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Lake County Schools Expect Little Change In Enrollment Size

LAKEVIEW — During the summer the school districts of Lake County have done the usual decorating and cleaning, considerable maintenance, repair and improvement in preparation for the beginning of school, according to Mrs. Anne Sprague, county school superintendent.

Enrollments are expected to be approximately the same as last year with no material changes.

For the first time this year the pupils living in the former Kelly Creek School District will attend school in Lakeview. This district consolidated with the Lakeview District Feb. 8, 1963. District 7, Lakeview, has purchased a new bus for the transportation of all elementary and high school pupils from this district to Lakeview.

The Union School will have one new teacher for the forthcoming school year. Mrs. Elizabeth Bowden will teach grades three and four. She comes to Lake County from Grass Valley. Other teachers are Jay J. Shafer, grades seven and eight and principal; Marvin Kelso, grades six and seven; and Mrs. Josephine Goss, grades one and two. Mrs. Norma Black will again be cafeteria cook and janitor. The district has purchased a new bus this summer for replacement, and the drivers are Carl Peay and Jack Albertson.

Extensive work has been done on the building at Paisley during the summer. A new cafeteria has been built and the former room occupied by the cafeteria has been remodeled into a classroom. The high school has need of more space and the seventh and eighth grades will be moved to the new classroom on the first floor and will leave the entire second floor for the high school. With the new heating plant installed last year and the current remodeling, the Paisley building is in excellent shape to take care of the pupils in that area.

Opening Set For Tulalake

TULALAKE — It will be back to school for boys and girls of the Tulalake Elementary School and Tulalake Joint Union High School on Sept. 10.

School officials, aware of the penalty of being shut in four walls with the excitement of a fair going on only a few blocks away, set the Sept. 10 date to permit students to take part in the junior livestock show and sale and other areas of the fair.

In the Tulalake Elementary School, Arnold Torregino will begin his 10th year as principal.

There will probably be 355 students registered. "Give or take" a few from kindergarten through the eighth grade.

There are still two teacher vacancies to fill. Of the 14 on the staff, Torregino announced the following: kindergarten, Mrs. Maxine McFarland; two first grades, Mrs. Hazel Tucker, Mrs. Stella Wintner; two second grades, Mrs. Joyce Greenbank, new this year, and Mrs. Anna Kelleher; two third grades, Mrs. Betty Meek and Mrs. Margaret McLain.

Fourth grade, Mrs. Anita Stevens; fifth, Mrs. Peggy Wallis; sixth, Mrs. Winnifred Oehrick; seventh, Charles Durand, recent graduate University of Oregon, newcomer this year; eighth, Henry Smith, coach last year at the Tulalake high school.

Ernest Short of Princeton, California, is the new principal of Tulalake Joint High School.

His teaching staff includes: holdovers - music, Kenneth Austin; vocational agriculture, Robert Boster; woodshop and mechanical drawing, Vern Hemstreet; foreign languages and English, John Quinn, business subjects.

New teachers include: history and counseling, Gary Straus; science, Martin Shea; home economics and girls' physical ed, Muriel Skippens; social science, James Chance; Mathematics, Dorothy Shopp; English, Alice Flora; athletic coach and general science, Darrell LaRue.

Two new members of the board Mrs. Edgar (Allison) Osborne.

Georgette Kirby is office secretary; Gladys Olchawa will be in charge of the cafeteria. Pete Nichols is in charge of maintenance. Bus drivers are Naomi Kurtz, Vance Jones and Curtis Boland. Mr. Bessie Metz and Mary Anderson are cooks.

The high school curriculum is strengthened this year with the addition of new courses - third-year French, Spanish, journalism, remedial reading, public speaking and four years of science.

Gary Straus who transferred from the elementary school will function as a counselor. School Board Chairman Dave Carmen announced in addition to other information, that it is the hope of the board members and the school administration for each student of the expected 200 to have a session with the counselor before the opening day of school. Freshmen will start next week.

The usual summer cleanup will be finished before classes open. Information on the opening of the Newell Elementary School was not available at presstime.

The high school at Paisley will have two new teachers due to the resignation of Mrs. Beatrice O'Connor and Mrs. Emma Morris. The new teachers are Mrs. Esther Koch, teaching English, girls' physical education and journalism; and Mrs. Caroline Schlafman for commercial, library, and perhaps German. Other faculty members returning are Harold Crocker, superintendent-principal and high school math; Lloyd Showers, high school social science; R. B. Dooley, grades seven and eight; J. Newton Lacy, grades five and six; Mrs. Teresa Foster, grades three and four; and Mrs. Doris Atkins, grades one and two. Mrs. Ellen McIntosh and Mrs. Florence Bagley will be cafeteria cooks, and J. D. McIntosh, janitor.

At Silver Lake the heating system for the building has been completely remodeled and an oil burning furnace installed. This will add greatly to the ease of heating and will be easier to operate. There will be two new teachers on the faculty this year. Kenneth Slaybaugh comes to Oregon from Pomeroy, Washington, and will teach the intermediate grades. Frank Nipper will teach grades seven and eight and serve as principal. He has been teaching in Idaho for the past two years. Mrs. Mary Emery will return and teach the primary grades.

The usual preparations for the beginning of the new school year have been made at Plush. Mrs. Mary Brokaw will return to teach the primary grades and Mrs. Evelyn McInnis, who has been teaching at Boardman, has been employed to teach the upper grades. At Adel for the first time in the last few years the school dis-

trict has employed two teachers, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Crawford of Lewiston, Idaho. The playground has been leveled and some landscaping begun. The excellent new building which went into operation last year will be cleaned and ready for school. Extensive work has been done on the entrance road leading from the highway to the new building.

Provisions have been made for the building of additional storage space for the school and much work has been done to provide recreational facilities for the pupils. The two teachers, Mrs. Evelyn Rice, primary, and Mrs. Freda Thayer, upper grades, are returning for the second year of employment in this district.

At Ana River the new classroom added last year has been entirely satisfactory. The two teachers, Mr. and Mrs. Paul Danford, are new to the district this year and come from Dayton, Washington.

The New Idaho School will operate in the same manner as it did last year. The enrollment will be grades one through five, with pupils in grades six through eight transported to Lakeview on a tuition basis. Mrs. Edith Cavitt will return for the school year.

The classrooms at Vernon School have been redecorated in readiness for the school year. This is a three-teacher school. Two of the teachers are returning to the same positions they have held for the past few years: Larry McPherson, who teaches grades six, seven and eight; and Mrs. Mary Deming primary grades. A new teacher, Donald Sowa, from Lewiston, Idaho, has been employed for the intermediate grades.

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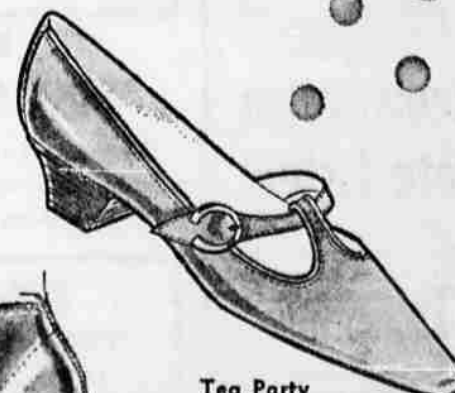


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
