

Construction On New Oregon Tech Campus Progressing According To Schedule

Construction on the new Oregon Tech campus is progressing according to schedule, according to President W. D. Purvine.

For several days concrete was being poured at all five new building sites every day. The buildings are the library-commons, administration, gymnasium, shops, and physical plant buildings. All concrete work has been completed for the library-commons building and the steel trusses for the cantilever type upper story were put in place last week.

The objective in the five new buildings is to have them completely enclosed before winter. When the buildings are enclosed and heated by hot water heat from the campus wells, the pouring of floors and completion of interiors can continue throughout the winter. The administration building will be ready for installation of the steel superstructure as soon as the steel work is completed on the library-commons building. Concrete trusses

and walls in the physical education building are being poured rapidly. The foundations and piers for the huge shops building have been completed.

Preparations are being made to pour the floor slabs in the physical plant building while work on the superstructure is being delayed until special type steel trusses arrive from Akron, Ohio.

Sand blasting of the exposed concrete on the exterior of the classroom and laboratory buildings is nearing completion. This process is done for its esthetic effect. It is anticipated that the interiors of the classroom and laboratory buildings will be completed in less than 60 days. Final grading of the road on three sides of the new campus has been completed and paving will be completed before Nov. 1.

According to the contract the shops building and physical plant are due for completion by June 15, 1964. This will permit the transfer of heavy equipment and

machinery from the old campus in Portland on Aug. 14, 1963. It is anticipated that the completion date will be prior to the opening of school for the 1964-65 school year. Oregon Tech expects to be moved entirely to the new residence halls are to be opened campus by that time.

Oregon Tech's Enrollment May Be Near 1,000 Mark

Oregon Tech's 1963 fall term enrollment will be near the 1,000 mark if advanced registrations are any indication. More than 530 new students applied for admission by Aug. 8 as compared to 394 students on the same date a year ago. The figures indicate a 35 per cent increase in new students. "Based on the increased preregistration, it is anticipated that the fall term enrollment will approximate 1,000 students," Howard Rowe, registrar, said. "Because of the number of students who have graduated and the smaller freshman enrollment in 1962, the number of second year students should remain approximately the same."

Freshman students are scheduled to arrive on the campus on Sept. 25 for orientation and registration. Classes will begin on Sept. 30.

OTI Staff To Schedule Plan Meet

A planning conference scheduled at Diamond Lake Aug. 25 to 29 will be the kickoff event of the 1962-64 school year for administrative personnel at Oregon Tech. Dr. R. E. Lieualen, Chancellor of the State System of Higher Education, will participate in the meeting.

The primary purpose of the occasion, according to President W. D. Purvine, is to re-evaluate and re-emphasize the long-range goals and objectives of the institution.

Oregon Tech was placed in the State System of Higher Education on July 1, 1960, by action of the 1959 state legislature and was concurrently directed to offer that which lies between that offered by the 4-year baccalaureate degree granting institutions and that offered by the community-junior colleges. Guidelines for the future development of Oregon Tech have been established by the State Board of Higher Education. It is in line with these policies and directives that the agenda for the planning conference is being developed.

Members of the faculty are scheduled to return to duty on Sept. 9. At this date only one new instructor has been hired. He will arrive on Sept. 3 for a week of orientation.

Parents Get College Note

University of Oregon President Arthur S. Flemming has sent letters to parents of all non-freshman university students under the age of 21 years informing them that they may apply for permission for their children to live off the campus.

The letter included a memorandum from Donald M. DuShane setting forth his reasons for believing that it is to the best interests of students under 21 to live in university dormitories or in organized living groups, such as cooperatives, sororities and fraternities.

"I hope that you will give careful consideration to the views of those who have spent a great many years working in this area," President Flemming wrote. "If however, after giving consideration to those views you conclude that you would like to request permission for your son or daughter to live off the campus, we will give your request careful consideration."

If parents decide to ask permission for their son or daughter to live off the campus, the application must be filed by Aug. 23.

Dean DuShane's memorandum points out that for some years it has been the university's policy to require undergraduate women under the age of 21 to live in dormitories or organized living groups, but this rule has not applied to sophomore and new policy, housing rules are to be the same for both men and women.

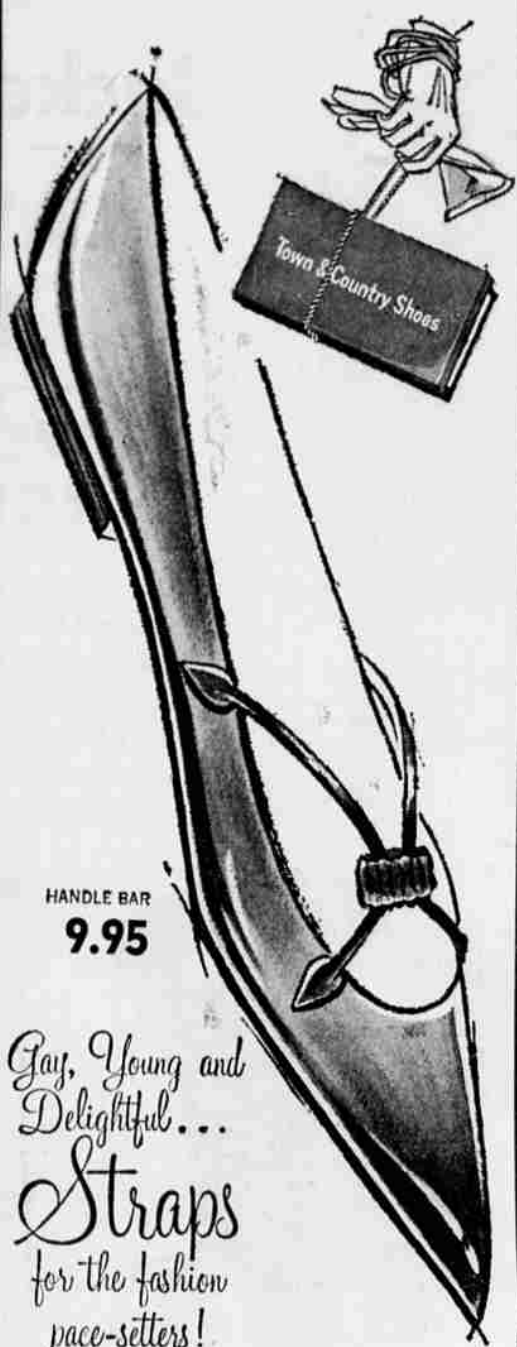
This means that all freshmen must live in dormitories or organized groups, but other students under 21, both men and women, may live off the campus if their parent's signed application is approved.
