Thunderstorms Strike Plains

Thunderstorms struck the Great Plains today and the south-central part of the nation simmered in abnormal heat.

Nearly an inch of rain fell at Aberdeen, S.D., and lesser amounts were reported eastward across the Mississippi Valley. The Weather Bureau said up to 8 inches fell in parts of North Dakota Thursday.

A funnel cloud was sighted near New York City's LaGuardia Airport Thursday but apparently did not touch ground. An electrical storm at Omaha, Neb., touched off a fire which destroyed a Christian Science Church. No injuries were reported.

The Navy picket ship USS Galahad, which searched for the stricken vessel Thursday, reported by radio that "when last sighted by the USS Razorback, Freedom II was down by six feet at the bow."

The yacht was abandoned about 600 miles off the California coast while en route to San Diego from Honolulu under the command of retired Vice Adm. Gerald Bogan, one-time commander of the U.S. First Task Force.

The Navy identified other members of the Freedom II's crew as William Pratt, R.W. Prouty, T.G. Reeves, W.J. Tapert, R.C. Groves and D.A. Meek. No home addresses were immediately available.

Seven Men Face Query On Abandoning Yacht

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Seven men, with the answer to why they abandoned a \$250,000 luxury yacht in the Pacific, were aboard a Navy submarine today somewhere off the Southern California coast.

They include a retired admiral and six crewmen, who left the 104-foot motor yacht Freedom II on the high sea southwest of here Wednesday for the doubtful safety of a 14-foot outboard motorboat.

Their reasons for leaving the yacht were not expected to be revealed until late Saturday night when they arrive in San Diego aboard the submarine USS Razorback, which plucked them from the ocean shortly before midnight Wednesday.

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Ward Hovers Near Death As Girl Friend Promises New Exposés

LONDON (UPI)—Dr. Stephen Ward hovered near death today, still in a coma 48 hours after he took an overdose of sleeping pills in an apparent suicide attempt.

The 50-year-old society osteopath, convicted of vice charges by a Criminal Court jury Wednesday, was being kept alive only by an electronic lung in St. Stephen's Hospital.

A hospital spokesman said Ward, who tried to kill himself just a few hours before the jury found him guilty, is "critically ill."

As Ward moved toward death, the last of his many girl friends vowed to make public the names of his many former friends who deserted him at his trial.

Ward's 22-year-old girl friend, singer Julia Gulliver, charged in a London newspaper interview that many of Ward's former friends would like to see him die.

She said she will name a "whole crowd" of these people, who she said let Ward down when he needed them. She did not identify any of them.

W. Mayne Butcher, spokesman for the hospital where Ward lies in a guarded room, said at 10:30 a.m. (5:30 a.m. EDT):

Condition Unchanged

"We are not providing you with a bulletin this morning because once more the patient's condition is quite unchanged, exactly the same as last night at 10 o'clock."

At that time, doctors were despairing for Ward's life.

"He is very critically ill," Butcher added. "I would say that we can conclude that anxiety increases as he remains in this deep coma."

Ward has been unconscious since he was discovered in the

apartment of a friend Wednesday morning, blue-faced and with saliva flecking his mouth.

That was a few hours before the court convened and the jury of 11 men and one woman found him guilty of vice charges that could bring him 14 years in prison if he survives.

Ward does not know of his conviction. He is being kept alive by

means of a Barnett ventilator, a so-called electronic lung, which does his breathing for him. It was put on after Ward was found to have bronchial pneumonia Thursday.

Found Guilty

Ward was found guilty of living off the immoral earnings of call girls Christine Keeler, 22, and Mandy Rice-Davies, 18. He

will be sentenced if and when he recovers.

Ward's introduction of Christine to War Minister John Profumo and the Soviet naval attaché, Capt. Eugene Ivanov, cost Profumo his job and nearly brought down the government of Prime Minister Harold Macmillan.

Ward also introduced the girls to Lord Astor, millionaire news-

paper proprietor and head of one of Britain's first families. Mandy claimed in court she slept with Astor and with Douglas Fairbanks Jr., the actor-businessman. Both denied it out of court but neither testified.

Ward told a reporter the night before he took the drugs that his friends, "crucified me" by not speaking up at the trial.

Violence Continues For Fourth Day In Chicago Neighborhood Protests

Violence erupted early today for the fourth consecutive day in Chicago's explosive South Side neighborhood.

At least 24 persons were injured by flying bricks, stones and bottles during the protest against the Negro occupancy of apartments in a predominantly white neighborhood.

A 100-man police task force arrested eight demonstrators and hauled a number of others away in paddy wagons. The incidents brought the number of arrests to 133 in Chicago's worst racial demonstration in two years.

At New York, four Negroes attacked a policeman near a civil rights demonstration at a Brooklyn construction site. They were arrested, along with seven demonstrators who tried to enter Gov.

Nelson Rockefeller's New York City office to join a sit-in protest against alleged job discrimination.

Eighty-seven businessmen at Charleston, S.C., Thursday said they would publicly accept a six-point desegregation program, and Negro leaders called a halt to demonstrations on King Street.

The suburban Los Angeles city of Torrance Thursday sought an injunction against live organizations and more than 100 persons, including several movie stars, to prevent mass racial picketing at a housing tract.

Other developments:

Columbia, S.C. — The University of South Carolina Thursday formally accepted Negro Robert G. Anderson's application for admission to the fall term. The university has not had a Negro student since reconstruction.

Montgomery, Ala. — Atty. Gen. Richmond Flowers said he will file a motion within 20 days to dismiss a Justice Department suit charging voter discrimination by the Jefferson County Board of Registration.

Winston-Salem, N.C. — About 200 Negroes marched again Thursday night on the Forsyth County jail at Winston-Salem to serenade more than 40 demonstrators who have been arrested so far this week during protest marches on two all-white K&W cafeterias.

Jackson, Miss. — A judge is scheduled to decide after an Aug. 19 hearing whether to order Byron De La Beckwith removed from the nearby state mental hospital. Attorneys for Beckwith, who is charged with murdering Negro leader Medgar Evers, claim his hospitalization for a lengthy psychiatric examination violates several of his constitutional rights, including the right to a speedy trial.

Clarksdale, Miss. — Anti-segregation protests were expected for the fourth straight day here as demonstrators, convicted for parading without a permit made plans to appeal to a higher court. Police arrested 14 Negro demonstrators Thursday only hours after city Judge Edward P. Connel convicted 33 others.

Birmingham, Ala. — A Birmingham federal judge, claiming the absence of a "federal question" Thursday declined to assume jurisdiction of a circuit court injunction against mass demonstrations in Gadsden.
