Wed Plans Canceled By Actress

HOLLYWOOD (UPI)—Actress June Allyson announced and canceled marriage plans within 12 hours this weekend, but later indicated she still plans to marry as soon as legal matters are straightened out.

Miss Allyson, 39, widow of Dick Powell, said she had planned to marry Glenn Maxwell, 35, a New York City attorney, in a ceremony attended by her daughter, Pam, 14, and son, Ricky, 13.

The blonde actress told United Press International Saturday that "Glenn and I had planned to be married today but we've called it off. Probably indefinitely."

Miss Allyson went for a few moments and added, "I would like to announce some happiness but sometimes it seems I never will."

But later she said she and her attorney, Bill Cruikshank, discussed the impending marriage. She said her funds "are naturally tied up in the estate of my late husband Dick Powell," who died of cancer last Jan. 2.

"Bill tells me that if I marry right now, I will lose my widow's allowance from the estate ... it would be silly not to postpone it for a while due to these legal complications," she said.

The attorney said, "We will get these matters straightened out as soon as we can and then she can go ahead with her plans."

Flames Destroy \$450,000 Mill

OTHELLO, Wash. (UPI)—Fire destroyed a grain and feed building complex in downtown Othello early Sunday. Newell Anderson, owner of the buildings, estimated the loss at \$450,000.

Destroyed in the blaze were a grain elevator, potato packing shed, feed store and office. The elevator contained about 200,000 bushels of grain, mostly barley.

A similar group of buildings owned by Anderson on the same site was destroyed in June, 1961, and he later rebuilt them.

Anderson said it appeared that the fire had broken out in two places. He said authorities are investigating the possibility of arson.

State Traffic Accidents Take 9 Lives On Weekend

Nine persons died in Oregon during the weekend as a result of traffic accidents.

Benjamin Phillips, 23, Independence, was killed late Sunday night when his motor scooter failed to negotiate a turn five miles south of Salem on Highway 2.

A passenger, Kenneth Moye, 27, also Independence, suffered a fractured leg.

James McCoy, 31, Florence, lost his life when his car ran off a Douglas County road into Loon Lake east of Reedsport Sunday afternoon.

Mrs. Delia Wheeler, 59, Vancouver, Wash., was killed in a one-car accident on U.S. Highway 26 about 20 miles southeast of Seaside Sunday morning.

Lee Clark, 48, Talent, was killed when his car collided with a semi-truck and trailer near Ashland early Saturday.

An unidentified man who was injured in a one-car accident in Northern California Friday night died in Oregon Saturday. The man died in an ambulance en route to a Medford hospital. He was taken to a hospital at Klamath Falls following the accident. John Janssen of Corning, Calif., was killed in the one-car crash on U.S. Highway 97 about 25 miles south of Dorris, Calif.

Police arrested 35 youths for disorderly conduct and the other teen-agers dispersed. There were demonstrations by white crowds most of last week in a predominantly white neighborhood of South Chicago into which several Negro families had moved.

Three thousand Negroes marched through downtown Indianapolis, Ind., Sunday in support of President Kennedy's civil rights program. There were no incidents.

More than 200 Negroes Sunday held a prayer vigil outside a Gadsden, Ala., jail where hundreds of Negroes, arrested during a demonstration Saturday, being held. More than 600 demonstrators were arrested Saturday but many women and all children were released.

Other developments:
Nashville, Tenn. — Two previously segregated high schools were to open their doors today to sixteen Negroes. The action in both cases is strictly voluntary, but results from the fact there are no Negro high schools in the area.

Farmville, Va. — Negroes ended a daily series of racial protests in their Price Edward County town Sunday but demonstrations were expected to resume today.

Clarksdale, Miss. — Aaron Henry, Negro civil rights leader jailed for participating in an anti-segregation demonstration, was free on an appeal bond Sunday after spending six days in jail.

Montgomery, Ala. — Three Negro women will be hired by the police department to supervise traffic at crossings near Negro schools. Commissioner Lester B. Sullivan said the women would be chosen from a group of 25 who took examinations last week.

New York — The Social Action Council of the United Church of Christ urged 15,000 ministers and lay leaders Sunday to participate in the scheduled mass civil rights demonstration in Washington Aug. 28.

San Francisco (UPI)—Private funeral services were held Sunday for James D. Zellerbach, 71, former U. S. ambassador to Italy and head of one of the world's largest paper products manufacturing firms.

Zellerbach, prominent San Francisco philanthropist and chairman of the board of the Crown-Zellerbach Corp., died of a brain tumor Saturday at Mount Zion Hospital where he had undergone an exploratory operation Friday night.

President Kennedy praised the industrialist as "a distinguished American who served his country in a great variety of ways."

"As an industrialist, a diplomat, a community leader and a philanthropist, he gave the best of himself to his fellow citizens," the President said.

Zellerbach was born in San Francisco, graduated from the University of California in 1913, and became president of Crown-Zellerbach, a major producer of newsprint, in 1933.

He supervised the administration of the Marshall Plan in Italy from 1948 to 1950 and served as ambassador to that country from 1956 to 1960.

Long active in San Francisco social and cultural affairs, Zellerbach also served as an alternate U.S. delegate to the United Nations in 1953 and was a member of the Bilderberg Conferences, an annual gathering of European and American leaders aimed at facilitating cooperation between the two continents.

Democrat Chieftains Plan For State Victory In 1964

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (UPI)—

Although the election is more than a year away, President John F. Kennedy and other Democratic party chieftains are looking with a wishful eye toward California.

Democrats want to see the nation's largest state in their column in November, 1964.

The Golden State, 32 Democratic in registration, gave Republican Richard M. Nixon its electoral college votes by a pencil-thin 35,000 in 1960. Then Nixon was defeated two years later by Democratic Gov. Edmund G. Brown by 300,000 in a bid for the state's top office.

With 1960 in the back of their minds, the Democratic leadership is beginning early to show California they care.

To prove it, they have scheduled what's touted as the largest onslaught of national figures ever to attend a state convention for next Saturday and Sunday.

Technically, the convention with about 1,500 delegates will be a meeting of the state central committee. But this technicality does not mean much. Everybody's invited to attend both.

"It's going to be a real hot and heavy planning session for the 1964 convention," said Eugene Wyman, Los Angeles attorney who was elected a year ago to a two year term as chairman of the state central committee.

"Probably at no time between now and the election will all the California leadership have a better chance to communicate with the national party leadership," he said.

The power-packed list of participants from the national level of Democratic politics will be headed by Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson and John Bailey, Democratic National Chairman.

Neither President Kennedy nor Governor Brown will be present but both are expected to send special messages urging the Democrats to get things started toward the 1964 presidential election.

Brown is in Europe on a combined vacation and business trip. "California is recognized as the one state that must be in the Democratic win column next year," said Wyman in an interview. "So we have invited the national leadership—and they have accepted. They realize it's important."

As an example, it was Brown who personally invited Johnson to attend. The Democratic congressional delegation also pitched in with a resolution urging the vice president to appear. He's supposed to make a "major policy" speech to the central committee Sunday morning.

Assembly Speaker Jesse M. Unruh of Inglewood, considered to be one of the state's most powerful Democrats, has been relegated to a relatively minor task. "My job is to acquire the vice president around," said Unruh.

At last year's convention, Unruh caused a flurry of excitement with a resolution calling upon the party to fire from its inner councils all extremists—both of the left and right. It failed to be adopted. But he claimed that he has nothing of a similar nature ready for this year.
