The National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) has a file cabinet full of proof that the minds of America's children, uncluttered by physical laws and fiscal budgets, display a genius for the imaginative.

Youngsters have carried into the space age their penchant for helping their elders spend money. Uninhibited by worries about income tax 1040 and the like, they bombarded NASA with scores of letters monthly suggesting ways to improve and often speed up the use of that \$35 million America has committed to conquering the moon.

Suggests Ramp

Sometimes, the letters are in the form of helpful suggestions, such as the one from Harry B. of Prescott, Ariz.

Solons Urge New Wheat Law Action

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Twenty Republican congressmen urged President Kennedy Saturday to mount a bipartisan effort in Congress for new wheat legislation.

The legislators said the administration's farm program for 1964 would "add to the possibility of the ominous prospects of '\$1.00 wheat,' mentioned frequently by the secretary of agriculture (Orville L. Freeman)." The Republicans told Mr. Kennedy in a letter that they have introduced legislation for a voluntary land retirement program that would raise farm income, reduce government-held stocks of surplus grains and cut government costs.

The lawmakers said the choices given the nation's wheat farmers in the May 21 referendum were "unacceptable."

More than half of the farmers rejected new and tighter federal production controls for their 1964 crop. The vote eliminated over-all controls on wheat production and provided price supports of less than \$1.30 a bushel only for farmers who voluntarily restrict production.

The congressmen said this left the farmers with a program which had been rejected by them 12 times in previous referendums.

JFK Refuses To Predict Baby's Sex

HYANNIS PORT, Mass. (UPI)—President Kennedy refused today to take a public stand on one of the most important questions before him: Will his wife's baby this month be a boy or girl?

In 1960, two months prior to the birth of their son John Jr., Kennedy boldly predicted they would have a boy.

Newsmen had asked in Washington several days ago whether the President was making any forecasts about their third child, and the query was repeated at the weekend White House where there was nothing much else to ask.

White House Press Secretary, Pierre Salinger, smiling, said he had taken the matter up with the President, and the spokesman asserted:

"He is going to confine himself to such predictions in election years."

"Does this mean there is going to be another baby next year?" a reporter asked.

"You can read anything into that you want," Salinger replied.

During a whistle-stop train tour from Northern to Southern California in September, 1960, Kennedy predicted his daughter Caroline would be getting a baby brother.

Wrong Spot For King

If you don't approve of the bidding of today's hand you won't have an argument from me. The hand was constructed by Jose Le Dentu, a French writer as a problem in play.

Of course, if West opens a spade there is no problem in play, but West opens the six of trumps.

At this point South can make the hand against any defense and I will devote tomorrow's article to this double dummy play, but the first problem is to find out the best line of play if you are actually at the table playing the hand normally.

If East holds the king of clubs you can make 12 tricks easily, so the normal play is to lead dummy's ace of clubs and continue with the queen. Unfortunately for your purposes East plays low.

You discard and West wins the trick with the king. Now if he leads a spade you go down two, but you have worked out a neat bit of camouflage. Your discard on the queen of clubs was the nine of diamonds, West is pretty sure that his partner holds an ace. It now appears that it is the ace of diamonds so he leads a diamond whereupon you take the rest of the tricks because you can discard two spades on clubs and one spade on the king of diamonds.
