

Radio Free Europe Plays Down U.S. Racial Strife

Radio Free Europe is a privately-supported organization that transmits Western "truth" behind the Iron Curtain into Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Poland, Bulgaria and Romania.

In the course of attempting to answer Communist attacks with what it calls an "unvarnished picture" of the racial situation in the U.S. South, RFE sent two newsmen into Dixie for three weeks. Their interviews, and RFE "Commentary" are being used for four half-hour programs broadcast from two transmitters in West Germany and one in Portugal.

A striking note about the complete 500 page transcript is that it skips reactions that are more conservative than middle-of-the-road. The agency's news chief, Horst Pezall, a native of Berlin, Germany, explains this way:

"Members of extremist groups, such as the Black Muslims and the White Citizens Council, were not interviewed. The people of the countries we reach were getting plenty of the extremist point of view from the Communist propaganda."

Here are samples of how the racial situation was reported by Radio Free Europe:

RFE Commentary: "There is a very real sense of optimism among Negro leaders and complete consensus among whites... that the racial barriers that exist today are certain to fall."

Gov. Terry Sanford of North Carolina: "What is needed is a new emancipation proclamation from the bigotry of the past... the people of North Carolina are realizing it is simply not right and moral to deprive people of a chance to make the most of their abilities."

Mayor Stanley R. Brookshire of Charlotte, N.C.: "The choice should not be too difficult if we admit in all honesty that discrimination based on the color of a man's skin is legally and morally wrong and economically unsound."

RFE Commentary: "Most whites are bewildered by the suddenness and the force of the Negro drive for his civil rights. In general, it is the lower middle class and poor whites that are most bitterly opposed to granting the Negro equal status as an American citizen... 'Negro leaders... deplore but accept the fact that these (Southern businessmen) are agreeing to the lifting of racial barriers for economic, not moral motives.'"

Mayor William O. Cowger of Louisville, Ky.: "If you were to take a poll of the man in the street in most Southern cities I know of, you would find a lot more moderates than you will strong segregationists."

RFE Commentary: "The assassination of Medgar Evers (the Jackson Negro civil rights leader) so unified and hardened the Negro position that now there remains no real middle ground between the two races. There seems to be a fatalistic belief on both sides that a violent showdown is inevitable."

Labor Dispute Unemployment Payments Ready

SALEM — Payment of unemployment insurance benefits due certain individuals who had previously been denied benefits due to involvement in the 1958 construction industry labor dispute began this week, David H. Cameron, Department of Employment commissioner, reported.

Payments began for some 350 individuals whom the commissioner deemed not directly involved in the labor dispute after the Oregon Supreme Court had reversed a decision by the Multnomah Circuit Court which allowed benefits to all those involved.

Not all claims were ordered to be paid by the commissioner since the supreme court gave instructions to issue a decision and identify those claimants disqualified under the labor dispute provisions of the Department of Employment Law.

The commissioner was instructed to pay no other claims unless new findings of fact were entered to show that other claimants produced evidence that took their claims out of the class disqualified by the labor dispute provisions of the law.

A total of 242 denied benefits of the original 773 persons involved in the 1958 labor dispute of the Laborers, Teamsters and Operating Engineers Unions have filed objections to the order and this is still under consideration in the Multnomah Circuit Court.

Persons who were granted unemployment insurance benefits under the commissioner's order were those in crafts other than those of unions directly involved. The U.I. payments which started this week were to those individuals and were not in any way connected to payments to individuals involved in the present lumber dispute.

Area Guard Units Home

CAMP RILEA — Some 110 Klamath Falls National Guardsmen were headed home Friday after undergoing two weeks active duty training along the coastal sand dunes here.

Troops of Batteries B and C are scheduled to arrive Saturday in Klamath Falls.

Both units, attached to the 2nd Automatic Weapons Battalion, 249th Air Defense Artillery, fired the track-mounted twin 40 MM guns at air and surface targets during training. Firing ceased Thursday. Battery B is commanded by Capt. Leonard D. Springer; Battery C by Capt. Richard L. Gilchrist.

The Klamath Falls citizen-soldiers drew their pay, along with about 1,000 other Oregon Guardsmen, Thursday. Camp finance officer, Maj. Mervin W. Escala, reported that this year's payroll for all the men attending the two week encampment was \$122,304.

During this year's camp, troops spent five days and four nights on bivouac in the field where extensive maneuvers were undertaken. They also participated in night problems on the dunes during the first week.

A mock nuclear explosion eliminated the field problems. The device, concocted from conventional explosives, shot up a mushroom shaped cloud which could be seen many miles from camp.

At the mid-point of training, Klamath Falls troops participated in a parade during the annual Governor's Day Review. Several generals and Gov. Mark O. Hatfield were in the reviewing party. After the parade the men were off duty for the rest of the weekend.

Heavy firing along the Pacific Ocean range resumed Monday. Several fast flying "R-Cats," radio controlled aircraft targets, were blasted out of the sky by keen eyed gunners of the 2nd Battalion. Machine guns and rocket launchers were also fired.

Headquarters and Headquarters Battery of the 2nd, with 65 men commanded by 1st Lt. Franklin L. Kenny, returned home to Ashland with the Klamath Falls units. The 249th is commanded by Maj. Ardis N. Warren.

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Gas Tax Refunds Possible

T. G. Erickson, District Director of Internal Revenue for Oregon, reminded taxpayers who use gasoline for nonhighway purposes that they may have a tax refund due them. In general, a refund may be obtained of the two cents a gallon federal tax paid on motor fuels when these fuels are used:

(1) For purposes other than in registered highway vehicles and (2) by certain transit systems.

Gasoline which is used for purposes other than, as a fuel in a highway vehicle may qualify for the 2-cent refund. Examples: Gasoline used in cleaning tools, machinery, etc., gasoline used in motorboats, aircraft, fork - lift trucks, bulldozers, earth movers, etc.

Refunds may also be made on gasoline used in a highway vehicle if at the time of such use the vehicle is not registered and is not required to be registered under the laws of the state in which it is operated or situated.

Claims for refund must be postmarked no later than Sept. 30, 1963, for the 12-month period, July 1, 1962 through June 30, 1963.

Information concerning refunds of tax paid on gasoline used on a farm for farming purposes is contained in Publication No. 308.

Information concerning gasoline tax refunds for other than farmers or farm use is contained in Publication No. 378.

Either of these publications may be obtained, free of charge, from the nearest Internal Revenue Service office.

That they might include gasoline used in autos and trucks operating off the highway in connection with construction, mining, or timbering projects if they meet the above requirements. Farmers are entitled to claim refunds each year for the federal excise tax on gasoline used on a farm for farming purposes.

Information concerning gasoline tax refunds for other than farmers or farm use is contained in Publication No. 378.
