FORT KLAMATH—A Medford man, John Banks, 64, died Sunday in Klamath Valley Hospital from serious injuries in a construction accident Aug. 2 in Crater Lake National Park. The body will be sent to the Perle Funeral Home in Medford by Ward's Klamath Funeral Home.

The victim was employed as a flagman by the Aranz Construction Company of the Portland vicinity which is at work on 17 miles of highway from the southern boundary of the park to Annie Springs.

Equipment was being moved and it is believed that Banks attempted to board the back of a pickup driven by Jack Simington of Fort Klamath, and slipped and fell as the vehicle backed up. The man was thrown beneath the wheels which passed over his body. The driver was unaware of an accident because of nature of the terrain covered with logs and brush, until other workers saw the injured man on the ground.

A widow, Irene, of Medford and children survive.

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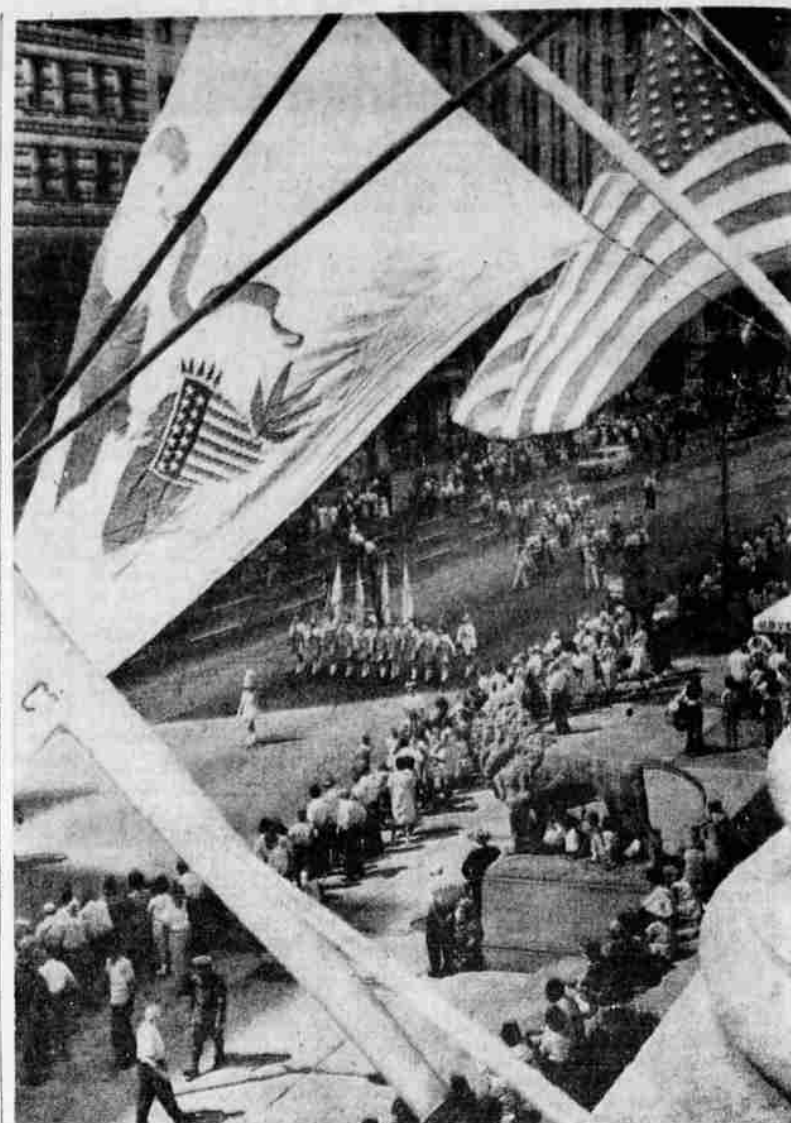
