

Desegregation Starts In Tennessee Schools

A second rural Tennessee school begins a program of voluntary desegregation today.

Five young Negroes, both boys and girls, are scheduled to attend Livingston Academy for the first time. Ten Negroes quietly began classes Monday at Clay County High School in Celina, Tenn., to inaugurate the South's first desegregation of the 1963-64 school year.

Schools in the neighboring Tennessee communities began classes early so students can leave school in the spring to pick strawberries.

At Chicago, a fourth Negro family moved into a racially-troubled South Side neighborhood Monday and police increased their vigil. In another part of the area Monday, integrationists picketed a mobile school site in a protest against alleged "de facto segregation."

Six demonstrators shackled themselves together with a chain and padlocks at New York Monday and blocked the gate to a hospital construction site for more than an hour until they were freed and arrested by police.

GOP Chief Unworried About 'Radical Right'

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—The chairman of the Republican party is not worried about the influence of the so-called "radical right" on his party.

William E. Miller, New York congressman, told a news conference Monday he is not worried about any party split next year.

"I do not know what the so-called ultra-right wing is," he said. "I do not know who it is. I do not know where it is."

"The Republican party is composed of the same kind of people it has always had and I see no evidence of its leadership falling into the hands of an ultra group of any kind or of being infiltrated by such a group," he continued.

Miller, here for a fast check on arrangements for next year's GOP convention, predicted that the Republicans could win the 1964 election if they get a "fair percentage" of the big city votes.

"We didn't just lose—we got clobbered in the big cities," he said. He suggested that the Republicans have "gained muscle" in metropolitan areas by setting up headquarters, pushing get-out-

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Pathologist Conducts Ward Tests

LONDON (UPI)—Dr. Donald Teare, the Home Office pathologist, conducted a post-mortem on the body of Dr. Stephen Ward today to determine officially what drug the playboy-osteopath used to commit suicide.

The operation lasted little more than a half-hour, but its results will not be made known until the official inquest into Ward's death. The inquest will be held Friday.

Meanwhile the British press continued to hammer away at the case which at one point threatened to topple the government of Prime Minister Harold Macmillan.

Ward, 50, died last Saturday from an overdose of barbiturates. He had swallowed the drugs the previous Wednesday, hours before an Old Bailey jury convicted him on two counts of living off the earnings of prostitutes.

Ward faced a maximum possible sentence of 14 years in jail. But he died without regaining consciousness, and never even knew he had been found guilty.

Ward left behind notes saying he was sorry to "disappoint the vultures" he felt were making him a scapegoat for the sex-and-security scandal still reverberating through Britain.

It was Ward, in his role as society osteopath and artist, who introduced former War Minister John Profumo to red-haired Christine Keeler, 21, Macmillan's government almost collapsed when Profumo admitted he had lied to the House of Commons about his relationship with the girl.

Miss Keeler said she had been having an affair with a Soviet naval attaché at the same time. The naval attaché, Eugene Ivanov, was recalled behind the Iron Curtain before the scandal broke.

Multnomah To Be Sold

PORTLAND, Ore. (UPI)—The Multnomah Hotel, long Oregon's biggest and best known, is for sale.

Bill Williams, manager of the 51-year-old hotel, said Western Hotels plans to keep the structure operating until it is sold. He said it could be a year before it closes its doors and then only "when and if a sale is imminent."

Williams said several groups were considering purchase of the hotel. He said it could become a retirement home or a permanent residency hotel.

Williams blamed the situation on overbuilding of hotels. He said in July the Multnomah had about 59 per cent of its nearly 500 rooms occupied, compared to 72 per cent last July. The desirable percentage is 75, he said.

Schools Continue Prayer, Bible Reading

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Prayer of education, Jesse Anderson, has publicly notified teachers of his state that they may "feel free" to continue classroom religious exercises.

A nationwide UPI check showed today that the court's June 17 ruling is being openly defied in some areas.

Woman Needs Resuscitator

A 21-year-old woman who couldn't catch her breath was taken to Hillside Hospital Monday night after being aided by a city fire department resuscitator.

South Defies Ruling
Defiance of the ruling has been especially forthright in Southern states, where no politician stands to lose many votes by attacking the Supreme Court and defending the Bible.

In Alabama, the State Board of Education defied the Supreme Court Monday and made Bible reading part of the required curriculum of public schools. Gov. George Wallace said if the courts rule out the practice in a specific Alabama school "I'm going to that school and read it myself."

"I would like for the people of Alabama to be in defiance" of the high court ruling, he said. Alabama law already required daily Bible reading in all state-supported schools and the resolution went a step further in making it part of the course of study.

South Carolina's superintendent

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Circumvention of the ruling by interpretation usually proceeds on the premise that the high court merely forbade "mandatory" religious exercises and did not object to "voluntary" ones.
