The group was traveling to Grimes, Calif., to visit with the grandmother of the two sisters. According to the sheriff's office, Mrs. Freese had just pulled out of a service station in Williams when she ran into the locomotive on a Southern Pacific freight train at a near-by crossing.

New Trial Ordered For William Unsworth

A new trial for William Edward Unsworth, 54, convicted of second degree murder by a Klamath County Circuit Court jury June 11, 1962, has been ordered by the Oregon State Supreme Court following an appeal of that case, the Herald and News learned yesterday.

Unsworth, charged with the gun slaying of Tony Moore, a farm laborer, during a drinking party at his Beatty shack in April, 1962, had pled not guilty to the murder by reason of insanity.

The Supreme Court ruled for the mistrial on the grounds that some of the testimony offered by three psychiatrists who examined Unsworth before his trial was hearsay.

One of the three said Unsworth couldn't tell right from wrong and found that his mental condition made him unable to assist in his own defense. The other two were of the opposite view; however, only two of the psychiatrists testified at the trial.

One said the defendant was incompetent and the other disputed that opinion. Both doctors testified that the third psychiatrist had said Unsworth was able to tell right from wrong.

The Supreme Court ruled that it was an error to allow the findings of the third doctor because he wasn't present and it was hearsay evidence.

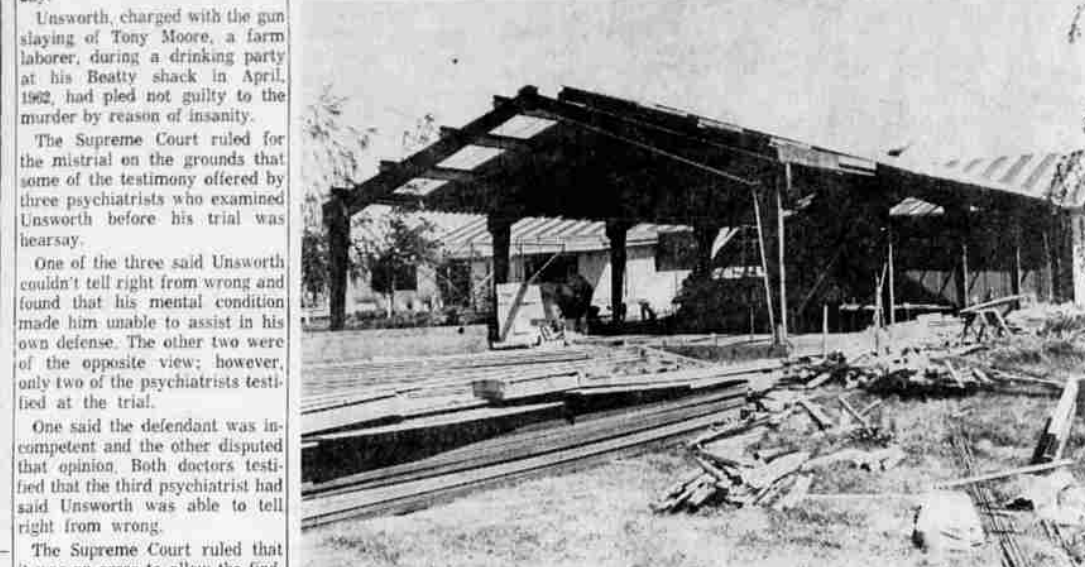
Two points of view relating to the incident which caused Moore's death were presented during the trial.

The first was offered by law enforcement officers who stated that Unsworth had thrust a hunting rifle in the stomach of Moore, seated in the Beatty cabin, and discharged it. The bullet passed through Moore's body, a chair back, and spent itself in a wall.

The other version was that of the defendant who said the shooting was accidental. In a statement submitted to the district attorney.

County Court Postpones Deadline On School Map

The Klamath County Court last month requested of the three county school boards that they submit maps dividing the county into two separate unified school districts for school reorganization purposes.

The school superintendents and committees from the separate boards have met several times in an attempt to reach agreement.

In a statement from the court pertaining to their map request the board court said:

"On June 14 the county court wrote to all three school districts in Klamath County soliciting their cooperation in preparing a map showing a division of the county into two unified school districts. We asked that these maps be submitted to the court by Aug. 1.

"We have assurances from both superintendents of the school districts that substantial progress is being made to this end. However, they think it unlikely that a map can be presented before Aug. 9.

"The county court has therefore postponed its consideration of action under Senate Bill No. 237 until that time."

Car-Horse Crash Told

BLY—Deputy Sheriffs Jack Hutton and Jim Conroy were called to Beatty Monday night at 10 p.m. to investigate a car and horse collision.

According to their reports, the accident occurred when a car carrying Mr. and Mrs. Patrick Mathers of Klamath Falls struck a prize roping horse, owned by Miller Anderson of Beatty, on Highway 66, one-fourth mile east of Beatty.

The occupants of the car were not injured but the car was badly damaged. The horse, although able to walk, suffered deep cuts and bruises.

Juvenile Held

A 15-year-old juvenile who was taken into custody by the Albany Police Department admitted breaking into a machine shop owned by Merrill Mayor Lawrence Geraghty over the weekend.

The value of the tools was unknown, but they have been returned to Geraghty. During questioning the youth also admitted breaking into a house in Klamath Falls and taking an electric razor and high school ring. This theft apparently hasn't been reported.

The youth will be held in Albany for Klamath County juvenile authorities.
