

Japan Boosts Red Chinese Trade Despite Disapproval Of America

TOKYO (UPI) — Freighters flying the Rising Sun flag glide daily out of Japan's harbors into the blue Pacific — headed for Communist China.

Stowed in their holds are economic vitamins that China, big but industrially flabby, needs to harden her bones and strengthen her muscles.

At ports like Shanghai and Tientsin, the Japanese ships unload fertilizer for Red China's communal farms and steel for her tractor factories.

And there are insecticides to protect the crops that the Chinese Communists desperately need to feed their people.

Returning to Japan, the freighters carry Red Chinese coal, pig iron and soybeans. All of these Japan could buy — albeit at higher prices — in the non-Communist world.

Strengthen Bully The United States doesn't like it. U. S. policy is that anybody who trades with China is strengthening a menacing international bully.

"Americans feel that it is incongruous to trade with a country of such unstable behavior as Communist China," says a State Department spokesman.

But the fact is that the United States has encountered a great deal of difficulty in selling its goods to Communist China.

He adds that there are no signs that the American viewpoint is going to change.

A questioner asks him how China, industrially backward and still in the infancy of atomic research, can be regarded as a threat to the United States.

"Great powers don't get powerful overnight," is the answer. "It's a slow process of accretion, of adding little increments of power here and there. If you're going to get tough with them, the time to do it is in the beginning."

American diplomats in Tokyo have not hesitated to make the U. S. view on Red China trade known to the Japanese public.

But so far, the United States has made no move to apply the economic pressure that it obviously could put on Prime Minister Hayato Ikeda's government.

One reason is that when the Japanese freighters dock in China, they have a lot of company.

A cargo ship from Yokohama may well be found sharing a Shanghai pier with a merchantman from Norway, Britain, France or West Germany.

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RR Reports Eight Fires

MOUNT SHASTA — There have been eight railroad fires caused by the Sacramento district of the Shasta Trinity National Forest within the last week, according to Bob Gray, fire control officer.

All have been controlled by railroad and forest service crews with less than an acre lost to each fire. Air tanker planes were required Saturday to control a railroad fire caused by a locomotive in the Sacramento Canyon, five miles north of Dunsmuir. The fire was limited to six-tenths of an acre.

Gray said railroad crews are currently clearing existing fire breaks, but hot brake shoe flakes and burning particles of carbon from diesel engines continue to create a hazard.

Of the 36 fires reported on the Sacramento district this season, 17 have been fires along railroad right-of-way, three lightning fires, six incendiary fires, four careless smoker fires, three hobo fires, and three fires attributed to children playing with matches.

Less than 100 acres of national forest has burned within the district so far this year, Gray said, but the fire danger increases sharply in the next two months.

He attributed the small losses to prompt action by suppression crews but warned that if several fires occur at once, control becomes increasingly difficult.

"We can't always keep them little," Gray warned.
