

Homemakers Register For Week At Camp Low Echo

Homemakers are now registering for a relaxing week at Camp Low Echo on Lake of the Woods, according to Peggie Setzler, county extension agent. This year Homemakers Camp will be held Aug. 17-22 for all interested women. Registrations are being taken by Mrs. H. V. Borton and Mrs. Lee Holliday, camp committee

co-chairmen, and by the County Extension Office. A \$3 deposit is required at the time of registration. The balance of the camp fee will be collected as the camp opens. Total costs will be about \$15 each to cover food and rent of the campsite. The camp committee hopes many women will come and can bring friends.

This is the first time Homemakers Camp will be held at a rented campsite. The camp committee feels fortunate to get such a lovely and well-equipped place. It has a large sunny dining hall with twin fireplaces. Cooks have been hired to do all meal preparation and dishwashing. The campground has many small cab-

ins with beds and mattresses. You bring the bedding. Hot shower facilities are available too. Camp Low Echo is easily reached by Dead Indian Highway.

Many interesting activities are planned for the campers, says Miss Setzler. Mrs. Betty Cote, county librarian, will visit the camp Sunday, Aug. 18. She will bring new books and talk about them with the women. Planned craft activities include mosaics, cracked marble jewelry and a needlework hobby using yarn and burlap. Campers may participate in any or all of these crafts. Expenses for them will be low, so campers will need only a little pocket money.

Leisure time is also planned by the camp committee to allow for swimming, hiking, boating and other relaxing pastimes. The campers will have an opportunity for catching up on many of those things they've wanted to do but had to postpone — like long hours of sleep.

Evenings around the campfire will provide entertainment, singing and fun-making.

Women who are unable to attend for the entire camp are invited to come to Homemakers Camp on Tuesday, Aug. 22, and join in the day's activities. A tur-

key dinner will be served at 12 noon for \$1.25.

Registration for camp participation should be made by Aug. 12 so the food committee may purchase adequate supplies.

Stamps Honor Amelia Earhart

Air mail stamps honoring aviatrix Amelia Earhart are on sale at the Klamath Falls Post Office.

The eight-cent commemorative stamps went on sale July 25 here, the day after their introduction in Atchison, Kan., birthplace of Miss Earhart.

The stamps show the woman in her flying clothes with a Lockheed Electra airplane in the background. Miss Earhart disappeared in 1937 while flying across the Pacific Ocean.

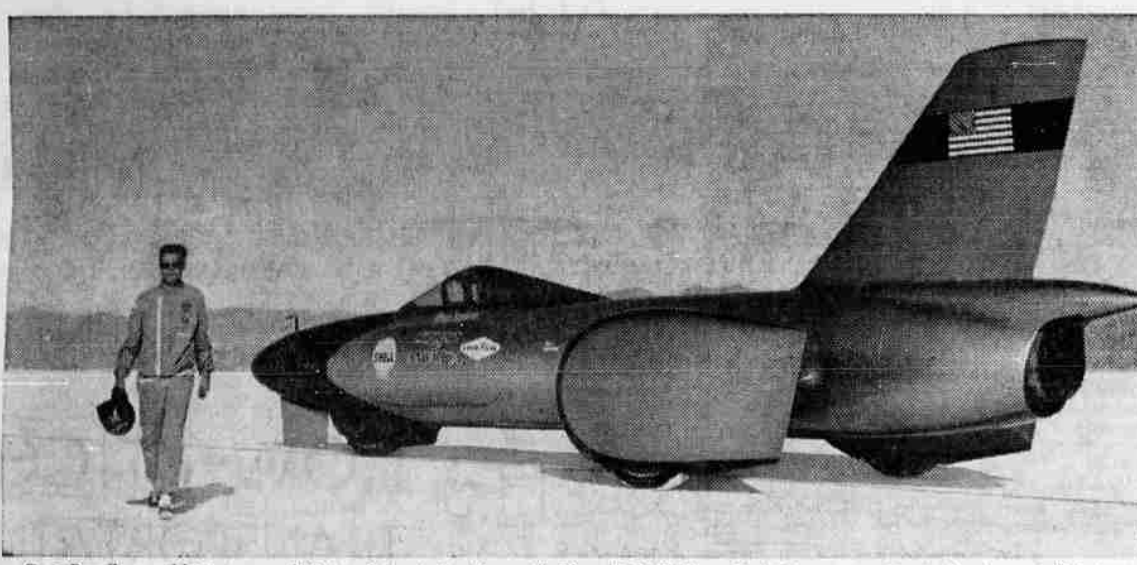

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CAR GOES 407 MPH
