Burnett Claims Butts Gave Away Grid Plays

ATLANTA (UPI)—Insurance man George Burnett, whose pencilled notes resulted in a Saturday Evening Post story alleging a rigged football game in the Southeast Conference, will resume testimony today in Wally Butts' \$10 million libel suit against the magazine.

Burnett testified Monday he overheard former Georgia athletic director Butts give away football plays to Alabama coach Paul (Bear) Bryant prior to the game between the schools last September.

The second day of the trial is scheduled to resume at 10 a.m. EST (11 a.m. EDT).

Burnett testified under questioning that he never said the game was compromised.

"Did you say the game was fixed?" Butts' attorney Gerald Schroder asked.

"No," Burnett replied.

"Did you say the game was rigged?"

"No."

Schroder asked Burnett if he had said the game was thrown, corrupt or a sell-out. The insurance man replied "no" to each question.

Burnett's testimony was the highlight of the trial that began Monday before federal Judge Lewis R. Morgan. A 12-man jury was empaneled to hear the case expected to last about two weeks.

Butts' suit was prompted by a Post story published March 22 which quoted Burnett as saying he was accidentally hooked into a telephone conversation in which he heard Butts divulge team secrets to Bryant in Tuscaloosa, Ala.

The Post article said the notes Burnett made on the conversation indicated the two men had

conspired to rig the game. Alabama, a 17-point favorite, won 35-0.

Bryant has a \$10 million libel suit pending against Post in a separate action.

During the trial Monday, Butts sat impassively a few feet away from the witness stand and kept his eyes fixed on Burnett.

"Coach Butts proceeded to give me plays that I was writing down," Burnett testified.

"At no time did Bryant mention anything about Alabama sat impassively a few feet away from the witness stand and kept his eyes fixed on Burnett."

The lone U.S. women's victory on the final day was recorded by Sharon Shepherd of Cleveland in the discus.

"I hope to reach 17 feet, four inches, or maybe even 17 feet, six inches by Olympic time next year," he said.

Pennel bustled his own world record Monday with a vault of 16 feet, 10 1/4 inches, which helped carry the United States Men's track and field team to a 120-91 victory over Britain in a dual meet. It was the fourth victory without defeat for the Yanks on their European tour.

However, the U.S. women, given a chance to win their first meet of the tour, fell apart on the final day against England and lost, 63 1/2-51 1/2. The British 40-yard relay team set a women's world record of 45.2 seconds.

Pennel extended the drama of his record attempt until his final jump before a receptive crowd of 30,000 in White City Stadium.

After failing on his first two attempts at 16-10 1/4, the 22-year-old Northeast Louisiana State student cleared the bar on his third try.

He then missed three attempts at 17 feet, 1/4 inch. Pennel's old mark of 16-8 1/4 was set here July 13 and equalled by him at Warsaw on July 26.

The U.S. men won six of the 10 events on the final day's program for a total of 13 in the two-day meet. An outstanding effort was turned in by Henry Carr of Arizona State University, who established a stadium record of 20.9 seconds in winning the 220-yard run.

Other Yank successes were turned in by Rex Cawley of Southern California in the 440-yard hurdles (51.4); Morgan Groth of Oregon State in the 800-yard run; Frank Covelli of Arizona State U.

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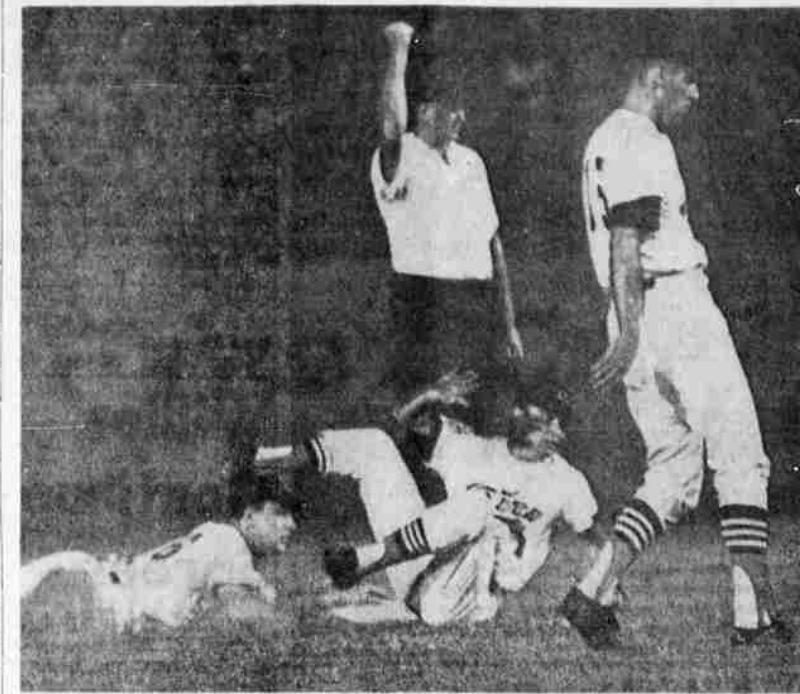

Warwick Sparks Colts Past SF Giants, 6-5

Many major leaguers who are traded come back to haunt their old club—but not Carl Warwick.

The only regular in the majors who bats right and throws left did his old Los Angeles Dodgers teammates a big favor Monday night when he sparked the Houston Colts to a 6-5 comeback victory over the San Francisco Giants.

It was a tough setback for the Giants, who had hoped to pick up ground on the idle Dodgers. Willie McCovey's 33rd home run of the season and went ahead in five games off the pace and into the top of the ninth on another

second-place tie with the St. Louis Cardinals.

Warwick, who broke into the majors with the Dodgers in 1961 before moving on to St. Louis and then Houston, knocked in the Colts' winning run with a line single that capped a two-run rally in the bottom of the ninth.

It was the third time the Colts had come from behind in the game — the only one scheduled in the majors Monday. The Giants had tied the score at four-all in the eighth with the help of Willie McCovey's 33rd home run of the season and went ahead in five games off the pace and into the top of the ninth on another

solo blast by Willie Mays, his 28th of the campaign.

Juan Marichal of the Giants and Houston's Don Nottbart—a pair of no-hit pitchers—dueled through the first seven innings but neither figured in the decision.

Hal Woodeshick, who relieved Nottbart in the eighth, gained his ninth victory against six defeats and Jack Fisher (6-8) was the loser.

The Dodgers resume their road trip today at Chicago, where they open a three-game set against the Cubs. Last season, Walt Alston's men lost only four of 18 games to Chicago. They haven't found the Cubs such pushovers this season, posting eight victories in 13 games.

The New York Yankees, riding along with a 7 1/2 game lead in the American League, open a two-week road trip tonight with a doubleheader against the Washington Senators. August was a bad month for the Yankees last season when their pitching collapsed and they finished the month with a 17-18 record.

Locals Enter Eliminations With Hopes Of Gaining Spot

KELLOGG, Idaho—The Klamath Falls National All-Stars, now wearing the proud crown of Oregon State Babe Ruth Champions, will attempt to further that title here as they take part in an eight-team double elimination tournament in the Regionals. The winner of this tournament goes to the Babe Ruth World Series in Farmington, N.M.

The Klamath team tonight will be meeting the Canadian team from British Columbia in its first game at 6:30. The other teams in this regional tournament include the host Kellogg, Idaho, team and the state Idaho team, Washington, Alaska, Wyoming and Montana.

Other games today will pit the Ketchikan, Alaska, team against Riverton, Wyo., in the first game at 1 p.m. Aberdeen, Wash., takes on Wallace, Idaho, at 2 p.m. Then comes the 6:30 Klamath game and the final game at 8:30 with Great Falls, Mont., and host Kellogg.

This will be the first time the Klamath team has reached the regionals since 1957 with a team which had Dave Saks as a team member. Saks is back this time as one of Bob Moore's coaches. Moore manages the team.

"We feel like we've got a good chance in this tournament," Moore said. "Oregon teams always have done very well in the tournament. Madison of Portland won it last year and went on to the finals of the Nationals before being beaten," he continued.

"We will play every day here I think," Moore said. "This is a double elimination tournament and it continues through Saturday," he stated.

Moore didn't know his starting pitcher but figured it would be either Bob Moore or Bob Williams. Williams likely will get the starting assignment because Moore tossed the Sunday game in The Dalles to win the state tiara. Williams and Moore got three of the four wins in the tournament at The Dalles with Mike North getting the other. The All-Stars are unbeaten in the eight games they have played together.

Other starting assignments probably will go to Rick Brosthouse at second, Dave Lyman at shortstop, Mike McNery at third, Arie DeGroot in left, Alan Mezger in center and Kim Badley in right. Williams will catch

if he doesn't pitch. Lyman will catch if Williams does pitch with Moore at short and Greg Brosthouse at first. Should Moore pitch, Greg will be at first. Other action on the team who should see action are Larry Robertson, Ken Pound, Steve Huettl, and Russ Smith.

The Nationals won the district title to gain the state berth by downing the West, 13-14, East 19-2, Cal-Ore 9-6, and the West again, 8-2. They beat Jefferson in the first game at state, 7-6, dropped Pendleton in the second game, 9-0, on Williams' no-hitter, trampled Myrtle Creek, 13-3, and edged Jefferson again in the finals, 5-3.

The game will not be broadcast in this area.
