Klamath County Employed Rate Shows Record Low

The labor dispute in the wood products industry was a major factor affecting employment, in Klamath County during the month of July. The secondary effect of this dispute was, however, not as great as had been anticipated. Leonard T. Sytsma, State Employment Office manager, said this week.

Unemployment dropped slightly from the high level of late June. Conversely, employment showed a slight increase. A total of 268 non-agricultural job openings were received by this office during July 1963 as compared to 222 during June 1963 and 307 during July 1962.

Retail sales were generally reported to be good. However, several retailers indicated a drop in sales toward the end of July. Agricultural employment increased during July. Most of this increase was a result of hay harvest activities.

For the past 29 years Mrs. Kanyamunyu has worked with various African Girl Guidance groups, which were originally patterned after the English organization. Now, however, Uganda wants to form its own program for Girl Guides and have it resemble the Girl Scouts.

During her stay, she has visited the various units at Camp Smith Creek, each consisting of a group of open-air cabins, tents or lean-tos. There is an average of 60 girls and 20 counselors at the camp. Mrs. Kanyamunyu watched them at their campfires, cookouts, preparing for overnight hikes, doing camp chores and woodcrafts, swimming and folk dancing. It was just as educational for the girls, however, as they constantly pried Mrs. Kanyamunyu with questions about her own country and its customs.
