

Underworld Post Reward For 'Stoolie'

WASHINGTON (UPI) — To the underworld, crime syndicate stoolie Joseph Valachi is a living dead man.

To the Justice Department, he is a breathing card index on the underworld and it intends to keep him that way.

Valachi became a man on the run when he defied the syndicate's blood oath of silence and turned informer for the government. The cost was a prison term for the crime of being a stoolie.

But the Justice Department is just as determined to keep Valachi alive as the underworld is to kill him. "We are going to take every precaution necessary to protect this man," a department official said.

One source who interviewed Valachi said the short, graying prisoner, whose record goes back 45 years, "knew he would be dead in a very short time" if the crime syndicate corners him.

Fear For Life

It was this very fear of death by his former friends that drove Valachi to talk. He gave the Justice Department dozens of names that, fitted together, gave officials an inside view of an underworld operation that was cheating the public of billions of dollars a year.

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Cancer Drug Believers Plan JFK Plea

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Believers in Krebiozen, the "anti-cancer" serum, planned to resume their stand before the White House today, hopeful of some sign that President Kennedy would heed their pleas.

Pierre Salinger, the President's press secretary, said late Tuesday he would "look into" the matter.

The American Medical Association (AMA) has categorically labeled the drug "worthless."

Law requires that "plans for investigation use" be filed with the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) for every drug under experimental use.

Dr. Steven Druvin and Andrew C. Ivy, Chicago, sponsors of Krebiozen, at first complied with this requirement, then withdrew their plan charging the FDA with harassment.

Their action meant that Krebiozen no longer could be sent through interstate commerce. Persons using the drug were faced with the choice of moving to Illinois or abandoning the treatment.

About 200 of them, some en route to Chicago and many wearing the symbolic black of mourning, appeared before the White House Tuesday in support of their plea. They also picketed the Health Education and Welfare Department.

"They sought an executive order by the President which would guarantee that those not taking the serum could continue to do so until the National Cancer Institute (NCI) has tested the drug."

Sen. Paul H. Douglas, D-Ill., has proposed a joint resolution under which Krebiozen shipments to patients now undergoing the serum would be permitted until an NCI test of the serum is completed.

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Women Boo At Christine

LONDON (UPI)—Women booed and shook their fists at playgirl Christine Keeler, 21, Wednesday as Scotland Yard completed a mammoth report which may explode fresh sensations in the nation's simmering sex scandal.

The playgirl ran the gauntlet of the hostile barrage yesterday afternoon when she left the downtown apartment where she is staying. She was accompanied by her friend, Paula Hamilton-Marshall, 22, who rents the apartment.

Elegant in a green costume and with her face tense and pale, Miss Keeler accelerated her car through the crowd of jeering women.

Miss Keeler has been under doctor's supervision since she suffered a near breakdown on hearing of Dr. Stephen Ward's apparent suicide.

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Urban League Seeks Negro Marshall Plan

One of the most ambitious programs ever advanced for the upgrading of the Negro race in America has been proposed by the National Urban League.

The proposal, quickly named the "Domestic Marshall Plan," would call for the expenditure of the estimated \$10 billion over a 10-year period. The project's aim would be to close the gap, except socially, between the Negro and white citizens of the United States.

The Urban League, which conceived the idea and wants to manage it, acknowledges there are many hurdles to surmount before final plans can be announced. That is expected within the next three months.

Just Starting

"We are just putting the meat on the bones now," Herman Swett, assistant director of the Urban League in the South, said. The spokesman said the federal government is exploring "at a high level" the feasibility of the project. Whitney Young Jr., Urban League executive secretary, is working in terms of such things as education and income.
