

Klamath Downs Canadian Team In Regionals, 14-2

KELLOGG, Idaho—The Klamath Falls Babe Ruth team made a loud bang in the opening round of the Regional Babe Ruth Tournament here Tuesday night as the National All-Stars dumped the New Westminster, British Columbia team of Canada in the opening round, 14-2.

The Klamathites take on Great Falls, Mont., tonight at 8:30 in the second round of the double elimination tournament. Great Falls beat host Kellogg, 9-4, in its first round competition.

It was the ninth straight victory for the local crew in playoff competition and they seem to gain confidence with each victory. Other winners in Tuesday's opening round had Riverton, Wyo., winning over Ketchikan, Alaska, 11-3; Aberdeen, Wash., topping a 16-3 win over Wallace, Idaho; and Great Falls' win over Kellogg, Wyoming, was Washington in the other undefeated bracket game today at 6 p.m.

It was another big pitching victory for Bobby Williams, the strong-armed catcher who gets better and better with each pitching performance. He allowed only four hits in beating the Canadians Tuesday night. He hurled a no-hit game in the state playoff tournament.

"These kids really came to play ball," Coach Bob Moore said this morning. "Nothing seems to bother them much. They can make an error and it doesn't seem to bother them much. I begin to get worried then, but they come up with the big play needed. They come to play game by game, they go back to the rooms and sleep and come out to play again the next day," he stated.

"Bob Williams' looked good in this game but not as good as the no-hit game he threw last week. He was a little tighter perhaps, but he kept the ball right in there and made them hit it. He struck out 10," Moore said.

"Kim Badley made a hell of a play Tuesday. He came in on the dead run and made a diving catch on his belly and held the ball up for the umpire to see. McNery has made some very fine plays and he seems to come up with some great ones every game. I'm the most worried one. I think," Moore chuckled.

"Washington's team (from Aberdeen) looks the best of the others, I think. Great Falls (Montana, tonight's foe) looks pretty good. They hit the ball pretty well but I don't think they should beat us. The big one should be Thursday's game between us and Washington if we both win tonight," Moore said.

The game was tied up in the first inning. The Canadians got a single run off Williams in the first with the aid of an error. The Nationals came right back, however, and tied it up in their half with Rick Brostherhouse scoring on a fielder's choice by Dave Lyman.

Dodgers Maintain Lead Over Giants, Cardinals

Those front-running Los Angeles Dodgers may realize by now that the National League pennant race is as hot as Willie Mays' bat happens to be.

The Dodgers are five games in front of the Giants and the St. Louis Cardinals and they're coasting along with a tidy three-game winning streak.

Willie's average dipped to .240 to mid-season and this looked like the worst season he ever has had in the majors. But he's ruffling that bat with six hits in his last eight trips to the plate and he's raised his season average to .290. The message to the Dodgers is loud and clear—faller and you'll pay the penalty of blowing a second straight pennant.

Mays hammered out a triple and two singles to lead the Giants' 12-hit attack Tuesday night in a 3-1 victory over the Houston Colts. It was the first time the Giants beat the Colts in Houston in five games.

The Dodgers downed the Chicago Cubs, 4-1, the Cardinals topped the New York Mets, 4-3, the Pittsburgh Pirates defeated the Milwaukee Braves, 3-0, and the Philadelphia Phillies scored a 7-1 triumph after a 6-4 10-inning loss to the Cincinnati Reds in other National League games.

Jim Duffalo went eight innings and allowed six hits to win his fourth straight game without a loss for the Giants while Hal Brown suffered his seventh defeat against four wins. Mays tripled and scored in the fourth inning and contributed a key single in the sixth when the Giants scored their final run. Jim Wynn had two hits for the Colts.

Maury Wills paced the Dodgers' 10-hit attack with a double and three singles and Don Drysdale pitched a six-hitter and fanned six for his 14th victory against 12 losses. Drysdale, now gunning for his second straight 20-win season, halted Billy Williams' 12-game hitting streak.

Shantz Shut Door
Bobby Shantz' 12-3-innings of close-out relief pitching helped the Cardinals deal the Mets their 15th defeat in 17 games. Ken Boyer, Julian Javier and Tim McCarver had two hits each for the Cardinals, with Boyer driving in the winning run with a fifth-inning single. Galen Cisco suffered his 10th loss against seven wins.

Don Cardwell shut out the Braves with four hits for eight innings and Al McBean closed it out in the ninth to earn Cardwell his eighth win against 12 losses. Key blows in the Pirates' three-run seventh inning were a single by Roberto Clemente, a double by Donn Clendenon and a single by Jim Paggiaroni.

Roseburg Evens Playoff Series

ROSEBURG (UPI)—Dick Williams fired a four-hitter as Roseburg defeated Madison of Portland 8-1 in the second game of a best-of-five series for the Oregon American Legion baseball title Tuesday night.

Williams Leads Yankees To Sweep Of Senators

The Kansas City Athletics knocked second-place Chicago eight full games behind the Yankees by edging the White Sox, 4-3; the Baltimore Orioles defeated the Cleveland Indians, 6-4; the Detroit Tigers routed the Boston Red Sox, 10-1; and the Minnesota Twins downed the Los Angeles Angels, 5-1.

George Smith, playing in only his second major league game, collected two doubles and a triple and Frank Lary coasted behind a nine-hitter for Detroit.

Lee Stange, (4-3), treated to a three-run lead in the first inning, shut out Los Angeles on two hits for seven innings and after yielding a run in the eighth needed relief help from Bill Dalry in the ninth. The Twins' early rally was culminated on a two-run single by Bob Allison and another run-producing hit by Earl Battey. Dean Chance (10-12) took the loss.

Williams, who retired the last 19 Washington batters in order, got the only run he needed for his fifth victory in eight decisions when Tony Kubek tripled in the eighth inning and came home on Bobby Richardson's sacrifice fly. Bennie Daniels was the victim.

Chuck Cottier smashed two homers for the Washington Senators, including a decisive three-run blow in the sixth inning that sent Yankee starter Whitey Ford down to defeat.

Pinch-hitter George Alusik singled home the winning run for Kansas City with two out in the bottom of the ninth inning after the White Sox had tied the score with three runs in the top of the ninth.

Reliever John Wyatt got the victory. Jim Gentile drove in four runs with two homers to help Robin Roberts gain his fifth straight triumph for Baltimore. Roberts was touched for three home runs and finally gave way to Stu Miller in the eighth inning.

All this is about to change, however, boasts Williams. His solution? To pitch with the same momentum as Drysdale.

Whatever the answer, it worked with huge success Tuesday night when Williams gave up just one hit in leading the New York Yankees to a 1-0 victory over Washington in the second game of a two-night doubleheader after the Senators had taken the opener, 6-5. It was the best effort turned in by Williams since joining the Yankees last winter.

The only hit off Williams was a third-inning double by Don Blasingame, and the powerful righthander struck out 11 and walked only one.

Liston Switches To MSG

NEW YORK (UPI)—Heavyweight champion Sonny Liston was scheduled to begin arranging his big switch today from independent promotion to that of Madison Square Garden.

The switch, Liston said, would entail abandonment of his proposed Sept. 30th defense against young Cassius Clay at Philadelphia, and the arrangement, instead, of a December defense against some lesser contender on home television for promoter Harry Markson of the Garden.

That December contender may be Ernie Terrell, the Chicago giant.

If Sonny does swing over to the Garden, it could be one of the most momentous moves in boxing history—a move that might begin boosting the Garden back to the big-time promotional supremacy it enjoyed until 1956.

Top contender Clay, visiting in New York, said he was grievously disappointed because of Liston's withdrawal from the September fight, "just because he's scared to death of me."

Liston countered with, "I hope big mouth Clay doesn't fight anybody till I get him next year because the first good man he meets will knock his head off."

It was Liston, himself, who announced in Philadelphia that he planned to visit Markson and his G. A. R. matchmaker, Teddy Brenner, in New York today and discuss possibilities of a home-television defense—possibly at Miami Beach, Fla., or Las Vegas, Nev., in December.

And it was also Liston who announced he was postponing his proposed defense against 21-year-old Clay at Philadelphia's Municipal Stadium until next year because of "tax problems." Total gate, television and other receipts from the Clay fight were expected to approximate \$7 million.
