Title Bout Move Seen

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) — The state athletic commissioner scheduled a conference today to discuss "alternative action" to keep the proposed Sonny Liston-Cassius Clay heavyweight title bout in Philadelphia.

Commissioner Alfred M. Klein called a meeting of the "parties involved" after a firm headed by Liston was denied a license to promote the fight here in late September.

The commission announced the action in Harrisburg Wednesday against Intercontinental Promotions, Inc., on ground that "no promoter may have an interest in a boxer" under Pennsylvania law.

But Klein explained later that the commission would "do whatever it may consider necessary" to keep the match in the Quaker City.

KF Squires Take Fifth

The Klamath Falls Columbian Squires traveled to Milwaukie, Ore., over last weekend to participate in the Oregon State Columbian Squires Softball Tournament.

Lack of depth and hitting spelled defeat to the Klamath nine in both their games. Their first defeat came at the hands of Gresham, which came through the tourney with no defeats to capture the state title. The final score was 17-2.

In the second game the local crew played a rougher type of ball but still were repelled by a rougher team from Woodburn, 8-4.

Highlight for the local nine was the placing of the first two pitchers on the All-State Team. They were, respectively, Jerrie Britton and Tom Schiff. Schiff threw for only two and two-thirds innings in a relief job and still was selected number two out of four pitchers.

Britton, chosen as top pitcher, pitched a total of nine and one-third innings. He fanned 13 batters, five against Gresham and eight against Woodburn. Other members of the squad were: Scott Rodakowski, George Florez, Ron Patsch, Dave Kenney, Bill Kenney, Terre McGregor and Timothy Britton.

The Los Angeles Dodgers were back in the "cat bird seat" today because the bubble burst for the San Francisco Giants and poor Roger Craig can't win for losing.

The Dodgers made the most of six hits Wednesday night to beat Craig and the New York Mets, 5-3, while the Philadelphia Phillies snapped the Giants' nine-game winning streak with a 14-inning 7-3 victory.

It was Craig's 17th straight defeat — one short of the National League record set by Clifton Curtis of the old Boston Braves in 1910.

A walk, a single by Ron Fairly, a triple by John Roseboro and a sacrifice fly by Willie Davis in the second inning accounted for three Los Angeles runs and two more singles, an error by New York second baseman Ron Hunt plus a wild pitch by Craig scored two more in the fourth inning.

That proved more than enough as Pete Richert, Ken Rowe and Ron Ferrarowski held the Mets off to nail down the victory.

Combined with the Giants' loss to the Phils, it restored the Dodgers' first-place lead to 4 1/2 games.

Marichal Knocked Out
Juan Marichal was cruising along with a 3-0 lead when the Phils scored a run in the eighth and then chased him with two more in the ninth.

In the 14th the roof fell in for the Giants. Bob Oldis led off with a single off reliever Bob Bolin and Don Hoak reached first when Ed Bailey was charged with obstruction on a sacrifice bunt. Earl Averill grounded to Bolin who threw wildly past third, permitting two runs to score and then Johnny Callison unloaded a two-run homer to wrap it up.

The third-place Cardinals also lost ground, slipping to five games off the pace, when they dropped a 9-2 decision to the Cincinnati Reds.

In the other NL games, the Pittsburgh Pirates beat the Houston Colts, 6-3, and the Chicago Cubs nipped the Milwaukee Braves, 3-2.

In the American League, the New York Yankees beat the Kansas City A's, 3-2, the Minnesota Twins downed the Boston Red Sox, 9-5, the Chicago White Sox subdued the Washington Senators, 5-2, the Baltimore Orioles nipped the Detroit Tigers, 2-1, and the Cleveland Indians swept the Los Angeles Angels, 1-0 and 9-5.

O'Toole Won 14th
Jim O'Toole spaced seven hits in gaining his 14th victory against nine defeats. The Reds made it easy for him to snap a personal six-game losing streak by hopping on Bob Gibson for six runs in the first three innings. Pete Rose, Frank Robinson and Marty Keough each had two RBIs for Cincinnati.

Pinch hitter Manny Mota's two-run single capped a four-run seventh inning rally that enabled the Pirates to come from behind and beat the Colts. Bob Friend, with help from ElRoy Face, gained his 12th victory against nine losses for Pittsburgh. Reliever Hal Woodeshick (8-6) took the loss.

Ron Santo drove in three runs with a third-inning home run and a ninth-inning sacrifice fly to account for all the Cubs' runs.

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
