that Philby's job was to help the deposed Imam of Yemen regain his throne. Izvestia said at the time that Philby was in the pay of American and British intelligence.

The jury, which deliberated for 4 hours and 35 minutes, found Ward guilty of the first two counts brought against him—living partly off the immoral earnings of Christine Keeler, 21, and Marilyn "Mandy" Rice-Davies, two playgirls who lived at various times in his flat.

During the day, Ward was given oxygen and other treatment, but remained in a coma.

The 50-year-old society osteopath, key figure in one of the sex-scandals of the century, was understood to have left two notes at the apartment of a friend, where he was found.

The sudden dramatic turn in the case caused confusion at the Old Bailey Court and officials searched for precedents on whether to continue or adjourn the case.

The statement on the drugs was made by Mayne Butcher, secretary of the Chelsea and Kensington Hospital Management Committee. Ward, pale-faced and with saliva flecks on his lips, was rushed to St. Stephen's Hospital by ambulance this morning.

Defendants from Scotland Yard took up positions by his bedside and the hospital called in an anesthetist.

About two hours after he had been carried on a stretcher from the apartment, the hospital reported a slight improvement in Ward's condition.

"He's in a pretty bad way," defense attorney James Burge said, but he declined to say what had happened to Ward.

Ward appeared in excellent health and spirits in Tuesday's trial session.

But he interrupted the proceedings several times with indignant denials of testimony against him, later excusing himself by saying he was under considerable strain.

Ward faces a maximum 25 years in prison if convicted of all counts of living off the earnings of prostitutes and procuring girls for prostitution.

Ward had been free on bail during the trial and was staying in the apartment of a friend.

Officials at St. Stephen's Hospital refused to discuss his condition.

UPI photographer Ray Baxter, who watched Ward being carried out, said "he looked a bit rough and was wrapped in a red blanket. Two ambulance men put him inside the ambulance. The ambulance shot off like a rocket."

Ward had gone to the apartment Tuesday night with his girl friend, Julie Gulliver.

Today was to be a crucial day in the Ward trial, Justice Sir Archie Marshall was to finish his statement to the jury and the panel of 11 men and one woman was to begin its deliberations.

Defection Is Problem For British

LONDON (UPI)—Russian confirmation that Britain's notorious "third man" defected to the Soviet Union posed another political headache for Prime Minister Harold Macmillan in the House of Commons today.

Macmillan was expected to face a new political storm despite an earlier agreement calling for no more questions in public about former British agent Harold A.R. (Kim) Philby.

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Defraud Charge Summons Issued For Congressman

NEW YORK (UPI) — Process servers will be seeking Rep. Adam Clayton Powell, D-N.Y., starting Sunday with a summons requiring him to show cause why he should not be charged with a misdemeanor for allegedly attempting to defraud a creditor.

The creditor is Mrs. Esther James, a Harlem widow who won a \$211,200 libel judgment against Powell after he called her a "bag woman" (graft collector) for the police department. Mrs. James has been unable to

collect from the Harlem legislator. Tuesday, in Manhattan Criminal Court, she obtained a summons, signed by Judge Simon Silver, requiring Powell to show why he should not be charged with defrauding or hindering creditors by diverting his income, a violation of the penal code.

Silver said the summons could be served any time after 1 p.m. this Sunday, with the aid of police, if necessary.

Mrs. James' action concerned an article entitled "The Duties and Responsibilities of a Congressman," reported to have been purchased by Esquire magazine for \$1,000 for publication in the September issue.

Mrs. James' attorney said the magazine sent the check for \$1,000 to Powell's literary agent, who, after deducting a 10 per cent commission, sent the balance of the payment to Powell's wife. This was done at Powell's instructions, according to the court papers.

Mrs. James said this constituted a diversion of funds that could have been used to defray the libel judgment. If convicted of the misdemeanor charge, Powell could be sentenced to one year in jail, a \$500 fine, or both.

Flames Destroy Shed, Contents

Fire gutted a 12x14-foot shed near a dwelling occupied by Leonard Young, Reeder Road, about 6 p.m., Tuesday, the Klamath County Fire Department has reported. The fire was one of four, including three grass fires, reported in the Klamath Falls area the same day.

The razed building had been a milk cooling room but was being used as a storage shed at the time of the fire. The contents of the shed were destroyed and included a davenport, overstuffed chair, camping equipment and a number of other items, firemen said. They were unable to determine the cause of the fire. Lyle W. Coppege, 3425 Summers Lane, is the owner of the property.

The three grass fires broke out on as many vacant lots at various times Tuesday and were extinguished by the Klamath Falls Fire Department. The times and locations of the fires were: 8:17 p.m., 410 Old Fort Road; 11:03 p.m., 630 North Eighth Street, and 10:30 a.m., 634 North Eighth Street. The latter fire started when a strong wind blew flames from controlled burning on a hillside onto a nearby vacant lot.

None of the grass fires caused any damage, firemen said.

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
