

New KUHS Principal Working To Iron Out School Problems

C. E. Clevin, the new KU principal who came to Klamath Falls from Mount Clemens, Mich., has been working with some of the high school staff ironing out problems caused by the split shift and trying to foresee other problems that might arise and have plans ready to cope with them.

The new principal said the co-operation of the entire community is needed to help overcome all the problems at the high school.

He said after reading last year's reports from staff members he is somewhat concerned about the citizenship of some of the students. "Good citizenship is basic to a good educational system," Clevin said.

The split shift will provide the opportunity for much better control at the school, the administrators feel, and Clevin and his staff already are working on ways to take advantage of the built-in control factors.

Clevin said when he came to Klamath Falls last week he understood what the problems were at KU and he feels prepared to deal with them.

At Mount Clemens High School,

where he was vice principal, he said the biggest problem there was the overcrowded condition.

"The people at Mount Clemens,

going on a split shift next year because it will take from two to four years to alleviate the problem. Last year they were so cramped for space students were using churches and other facilities around town.

Clevin, who has coached high school athletics, was raised on Michigan's upper peninsula and in that wonderful outdoor area he acquired a taste for hunting and fishing. He said he is looking forward to pursuing his outdoor interests in this area which is so well known for its wildlife resources.

As a former coach he is also interested in high school sports.

The new principal is the father of four sons. The oldest will be staying in Michigan to go to college and one of the boys, 15, will be going to KU. His 7-year-old son will be in grade school and the youngest, 3½, will guard the home front.

When asked about his first impression of Klamath Falls Clevin said that coming from a big urban area he is most impressed by the down to earth friendliness of the Klamath Falls community.
