

Klamath Babe Ruthers Stunned By Montana Team

Dodgers Increase Lead Over Giants, Cards

Chalk up two more knockout records for Los Angeles fireballer Sandy Koufax today.
Koufax struck out 11 batters in the Dodgers' 3-1, 11-inning triumph over the Chicago Cubs Wednesday.
Koufax' 11-strikeouts lifted his season total to 213 in 213 innings and made him the first National League left-hander to record three consecutive 200-strikeout seasons. It also was a league record 48th time in which he has struck out 10 or more batters in a game.

Koufax turned over a tie game to relief ace Ron Perranoski and the latter gained his 11th win of the season when the Dodgers came up with two runs in the 11th inning on Tommy Davis' homer, singles by Willie Davis and Al Ferrera and an error by Ellis Burton.
The victory enabled the Dodgers to increase their NL lead to six games when the Houston Colts topped the San Francisco Giants, 1-0, and the New York Mets surprised the St. Louis Cardinals, 7-3. The Philadelphia Phillies beat the Cincinnati Reds, 2-1, and

the Pittsburgh Pirates shamed the Milwaukee Braves, 5-4, in other NL action.
Dick Farrell went 8 1-3 innings and Hal Woodeshick threw a game-ending double play ball to pinch hitter Harvey Kuenn to give the ninth-place Colts their fifth win in their last six home games with the Giants. The Colts scored the game's only run off Jack Sanford in the fourth inning on Al Spangler's single, a sacrifice and John Bateman's single.
Jim Hickman hit a homer, triple, double and single and Duke Snider had three hits in the Mets' 11-hit attack that brought Tracy Stallard his fifth win. Ernie Broglio, who had beaten the Mets three straight previous games, suffered his eighth loss against 12 victories.
Maloney's seventh-inning wild pitch enabled Tony Taylor to score with the run that snapped his six-game winning streak and dealt him his fourth loss against 17 wins. Cal McLish pitched an eight-hitter to win his 11th decision for the Phillies.
Relief pitcher Frank Funk's wild pitch in the ninth inning let Bob Bailey score the winning run for the Pirates and gave relief ace Al McBean his 11th victory compared with three defeats. Jerry Lynch homered for the Pirates and Lee Maye had four hits for the Braves.

Butts May Take Witness Stand

ATLANTA (UPI) — The chief counsel for Wallace Butts said he may call Butts himself to the stand today in the former Georgia athletic director's \$10 million dollar suit against the Saturday Evening Post.

William Schroder, the attorney, made the announcement at the conclusion of Wednesday's testimony in the suit that grew out of a Post article entitled "The Story of a College Football Fix."

Butts, one of college football's most respected coaches during a 25 year tenure at the University of Georgia and a member of the football Hall of Fame, charges that the magazine story smeared his character and ruined his career.

The article reported that Butts conspired with Alabama coach Paul (Bear) Bryant to "fix" the 1962 season opening game between the two schools which Alabama, a 17-point favorite, won 35 to 0.

Both Butts and Bryant denied that they fixed the game and each filed multi-million dollar

suits against the Post. Butts' suit is in its fourth day of trial.

Denied Verdict Motion
Schroder asked for a directed verdict in favor of Butts when the Post rested its case Wednesday.

Judge Lewis R. Morgan denied the motion and said he would instruct the jury to consider the Post article "libelous per se" (on its face). The jury was out of the room when he made the remark and he added that the jury will have to decide whether the article showed that Butts actually tried to "fix" the game.

Schroder made the announcement after calling Butts to the stand Wednesday when a recess cut short a deposition by free lance writer Frank Graham Jr. in which Graham told how the magazine story was prepared.

The attorney also promised another summertime rerun of one of the sport's most controversial college games.

Films of the first and fourth quarters of the game were shown Wednesday in the darkened courtroom where the suit is being fought out by two old Georgia grads — Schroder and Welborn Cody — before a third old grad — Judge Morgan — and a 12-man jury.

Pointed Out Formations
Assistant coaches pointed out the "slot" and "pro set" formations that have been identified by Georgia coach Johnny Griffith as the alleged bits of information that Butts reportedly passed on to Bryant in a telephone conversation which an Atlanta insurance man says he accidentally overheard.

Schroder planned to run the complete movie today.

"I want to show every score that Alabama made," he said.

In Graham's deposition, the writer said he never consulted the alleged telephone notes in preparing the article.

The deposition was the opening gun in Butts' side of the libel suit.

Graham testified that he and Atlanta Journal sports editor Furman Bisher put the article together without actually seeing notes which Atlanta insurance man George Burnett said he took off a conversation between Butts and Bryant.

He said the story was written on the basis of interviews with Burnett, Atlanta lawyer Pierre Howard, who represents Burnett, and Milton Flack, a friend of Burnett.

Downing Pitches Yanks Past Washington, 9-1

Al Downing strengthened his bid for AL rookie of the year honors Wednesday night when he pitched a three-hitter as the New York Yankees downed the Washington Senators, 9-1. Joe Pepitone hit his 20th homer of the season and Elston Howard his 22nd to lead the Yankees' 14-hit attack.

The Chicago White Sox defeated the Kansas City Athletics, 7-3. The Cleveland Indians beat the Baltimore Orioles, 4-1. The Detroit Tigers nipped the Boston Red Sox, 5-4, and the Minnesota Twins whipped Los Angeles, 9-4, in other AL games.

Pete Ward, Downing's strongest rival for the AL rookie award, hit his 14th homer and two singles to lead a nine-hit White Sox attack that carried Juan Pizarro to his 14th win against five losses. Pizarro yielded nine hits and three runs in 7 2-3 innings with Jim Brosnan preserving the win. Orlando Pena suffered his 15th setback for the Athletics.

Homers by Joe Azcue and Fred Whitfield provided the power for Cleveland's Jim Grant to register

his eighth victory of the season with a five-hitter. A double by Woody Held, a walk, Al Lopez's single and Larry Brown's infield out produced the other Indian runs as Milt Pappas of the Orioles was tagged with his seventh defeat.

Al Kaline's three-run seventh-inning homer off Red Sox relief pitcher Dick Radatz lifted Detroit to a 5-0 lead.

Kaline also had a double and a single and drove in four runs to lead the Tigers' 12-hit attack while Gary Geiger hit two homers and Dick Stuart connected for a two-run homer for the Red Sox.

Harmon Killebrew's three-run eighth-inning homer gave the Twins a 5-4 lead and relief pitcher Bill Dailey's three-run shot in the ninth clinched their triumph at Los Angeles after the Angels staked Ken McBride to an early 4-0 lead. The homer was Killebrew's 26th and gave him the league lead. Leon Wagner hit his 22nd homer and Jim Fregosi had four singles for the Angels.

Nationals Meet Idaho Team In Losers' Bracket Today

KELLOGG—The Klamath Falls Babe Ruth team, Oregon State champions, suffered a stunning defeat at the hands of a speed merchant team from Great Falls, Mont., here Wednesday night, 8-1, to send the Klamath team into the losers' bracket.
The Nationals will take on Wallace, Idaho, today at 6 p.m. in

the losers' bracket game. The Nationals must win all their remaining games to gain the regional title and get a berth in the World Series in Farmington, N.M.

It was the first defeat in 10 games for the Oregon entry and it came on the heels of some wildness off the mound and some timely hitting and running by the winning team.

Each team got only five hits during the game, but the Montana team made theirs count and they unsettled the Klamath team with running ability and a couple of squeeze bunts for runs, something tried few times against the Nationals since they banded together.

Big Bob Moore started on the mound for the Nationals but he just didn't have his control. He gave up six of the eight runs before little Mike Keck came on in relief. He left, however, in the next half of the inning when he was struck in the head by a pitched ball. He wasn't hurt, however, although he spent the night in the hospital just for safety's sake.

The game opened and looked as if the Klamath congregation would tee off on winning pitcher Kirby Lewis from the opening gun. Rick Brostherous tagged his first pitch and lined it sharply to left field, but the fielder hardly had to change positions because it was hit right at him. This very thing turned out to be the downfall of Klamath all night.

Mike McNery was second up and he lined a shot over the left fielder's head for a double. He took third on Moore's ground out, but died there when Alan Mozzer struck out.

Kim Badley, playing on his 16th birthday, reached second in the top of the second when two outfielders ran together on his fly ball and the ball dropped out of the center fielder's glove. He also died there.

Montana came up with four big runs in their half of the fourth. Shortstop Sam Nelson led off with a single and stole second base. Jack Gillespie, a 6-7 first baseman, struck out and Moore walked Jerry Simmons.

He then struck out Frank Kellanick for the second out, but filled the bags on a walk to opposing hurler Lewis. Catcher and lead-off batter Joe Evans then put the

game on ice with a booming triple to center. Marvin Smith walked and got in a rundown between first and second for the last out, but Evans scored on the rundown.

Klamath got its lone run in the third. Rick Brostherous struck out and McNery singled to right center. Moore lashed the second straight single and Lyman walked to load the bases. McNery raced home on a wild pitch for the lone run. Mezzner fanned and Williams lined a shot to the left fielder.

Montana came up with four more runs in the third. Moore hit leadoff man Jim Bartell to first and walked Bob Kerr, the first two men in the lineup for Montana in the third. He was then relieved by Keck and went to first base. Keck gave up a double to Nelson to score the fifth run and Montana surprised Klamath by squeezing the sixth run home. Simmons was hit by a pitch and Kellanick popped out. Lewis singled in two more runs with a hit to left but was thrown out trying to stretch to second on a nice peg by Greg Brostherous.

Keck got hit the next half-inning and Coach Bob Moore had to come in with Greg Brostherous from the outfield and he, the youngest player in the tournament, did a tremendous job. He worked the final three innings and had Montana stymied. He struck out five in the three frames and gave up only one hit.

Klamath put runners on base in every inning but couldn't get the hits to push them across. They left 11 baserunners stranded during the game while Montana left only three.
