

Racial Report Expected On Psychiatric Aspects

A major report will be released this week-end dealing with the psychiatric aspects of the desegregation of Southern schools.

Like most such studies, its findings will be controversial — accepted as scientific data by some, discarded by others.

The report will be published by the Southern Regional Council and the Anti-Defamation League. This adds to its controversial aspects because both have been active in pro-integration efforts.

The study was produced by Dr. Robert M. Coles, a Boston psychiatrist, now resident in Atlanta. He spent two years gathering the clinical material.

He spent many hours with Negro school children having their first experience in integrated situations, with pre-school Negro youngsters, with teachers and with white parents and pupils who were both for and against desegregation.

Coles, discussing the project in an interview prior to release of his report, said the conclusion of his study was that Negroes can make their way in integrated schools without psychological stress on their own lives or ill effects on the lives of white pupils.

During his racial study, Coles said he often visited the homes of Negroes, playing on the floor with their young children as a means of gaining their confidence. It was in such situations, he said, that he learned Negroes

develop knowledge of racial differences at a very early age. "At four and five years of age, these children know the score," Coles said. "I have been in homes where children of this age have white and colored dolls. They talk about what the dolls are going to be when they grow up. They will place the white dolls in a white society and they grow up to have fine homes and marriages. The Negro dolls become maids and hold menial positions in society. "I would ask them 'why' and they would tell me. 'That's the way it is in the world.'"

Police Hold Four Youths

DUNSMUIR — Two Dunsmuir youths and two teen-age girls, the subjects of a three-day search in the mountainous Castle Crags area just south of here, were picked up in San Diego by authorities there, the Dunsmuir police have learned.

Clarence White, 17, Robert Charles White, 16, Leah May Rader, 16, and Harriet Anne Smith, 13, were observed on an outing near Castle Crags State Park by a fisherman on Friday. When the four were reported missing on Saturday, Dunsmuir police and other volunteer searchers found articles of clothing and a girl's purse scattered in the woods.

Checking the possibility the young people were lost or had met with foul play, the routine search expanded into a full scale hunt on Monday. A bloodhound was obtained from Redding to help the searchers.

No details were provided by San Diego police on how they got to San Diego, why they left home or under what circumstances they were picked up. They will be held in San Diego on runaway charges until claimed by their parents.

Aide Tells Committee Of Contacts On TFX Bid

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Air Force Secretary Eugene M. Zuckert disclosed in testimony made public today that 11 members of Congress contacted him about the TFX fighter plane program before the huge program was awarded last Nov. 24.

Zuckert supplied the list of names at the request of the Senate permanent investigations subcommittee. Sen. Henry M. Jackson, D-Wash., a member of the subcommittee, was one of those on the list.

In providing his personal office log of visits and telephone calls made between Jan. 17 and October of last year, Zuckert also listed contacts made by officials of the contractors then engaged in fierce competition for the multi-billion dollar award.

These included four visits by officials of General Dynamics Corp. two by Grumman Aircraft Co. and three by Boeing Co. officials. The subcommittee, which has raised conflict of interest issues several times in its five-month-old investigation, is inquiring into why the award went to General Dynamics, instead of Boeing Co. Eventual cost of the contract for a changeable wing supersonic fighter — one of the largest awards in military procurement history — is expected to exceed \$7 billion.

The log showed that members of Congress from Washington state, home of losing bidder Boeing, and delegations from Kansas, where Boeing has a large Wichita plant, made several contacts. A member from Texas, location of

Dynamics' Ft. Worth Plant, also showed up on the list.

The names were placed in the record during questioning of Zuckert Tuesday and released in transcripts today by the subcommittee without further comment.

The members inquiring about the TFX included: Sen. Jackson and his senior colleague, Sen. Warren G. Magnuson, D-Wash.; Rep. Joe M. Kilgore, D-Tex.

On May 17 of last year, a Kansas delegation of Sens. Frank Carlson and James Pearson, and Rep. Garner Slriver of Wichita, all Republicans, contacted Zuckert, according to the log.

The late Sen. Robert S. Kerr, D-Okla., and Sen. A. S. Mike Monroney, D-Okla., together with Rep. Carl Albert, D-Okla., contacted Zuckert twice — on Jan. 22 and Sept. 7 of last year.

Also on the list were Sens. Stuart Symington, D-Mo., and Howard W. Cannon, D-Nev. Zuckert explained the contacts involved either visits or phone calls. There was no elaboration as to whether the merits of the two competing bids then under study were discussed.

Military Pay Boost To Be Okayed; New Request Eyed

WASHINGTON (UPI) — With a \$1.2 billion military pay raise about to win congressional approval, the Defense Department already is thinking of asking for a further boost early next year, it was learned today.

Assistant Defense Secretary Norman S. Paul said the pending pay bill will not "solve all the problems," such as "moonlighting" by servicemen who get off-duty jobs to make ends meet.

"And extreme cases where enlisted men have turned to relief. But it is going to help," he said. Paul, Pentagon manpower chief, told United Press International that conferences already had started with Army, Navy and Air Force personnel officers on whether to seek a raise again next year.

"I cannot yet tell you whether or how much," he said. But he was sure Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara would back a new requests as early as next January if the pending boost leaves "disparities" in military pay.

Vice Adm. William R. Smedberg III, chief of Naval personnel who revealed last winter that some sailors in New York City were entitled to state relief, told UPI the \$1.2 billion hike was a "splendid first step" in getting some equity between civil service and military service pay.

"But we must not under any circumstances let Congress feel that it has settled the pay problem," Smedberg said. He said the

military have a long way to go to catch up with the raises given civil servants in the last five years.

Although unknown numbers of enlisted men have turned to one form of relief or another to piece-out their incomes "moonlighting" is far more widespread. And it is not confined to military men.

Many officers of the middle ranks with recent experience commanding troops were enthusiastic about the pay hike but did not look for it to be a cure-all for servicemen with financial problems.

There is a "sizeable block" in the service just as in civilian life who don't know how to manage their financial affairs regardless of income, said one experienced Army officer. The problem is "one of human nature, not the wage structure."

This officer told of personal experience with young soldiers talked into buying cars, furniture, television sets and washing machines, all on the installment plan. In over their heads, they turned naturally to their service emergency relief organizations for loans or grants.

Auto Accident Injures Two

Two young men were injured early this morning when the car in which they were riding skidded out of control on Nevada Street, tore through 18 mail boxes and a fence, then ploughed into a tree.

City police said the driver, 28-year-old Hugh Dan Stevenson of Orange, Calif., and his passenger, Bill Owens, 29, 1837 Siskiyou St., Klamath Falls, were taken by Peace Ambulance to Klamath Valley Hospital.

Stevenson suffered head and ankle injuries and Owens injuries to this right arm and side.

Police said the 1959 hardtop, owned by Stevenson, is considered a total loss.

Officers said the accident occurred at 3:11 a.m. on Nevada Street, near Kiln Street.

Police Press Death Probe

PORTLAND (UPI) — Investigation continued today into the mysterious death of wealthy Payette, Idaho, cattle heiress Irene E. Davis, 41, whose body was found in her Hilton Hotel suite Tuesday with a nylon stocking around her neck.

Police planned to question persons who were reported to have last seen her alive.

The body was found by a maid in a half-filled bathtub. Authorities said there were no signs of a struggle in the hotel room. The corner's office listed cause of death as "asphyxiation by strangulation."

Detectives said nothing was missing from the room. There were some \$300 in traveler's checks in her purse.

She was last reported seen alive about 2:30 a.m. Tuesday leaving a rooftop bar and restaurant. Police said they had made arrangements to talk to two men who had been customers at the bar. They did not identify the men.

She was the daughter of the late Gus Davis, a wealthy Idaho and Eastern Oregon cattle rancher.
