## Britain's Train Robbery Haul Exceeds \$8 Million

LONDON (UPI) — Confirmed bank losses in the biggest robbery of all time soared today toward \$8 million.

Insurance companies hit by the loss offered a record reward of more than half a million dollars for capture of the mail train robbers and recovery of the loot.

Officials said the known loss thus far in Thursday's "great train robbery" now totaled \$7,065,600—with the ultimate figure expected to run as high as \$8.4 million.

### Interior Asks Leasing Bids

PORTLAND (UPI) — The Interior Department today called for nominations for areas for prospective oil and gas leasing in the outer continental shelf off the coasts of Oregon and Washington.

This would be the first leasing of offshore lands in the Pacific Northwest by the Federal Government. The area currently has no production of oil and gas.

Under Secretary of the Interior James K. Carr, chairman of the Department's Offshore Oil Committee, said plans call for competitive sealed bids for leases on specific tracts to be received Oct. 1, 1964.

Prospective lessees must now indicate offshore areas on which they are interested in drilling for oil and gas. Nominations must be submitted no later than Nov. 1.

Carr said, "It is our view that a successful program for exploration in the offshore area will make a substantial contribution to employment and to economic activity in the Pacific Northwest. Accordingly, the Department's timetable for the sale has been calculated to afford interested parties sufficient time for thorough seismic work in advance of the sale date."

Oil firms have been exploring off the Oregon coast under state permits but no oil has been found.

## Tulelake Man Takes Life

A 46-year-old Tulelake man apparently calmly read a magazine as he awaited death while seated in his automobile at the gravel pit, near Harpole Road, yesterday, Oregon State Police have reported.

Dead is Clifford Phillips, P.O. Box 682, Tulelake, whose body was discovered at 4 p.m. by L. E. Shelley, Rte. 1, Box 34, Bonanza, after the victim had apparently succumbed to monoxide poisoning. At the time of the discovery, the motor of the automobile was running and a rubber hose was extended from the exhaust to the interior of the car. Next to the body was a magazine which the victim had apparently been reading until the time of his death, police said.

Two notes were found inside the vehicle. One was addressed to "the officer" and the other was for Lloyd Pickett, Warren Hotel, Tulelake.

The automobile had been observed parked at the gravel pit about 12:40 p.m., police stated. Funeral arrangements are being undertaken by O'Hair's Memorial Chapel.

In 1960 he was reassigned to Burns and last month came to Klamath Falls.

## Standard Oil Anti-Trust Case Ruled Mistrial

PORTLAND (UPI) — An anti-trust case against Standard Oil Co. of California was declared a mistrial here Thursday after counsel for the plaintiff declared in the presence of the jury that Standard hired a potential witness.

Clyde Perkins, 73, Vancouver, Wash., sought more than \$600,000 from the company in a case brought under the Robinson-Patman Act.

Perkins, a former petroleum jobber and one-time executive vice president of the Portland Beavers of the Pacific Coast League, charged that Standard sold gasoline and oil products to competitors of Perkins at lower prices.

Federal Judge William G. East granted the mistrial on the 15th day of testimony after attorney Roger Tilbury pursued the subject of hiring a potential witness in the jury's presence. The judge set a new trial for Oct. 21.

Judge East later signed an order requiring Tilbury to appear Wednesday and show cause why he should be assessed the cost of jurors' fees and subsistence incurred by the government during the trial.

Perkins, who operated under the brand name of Champion stations, alleged that his business, from Seattle, to Centralia, Wash., was taken over by another Standard jobber.

Perkins and Tilbury said that Standard retained a certified public accountant and that such action had the effect of cutting off the plaintiff's attempt to obtain records needed in the presentation of the case.

### Hill Named Emergency Plan Chief

SALEM (UPI) — Public Utility Commissioner Jonel C. Hill has been appointed by Gov. Mark Hatfield to be the state's emergency planning director.

The position was formerly held by Civil Defense Director Robert Sandstrom.

However, Sandstrom recently told the Civil Defense Advisory Council he couldn't continue to hold the position because of added personal duties which resulted when his staff was cut from 18 to three by the legislature.

In the emergency planning role, Hill will make plans for keeping the state's economy going and provide adequate food and services to the people in case of nuclear attack.

Hill said he plans to contact top business and industrial leaders to help him prepare the program. He also plans to enlist the aid of state and federal officials in Oregon.

Plans will be based on the assumption the state will be cut off from the rest of the nation for 90 days in case of nuclear attack but that there will be no direct hits in Oregon and the state's economic facilities will be intact.

He said rationing plans will be included.

Hill said some of the emergency planning had been done while the function was under civil defense direction but that much additional work was needed.

On a national level emergency planning has also been separated from civil defense.

### Storm Damage Report Given

SALEM (UPI) — A year and a half's supply of timber for the entire Oregon-Washington forest industry was blown down in the windstorm last Oct. 12, W. D. Hagenstein, executive vice president of the Industrial Forestry Association, said Thursday.

He estimated the blowdown at 17 billion board feet.

Loggers salvaged two and a half billion board feet, or about 13 million board feet a day, during the first half of 1963, he estimated.

The timber disaster committee, which Hagenstein heads, is seeking to remove most of the salvage by June of next year to reduce the threat of tree killing bark beetles which often build up in blowdown and later spread to living trees.

### Heart Seizure Fatal To Man

A 66-year-old hitchhiker died of a heart seizure near Irene's Cafe in Chemult, about 3:15 a.m., Thursday, Peace Ambulance has reported.

Dead is Luther Paul Wiggins of Gresham whose personal effects indicated he had resided more recently in two other Oregon cities and California. Wiggins had been en route to the University of Oregon Medical School at Portland when he was stricken, a reliable source told the Herald and News.

The body was removed by Peace Ambulance to O'Hair's Memorial Chapel where funeral arrangements are pending.

### Girl Injured In Car Mishap

A 17-year-old Klamath Falls girl received cuts and bruises when she was thrown out of a car involved in an accident at the intersection of Reclamation Avenue and Martin Street Thursday afternoon.

The girl, Madeline Murray, was thrown onto the pavement when the car she was a passenger in collided with a vehicle driven by Robert William Johnson, 38, 1006 Alandale. The other vehicle was operated by the girl's mother Rose Marsangos, 40, 2136 Eberlein.

Mrs. Marsangos and Johnson both complained of pain after the crash. The woman was cited for failing to yield the right of way and her car received moderate damage while the Johnson vehicle was damaged extensively, according to police.

City police, observing that the Marsangos vehicle was without seat belts, advised the woman to equip her car with these safety features.

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## Klamath Gets \$359,247 In O&C Allocation To State

Klamath County will receive \$359,247 as its share of timber sales from O&C railroad grant lands for the fiscal year ending June 30, according to a report from the Department of the Interior.

The amount is part of \$15,031,270 earmarked this year for the 18 Eastern Oregon counties which benefit annually from O&C timber sales, the department reported.

Klamath County Treasurer Eva Cook said today that the check for the county's share of the revenues has not been received. Such checks are delivered by special messenger from the Medford office of the Department of the Interior to the County Courthouse, Mrs. Cook said.

The amount coming to the county this time is nearly \$9,000 less than it received last year, when \$368,063 came here in O&C revenues. Money received from the account goes into the general fund.

The \$15 million released to the Eastern Oregon counties represents 50 per cent of the gross revenues of more than \$30 million obtained in the timber sales during the last fiscal year.

Some two million acres of O&C lands are under the administration of the Bureau of Land Management, Department of the Interior. The Forest Service, Department of Agriculture, also administers about a half million acres of O&C lands.

The slight decrease in the revenues received this fiscal year compared to fiscal year 1962-63 is primarily due to a decline in the market value of timber.

The Department of the Interior gave the following breakdown of funds going to the other 17 counties this year:

### Jury Finds Huitt Innocent

Robert L. Huitt, Agency, has been acquitted of the assault with a dangerous weapon of Howard Wise, a 28-year-old itinerant, who was wounded in the leg with a bullet fired from a 25-35 caliber rifle after he became a target for the accused following a drinking bout at Huitt's residence Feb. 23.

The jury of eight men and four women deliberated four hours and 22 minutes before it returned a unanimous verdict of not guilty to Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg, 10 p.m., last night.

The case went to the jury about 3:30 p.m. yesterday, following the closing statements of the defense attorney and Deputy District Attorney Bob Thomas, marking the end of the trial which started Tuesday.

In a surprise move early yesterday, the defense opened and ended its case with the testimony of one witness — the defendant, Robert Huitt.

The story of the shooting incident as told to the jury by Huitt yesterday was at considerable variance with a statement he had made to the district attorney's office in March and the version related by Wise during the trial.

Huitt's first story was that he had observed Wise peering into the house through a window, believing Wise was a prowler. Huitt said in his statement that he fired four shots at the man as he retreated from the house. The last bullet struck him in the leg.

During the trial, Wise told the jury that he became a target for Huitt after he angered him by moving too slowly in producing a bottle of liquor from another part of the house.

Testimony from both men established that the victim had been a guest in the Huitt house at the time of the shooting.

### Man Killed In Accident

Arthur Louis Schuck, 37, Yreka, was killed about 8:45 a.m. Friday when a lumber truck backed over him near Yreka, the California Highway Patrol reported before noon today.

The victim was transferred to the Siskiyou General Hospital where he was pronounced dead on arrival. The body was taken to Girdner's Mortuary in Yreka.

Operator of the truck was Leonard Anthony Johnson, 44, also of Yreka.

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
