Steels showed little change. Motors were mixed and chemicals tended to move lower. Bristol-Myers, Hercules Powder, Richardson, Merrell and Schering improved in the drugs but Carter Products softened. IBM featured a quiet electronic section with a sizeable gain.

Metals and airlines weakened.

WALL STREET CHATTER

NEW YORK (UPI) — Investment adviser Edward F. Underwood of Ira Haupt & Co. says performances of the international oil group, as well as the domestic oils, drugs, utilities, airlines and rails refutes those who urge indiscriminate liquidation of stocks.

"Some have even gone so far as to prepare for a 1930 disaster," Underwood says. However, the probabilities are strongly against it. "There is not a shred of technical or fundamental evidence to support such a drastic conclusion," he added.

Investors Research Co. says there are enough favorable elements to indicate that the stock market is in the initial stages of a worthwhile rally. The West Coast advisory service says that "recent action, despite its highly erratic nature, tends to strengthen this belief." It notes that such recent excellent leadership as rails, oils, airlines and utilities "is a vital factor in considering the intermediate probabilities."

Nomination Board Listed

A six-man nominating committee has been named by the Klamath County Chamber of Commerce to select 10 candidates to run for five posts on the chamber's Board of Directors which are to be filled for terms of three years beginning Oct. 1, Jim Monteith, president, disclosed Tuesday.

The nominating committee will submit its slate of 10 candidates to the 15-member board at the chamber's regular luncheon meeting next Wednesday, and also accept nominations from the floor during the chamber's regular luncheon meeting, next Wednesday, Aug. 14.

Comprising the committee are Sam Ritchey (chairman), Vern Owens, Fred Ehlbers, Robert Kent, Russ Tisdale and Frank Ganong.

Ballots will be mailed to all chamber members in good standing Wednesday, Aug. 21, and are to be completed and returned to the chamber office before 10 a.m. on the same day two weeks later.

The five candidates receiving the largest number of votes will be elected to the board of directors to serve a three-year term commencing Oct. 1, the start of the chamber's 1963-64 fiscal year.

Retiring from the board on that date are James Bocchi, Noel Flynn, John Moehl, James Stillwell and Adolph Zamsky Jr.

On Wednesday, Sept. 11, the new board will meet to elect officers and hire a manager for the ensuing year.

The terms of five directors on the 15-man board expire each year.

Lumber Driver Relates Knowledge Of Shooting

"I've been shot. Will you take me to a doctor?"

Those were the words uttered by Howard Wise, a 28-year-old itinerant, to Sidney Harris, a lumber company route driver, after the teamster drove his truck to the front porch of the Robert Hult residence at the Agency last March 1.

That was part of Harris' testimony late yesterday as the trial of Robert L. Hult, charged with assault with a dangerous weapon, continued in the circuit court of Judge David R. Vandenberg.

Hult is accused of deliberately shooting Wise in the leg with a bullet discharged from a .25-caliber rifle following a drinking session at the defendant's residence Feb. 28.

The trial resumed early this morning with testimony from deputy sheriff Alvie Youngblood, Chiloquin, and then recessed until Purthina Wright, a state witness, was brought here later today from Chiloquin to give testimony. The witness, who was in the Hult home at the time of the shooting, failed to appear in court yesterday and was located this morning by the district attorney's office.

Harris' testimony traced the events of the day following the shooting, while John Webber, investigator for the district attorney's office, and Youngblood told the jury of their investigations which established that the story of the incident as told by Hult was untrue.

Hult's story is that he had shot at Wise, believing him to be a prowler. Wise stated that he had been drinking with Hult and two others when the defendant ordered him to get a bottle of liquor from elsewhere in the house. Wise related that he didn't move quickly enough to suit Hult, who began shooting at him as he ran from the house.

After the shooting, Wise was removed to the Hult house where he remained until the following day, when he hailed Harris as the latter was driving past the Hult house.

Harris testified that he stopped his truck and drove into Hult's driveway, where he met Wise, who sought his assistance. With the help of Purthina Wright, Wise was lifted into the truck and taken to a Chiloquin doctor, Harris related.

Another witness yesterday was George W. Baker, who was at the shooting.

Chamber Launches Long Range Study Plan

An "aggressive, long range" group during its weekly meeting Wednesday at the Pelican Cafe, designed to improve the stature of Klamath County in six or seven areas, such as civic, cultural and economic development, will be put into effect by the Klamath County Chamber of Commerce, beginning Oct. 1, Jim Monteith, president of the chamber, told the members of the group during its weekly meeting Wednesday at the Pelican Cafe.

In a prepared statement, Monteith remarked that "it is too early to discuss details of the plan at this time."

Briefly, the program "will involve setting up both long-range and short-term goals in six or seven major areas such as payroll development, agriculture, community development, among others," Monteith explained.

"The goals to be set will be aggressive and forward looking — in some instances, perhaps, dramatic," he said further. In each case the goal will be established with a view to improving the economic, agricultural, commercial, industrial, and the civic and cultural development of Klamath Falls and Klamath County, Monteith stated.

Horses Take Limelight In Annual 4-H Program

Klamath County 4-H Club horses will be in the limelight at the annual 4-H Horse Show at the fairgrounds, Saturday and Sunday, Aug. 10-11.

In announcing plans, Francis Skinner, 4-H county 4-H extension agent, reports that James Ricci of Bend will judge the animals, demonstrations, showmanship and other events.

Ricci has been associated with horses for more than a quarter of a century. He served with the Massachusetts 110th Cavalry and the quartermaster remount stables at Fort Devens, Mass. After many years of study on the anatomy and psychology of the horse, he has been able to apply the art of dressage to all types of riding, whether it be three-gaited or trail, grand dressage or reining.

He has given many lectures and exhibitions in the interest of furthering better horsemanship. He is the author of the book, "The Unity of Horse and Man," now being published by the J. B. Lippincott Company of Philadelphia.

Four-H Club leaders have released the following program of events for the show: Aug. 10, 10 a.m., showmanship and trail horse class; afternoon — horse judging contest, snaffle bit and hackamore class, English saddle and bareback class.

Aug. 11 — 1 p.m., parade of breeding stallions, demonstration on dressage by Ricci, colt class, horsemanship, jumping, grand entry and presentation of awards.

Judging of showmanship, horsemanship, and trail horse class will be on an age basis of the club member on Jan. 1. Junior classes are for 9, 10 and 11-year-olds. Intermediates are club members, 12, 13 and 14. Senior club members are 15 or older.

Selected intermediate and senior club members are eligible to represent Klamath County at the Oregon State Fair at Salem.
