

Klamath All-Stars Win State Babe Ruth Title

Tangle With Canadian Entry At Kellogg Tuesday At 6 P.M.

THE DALLES — The Klamath National All-Stars Sunday hardly had time to think about their newly-acquired Oregon State Babe Ruth championship because they left The Dalles, the site of the state tournament, for Kellogg, Idaho, and the regional championships.

The Nationals will take on the Canadian team from British Columbia Tuesday night at 6 o'clock in the first round of the regional. Other teams in the regional are hosts Kellogg, the state of Idaho team, Wyoming, Alaska, Washington, Montana and Klamath and foe.

The Nationals, All-Stars from the Klamath Basin Babe Ruth League, won the state championship Sunday afternoon by downing a good Jefferson of Portland team, 5-3, for the state title.

It was the fourth straight win in the state tournament for the National All-Stars and the ninth in succession since they were formed prior to the District One Tournament in Klamath.

The Nationals rode to the victory on the strong right arm of Bob Moore who won his second game in the state tourney. He beat Jefferson in the first round game, 7-6, after an amazing comeback by the Nationals in the last inning.

There was, however, none of that waiting around Sunday to come back to win. The Nationals jumped right off to gather four of their five runs in the second inning, an inning they seem to like for scoring. Moore went the entire route and gave up only five hits in winning. He walked only one batter the whole game and struck out only four. He had some good backing, at times, by the Nationals. Some errors, however, accounted for a part of the three runs scored by Jefferson.

Moore got some fine hitting behind him as the Nationals pounded two Jefferson hurlers for 10 hits, some of them coming when most surely needed.

Dick-Gene Title Fight Tops Slate

NEW YORK (UPI)—Champion Dick Tiger and ex-Champ Gene Fullmer will have their third middleweight title fight Saturday night at Madison Square Garden, the week's most important boxing show.

Also on Saturday night, welterweight champion Emile Griffith sees action, but in a non-title nationally televised 10-rounder with veteran Holly Mims, a middleweight contender, at Saratoga Springs, N.Y.

For Nigeria's first world championship fight, stocky Tiger of Nigeria is favored at 7-2 to beat bull-shouldered Fullmer of West Jordan, Utah, before a sellout 45,000 at Madison Square Garden.

In their two previous title bouts Tiger won the 160-pound crown from Gene on a decision at San Francisco, Calif., last Oct. 23; but the Tiger was hard-pressed to keep the title on a draw at Las Vegas, Nev., last Feb. 23.

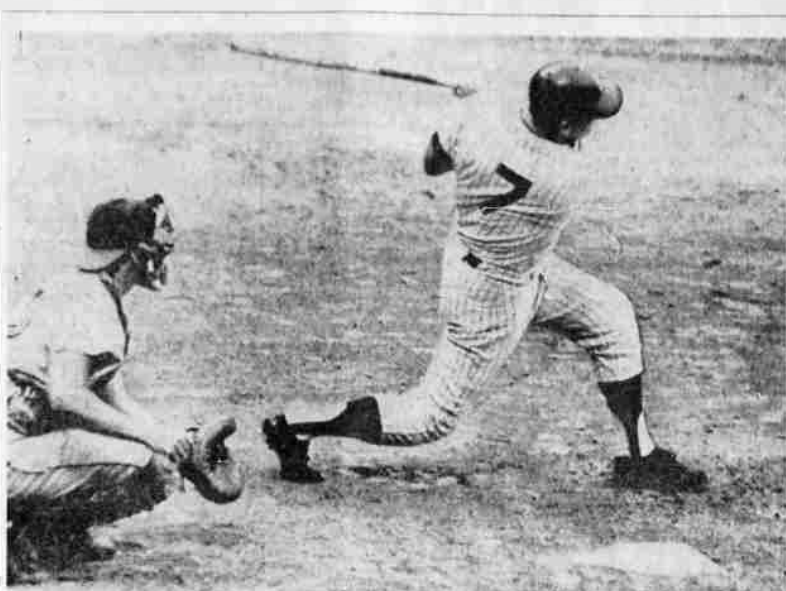
For the Griffith-Mims television (ABC) bout at Saratoga Springs, New York, Griffith, king of the 147-pounders, is favored at 11-5 to whip the 34-year-old contender among the 160-pounders.

Pads Find Homers Help Win Games

Baseball old-timers insist Babe Ruth had more magnetism and Joe DiMaggio had a bit more poise, yet Mickey Mantle possesses the same flair for the dramatic that marked the careers of his New York Yankee predecessors.

You'd have to go back to the Babe and the DiMag to compare the ovation Mantle received from 38,355 fans at Yankee Stadium Sunday when he made his first appearance in two months as a pinch hitter in the second game of a doubleheader against the Baltimore Orioles.

The applause reached a deafening crescendo seconds later when Mighty Mickey, after looking at a called first strike, blasted a slider by Baltimore southpaw George Brunet into the left field stands to tie the score at 10-10 in the seventh inning.

The Yankees went on to win the game, 11-10, in the 10th on a pinch sacrifice fly by Yogi Berra and gain a split of the twin bill. The Orioles won the opener, 7-2, on homers by John Powell, John Orsino and pitcher Steve Barber.

Barber homered in the first and Powell connected in the sixth off Ralph Terry to give the Orioles a 4-2 lead. Orsino hit his homer in the eighth off Tom Metcalfe, making his first major league appearance. Dick Hall pitched 2-1/3 hitless innings to preserve Barber's 18th victory.

The Chicago White Sox remained second in the American League race, 7 1/2 games back of the Yankees, by blasting the Los Angeles Angels, 8-1; Kansas City downed Minnesota, 6-2; Washington belted Boston, 7-5; and Cleveland edged Detroit, 3-2, after losing the opener, 2-0.

Hall Of Fame To Induct Sam Rice, Elmer Flick

COOPERSTOWN, N.Y. (UPI)—but is remembered—much to his Former outfielders Sam Rice and Elmer Flick, who long ago despaired of achieving baseball's highest honor, will be formally inducted into the Hall of Fame today along with the late Eppa Rixey and John Clarkson.

A capacity crowd of 9,700, including Commissioner Ford Frick and many other baseball dignitaries, will be on hand for the ceremonies which will be held before an exhibition game between the Boston Red Sox and Milwaukee Braves. The game will be played at Abner Doubleday Field, where the game's mythologists claim baseball was invented in 1839.

Rice, 71, collected 2,987 hits and compiled a lifetime batting average of .322 for 19 seasons with the Washington Senators while Elmer Flick, 67, had a .315 career average playing for the Philadelphia Phillies, Philadelphia Athletics and Cleveland Indians from 1898 to 1910. Flick batted over 300 nine times during that span in the United States.
