

Lombardi Working Packers

Although the Green Bay Packers wear the title of champions they receive no special privileges when it comes to hard work.

Coach Vince Lombardi, still smarting from the 20-17 defeat administered by the College All-Stars last Friday, sent his squad through a bone-crushing 15-minute scrimmage Tuesday which many observers termed "brutal."

The Pittsburgh Steelers, who meet the Packers on Saturday night in Miami, were hard at work to duplicate the All-Star victory which snapped Green Bay's pre-season victory string at 19.

The Detroit Lions were duly impressed with rookie Larry Ferguson of Iowa, who scored the All-Stars' first touchdown against the Packers. Ferguson was participating in his first scrimmage with the Lions.

The Chicago Bears received welcome news when linebacker Tom Bettis' injury, suffered on Sunday, was reported to be only a severe elbow sprain, rather than a dislocated elbow as first believed.

Del Shofner and Dick Modzelewski, two stalwarts on the New York Giants, rejoined workouts Tuesday, but the New York club sliced five others from the roster to reduce their squad to 52 players. Those cut were veteran line-backer Dick Lasse, John Murney, Stan Morgan, Joe Taylor, and J. R. Williams.

The St. Louis Cardinals held brief contact-drills Tuesday while five rookies from the College All-Stars, including Don Brumm of Purdue, Bill (Thunder) Thornton of Nebraska, and Bob Paremore of Florida received their first professional workouts.

The Washington Redskins ran through such a ragged morning drill, that head coach Bill McPeak scheduled an unexpected afternoon scrimmage which featured two near-fights and a good blocking exhibition by rookie full-back Dave Francis of Ohio State.

The San Francisco Forty-Niners were pleased with the work of quarterback John Brodie and tight end Floyd Dean after Tuesday's workouts, while the Cleveland Browns practiced kickoff return patterns with Walter Beach and Jim Shorter on the receiving end.

The Boston Patriots resumed double workouts in preparation for Saturday night's exhibition game against the San Diego Chargers with the knowledge that quarterback Babe Parilli has fully recovered from a broken collarbone suffered last year. Parilli alternated with Tom Yewcic in Sunday's loss to the Oakland Raiders.

Cubs Working On Making Ellsworth A Big Winner

CHICAGO (UPI)—The Chicago Cubs, confident that Bob Kennedy already is in the bag for manager-of-the-year honors, are quietly working on another project "for the good of the club."

This is to come up with the team's first southpaw 20 - game winner in 44 years. The last Cubs lefthander to win 20 or better was Jim Vaughn, who wound up the 1919 campaign with a 21-14 record.

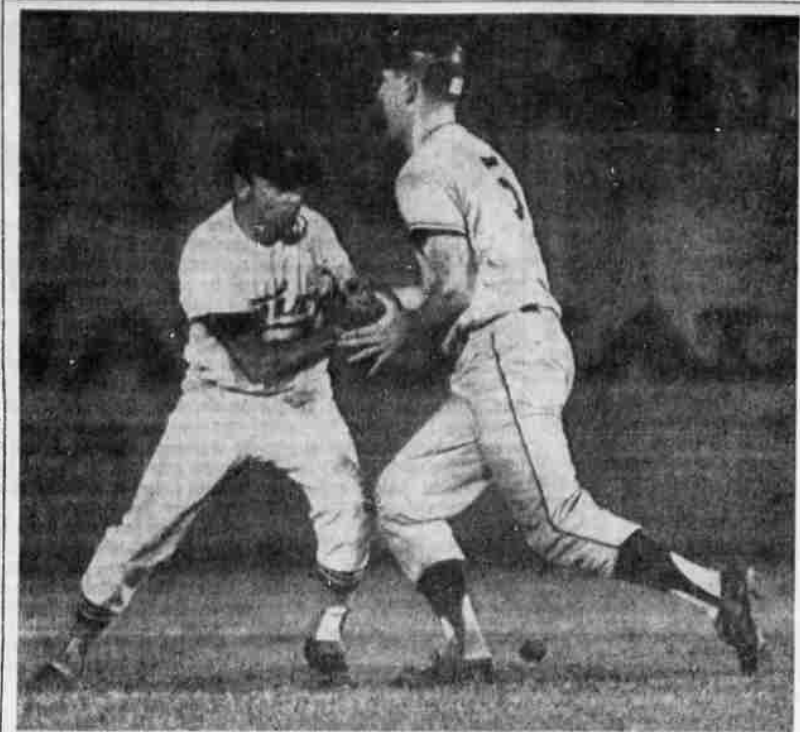
The next one could be Dick Ellsworth, a 23-year-old portside who has a 15-7 record with two months of the season left.

If Ellsworth makes it, he could also put in a claim for the come-back-of-the-year award on the basis of slipping to 9-20 in 1962 after a promising 10-11 with a seventh place club in 1961.

Ellsworth Confident

Ellsworth is confident he will win 20 this year and Freddy Martin, his pitching coach, believes Ellsworth can't miss.

"If he doesn't get hurt or suddenly develop arm trouble, I don't see how he can miss," Martin said. "His control is as good as any pitcher in the league right now, and he's been winning some

Coach Griffith Testifies Butts' Call Aided Alabama

ATLANTA (UPI)—Georgia coach Johnny Griffith, a prime witness in the \$10 million libel suit Wallace Butts is pursuing against the Saturday Evening Post, testified Tuesday that he said were the secrets allegedly given Alabama coach Paul Bryant.

Griffith drew the formations on a blackboard in federal court where the Post is attempting to prove to a jury the truth of an article carried in the magazine last spring. The Post said Butts gave the secrets to Bryant in a telephone conversation accidentally overheard by Atlanta insurance man George Burnett.

Griffith, who succeeded Butts as head coach of the University of Georgia when Butts was promoted to athletic director, said he considered the information helpful to the Alabama team prior to the 1962 Georgia-Alabama game which Alabama, a 17-point favorite, won 35 to 0.

Testified For Two Hours

Griffith testified for two hours and 45 minutes in the federal courtroom crowded with some 200 spectators.

He was the first of a number of coaches or assistants who Post attorney Welborn Cody said he planned to call to the witness stand.

close ones where he hasn't been getting much help from the batters."

Martin put in a lot of time with Ellsworth in spring training. The pitching coach said Ellsworth had a flaw in his motion—failing to bend forward far enough with the throw.

"It wasn't extremely noticeable, but it was enough to affect his control. He worked hard on getting rid of that. When he did, his control improved almost 100 per cent," Martin said.

Gets Curve Over

Martin said that as a result Ellsworth has been getting his curve over the corners. In addition, his protegee developed a slider to give him a fourth good pitch to go along with a fast ball, change-up and curve he had been using for the past two seasons.

Ellsworth said he would risk throwing a slider about once a game last season.

"Now I work it in regularly with good results," he said.

Ellsworth was signed for a substantial bonus after he graduated from Fresno (Calif.) High School in 1958. His first appearance in a Cub uniform was in the annual boys benefit game that year when he beat the White Sox 1-0 on four hits.

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Additionally, Cody said he planned to show movies at today's hearing of the game, the third session of the multi-million dollar libel action.

Griffith, 39, said that the information about the two formations would have helped Alabama concentrate on Georgia's key plays.

Cody asked Griffith if the notes Burnett took of the Butts-Bryant call reflected the two formations that Griffith considered vital.

"Yes sir, they do," Griffith replied. "They show both the formations we planned to use and did use."

Admitted Loan

However, Griffith, who admitted

that Butts had loaned him money and had helped establish his career as a football coach, said on cross-examination by William Schroeder, Butts' chief attorney, that the formations were widely used in the previous season of 1961 not only by Georgia but the other Southeastern Conference teams.

Butts, who resigned as athletic director last February when publication of the Post story became imminent, has never denied that he made a telephone call to Bryant. But both he and Bryant, who has also sued the Post, have denied that vital information was exchanged.

Oklahoma City Garners PCL's Southern Lead

Oklahoma City has moved ahead in the Pacific Coast League's Southern Division race while standing still.

The 8ers were idle Monday and rained out at Denver Tuesday night, while Salt Lake City two-timed arch-rival Dallas-Fort Worth to make it three straight over the Rangers.

Thus, Oklahoma City has moved from 1-2 game behind Dallas-Ft. Worth to one game ahead of the Rangers while not playing a game.

Salt Lake nipped Dallas-Ft. Worth 4-2 Tuesday night and then exploded for five runs in the seven inning nightcap to pull out a 7-3 decision.

In other games Tuesday, Spokane rolled on with a 3-2 victory over Tacoma to climb back to a 10 1-2 game over the Giants in the Northern Division.

San Diego dispatched Portland 6-3 and Hawaii closed in on Portland in the Northern Division by crunching Seattle 15-2.

Salt Lake exploded for four singles and three runs in the first inning of the first game against Dallas-Ft. Worth and then made them stand up, Jim Schand- el relieved starter Wayne Car-

lander in time to pick up the de- cision and then Jack Warner helped out Schandavel.
