Whites Stage Rock-Throwing Riot Protesting Negro Integration Act

Hundreds of rock-throwing whites staged Chicago's worst racial outbreak in several years early today in front of the apartment building where a Negro family had moved into a previously all-white neighborhood.

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The area was blocked off, taverns closed and extra police summoned. The FBI and 5th Army Headquarters were alerted. There was fear the outbreak would spread to other parts of Chicago's South Side where most of the city's 800,000 Negroes live.

Officers arrested at least 37 persons during the melee in which four policemen were hurt. Two Negro boys were knocked off their bicycles and beaten.

It was the third night of demonstrations outside an apartment building into which the Negro families recently had moved. The Negro section begins about one block south of the building, located in a white working class neighborhood.

Violence also erupted briefly at two other racial demonstrations in the nation Wednesday but police quickly restored order in both instances.

Civil rights pickets at a construction project in Brooklyn, N.Y., clashed with police who formed a solid line and backed the demonstrators off a street. One Negro was arrested during the melee.

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Ward Gets Iron Lung Treatment As Doctors Fight To Save Life

LONDON (UPI) — Dr. Stephen Ward, 50, underwent an operation, developed bronchial pneumonia and was placed in an iron lung respirator today by doctors fighting to save his life.

The society osteopath was convicted on vice charges Wednesday only hours after he took an overdose of sleeping pills in an apparent suicide attempt to beat a jail sentence.

He was rushed to St. Stephen's Hospital and has been unconscious for almost two days, with his condition fast becoming worse. A hospital bulletin this morning said he was "grievously and critically ill" and had undergone a tracheotomy—an operation to help his breathing.

A second bulletin issued this afternoon said: "Dr. Ward's condition has deteriorated and he has had to be returned to mechanically controlled breathing."

W. Mayne Butcher, secretary of St. Stephen's, added that Ward also developed bronchial pneumonia.

Asked by reporters about Ward's chances of surviving the night, Butcher said: "I wouldn't like to comment on that. This condition has really deteriorated."

West Coast Airlines Reports New Schedule

Bob Moore, local West Coast Airlines manager, today announced a schedule change and new service in and out of Klamath Falls, effective Aug. 1. The new service added to the Klamath Falls schedule is an F-27 Prop-Jet, leaving Oakland at 12:50 p.m., San Francisco at 1:25 p.m., non-stop to Klamath Falls, arriving at 3 p.m.

This flight continues north at 3:05 p.m., with stops at Medford, Eugene, Portland and Seattle, arriving in Portland at 5:20 p.m. and Seattle at 6:43. The mid-afternoon flight will also connect at Klamath Falls with Flight 720, a DC-3 to Boise, via Lakeview and Burns. Flight 720 will depart Klamath Falls at 3:15 p.m., arriving in Boise at 5:41 p.m.

Other schedule changes include Flight 701, an F-27 Prop-Jet which will leave Klamath Falls at 11 a.m., stopping at Sacramento and arriving in San Francisco at 1:05 p.m. Flight 727, also southbound to Sacramento and San Francisco, will depart Klamath Falls at 9:05 p.m., arriving in San Francisco at 11:50 p.m.

There is no time change in the schedule of Flight 700, northbound, leaving Klamath Falls at 9:20 a.m. with stops at Medford, Eugene and Portland, arriving in Portland at 12 noon. Flight 734 will depart Klamath Falls at 7:35 p.m. northbound to Seattle with stops at Medford, Roseburg, North Bend, Portland and Olympia.

The new service, Moore said, will provide customers with a mid-afternoon departure out of Klamath Falls and enable them to be in Portland before the dinner hour and also to provide faster service between the Bay Area and Boise, via Klamath Falls. OSA Heads Oppose Tax Referral

Strong opposition to referring the Oregon tax program was expressed recently by the Oregon School Administrators, according to their state president, Ray Hunsaker, Klamath Falls superintendent of schools.

Declaring the referendum to be "harmful to the effective education of the children and youth of this state," the school superintendents recommended the referendum "be vigorously opposed, Hunsaker reported."

The action was taken during the association's final business meeting, Friday, July 19, on the University of Oregon campus.

The adopted resolution indicated five reasons for opposing the referral:

1. Recognition by the Oregon Legislature of the growing property tax burden in this state for support of public schools.
2. This tax program enacted by the Oregon Legislature is designed to lessen the property tax burden.
3. This tax program will help finance the education of Oregon's enlarged school population.
4. This tax program is threatened by a referendum which will cause great uncertainty.
5. Rejection of the tax program would disrupt Oregon's school program and substantially increase the property tax burden in the various school districts in Oregon.

Big Political Question Is Negro Vote Influence

One of the great political mysteries of the day is how effective the Negro voter registration drive will be between now and election day next year.

The registration campaign, while mostly undramatic, is being pushed with quiet determination. Following virtually all major racial demonstrations this year, it has been announced by Negro leaders that the program would continue in the form of voter registration.

Such an announcement was made in Birmingham, Ala., last May following demonstration of near riot proportions. Some of the results are beginning to come to light.

Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. who led the Birmingham civil rights drive, announced recently that 2,000 Negroes have been added to the voter rolls in six weeks, bringing the city's voting Negroes to about 14,000.

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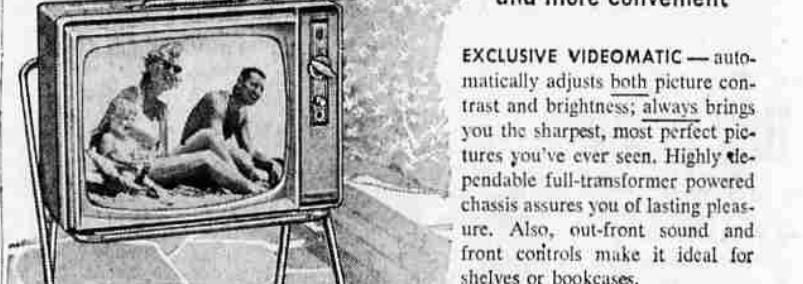

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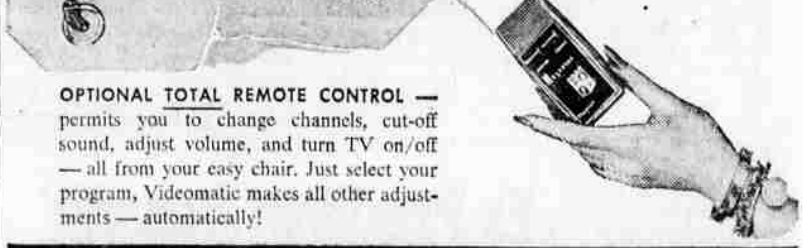
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
