ATLANTA (UPI) — Wallace Butts was on record Saturday in his \$10 million libel suit against the Saturday Evening Post with an emphatic denial that he conspired to rig the 1962 Alabama-Georgia football game.

Moffitt, Hard Team For Victory

CLEVELAND (UPI) — Steady Darlene Hard and exuberant Billie Jean Moffitt teamed Saturday to down the British team of Ann Haydon-Jones and Christine Truman, 4-4, 7-5, 6-2, to give the United States a 2-1 lead in the Wightman Cup tennis matches.

Miss Hard of Long Beach, Calif., lost the opening singles match to the left-handed Mrs. Jones, who rallied for a 6-1, 0-6, 8-6 triumph. But Miss Moffitt, also of Long Beach, Calif., evened the matches at 1-1 by outlasting Miss Truman in the other singles match, 6-4, 10-7.

Miss Hard had trouble with her service in the singles and double-faulted at least eight times to give Mrs. Jones the edge in play. After dropping the first match, Miss Hard breezed to an easy 6-0 victory and appeared to be on her way when in the third match, after jumping to a 3-0 lead, the British lass rallied and took the set to give Britain the lead.

Miss Moffitt proved to be a durable teenager when she evened the score at 1-1 by defeating the stoic Miss Truman, 6-4, 10-7. The long second set established a new Wightman Cup record for length of the match and took one hour and 40 minutes to play.

In the doubles, the British women jumped to a 3-0 lead in the first set by breaking both Miss Hard's and Miss Moffitt's services. Miss Hard, whose erratic service caused her trouble in her singles match, had her service broken twice in the opening double set which lasted 19 minutes.

The second set took 23 minutes to complete and went into the American column when Mrs. Jones' serve was shattered with the U.S. holding a 6-5 advantage. Miss Moffitt, whose cries of delight and pinpoint placement shots thrilled the crowd, started the final doubles set with a love game. The Americans then broke Mrs. Jones' service in the third game and Miss Truman's in the fifth to set the victory pattern.

Three singles matches and another doubles will be played Sunday, the final day of play.

for the libel suit hearing in the gold-draped federal courtroom here recessed for the weekend. The "round little man" of college football testified for three and a half hours in a sometimes jumpy, sometimes serious vein. Part of his appearance put him on the courtroom floor to explain the tricky football plays with fancy footwork. He also diagrammed, as three coaches before him have done during the trial, football formations.

Looks At Jury
Butts looked squarely at the jury, made up of 12 businessmen, when he denied that he gave University of Georgia football secrets to Alabama coach Paul (Bear) Bryant prior to the game last September in which Alabama trounced Georgia 35 to 0.

The Post, in an article called "The Story of a College Football Fix," said Butts passed vital information in an attempt to fix the game's score.

Butts acknowledged under questioning that he knew and associated with Frank Scobey of Chicago but added that he never knew Scobey made bets.

Scobey, identified by the Senate rackets committee as a man who at one time placed heavy bets on horse racing and football games with a gambling syndicate in Terre Haute, Ind., has made a deposition in the suit but it has not been read and entered into the court testimony.

Confirms Phone Talks
Butts said he was a "good friend" of Scobey and had talked by telephone to him several times prior to the controversial game. He said he made 10 or 11 calls to Scobey in September, 1962, including one call on the day of the football contest.

The Post said in the alleged fix article last March that Atlanta insurance man George Burnett accidentally overheard a telephone conversation between Butts and Bryant in which Butts gave Bryant important secret information about the Georgia team.

Butts was athletic director at Georgia at the time of the alleged incident. He resigned from that position last February. Bryant denied in court Thursday that he had received any information from Butts. Bryant also has a libel suit pending against the Post as a result of the article.

Butts is due for further cross examination by Post attorneys when the trial resumes (at 11 a.m., EDT) Monday.

Musial's Single Gives Cards Win
MILWAUKEE (UPI) — Stan Musial's ninth inning pinch single started a two run rally which gave St. Louis a 6-5 victory over the Milwaukee Braves Saturday and snapped a three game Cardinal losing streak.

Musial went in to bat for right-handed reliever Ron Taylor, who got credit for his seventh victory of the year. Musial's base hit scored George Altman, who had doubled and moved to third on a ground out. That run broke up a 4-4 tie. The Cardinals added their final run on a pair of singles by Julian Javier and Dick Groat.

Cubs Defeat New York Mets, 4-0
NEW YORK (UPI) — Ellis Burton's two-run homer in the ninth inning ignited a four-run rally that carried the Chicago Cubs to a 4-0 victory Saturday and enabled Larry Jackson to maintain his perfect lifetime record against the New York Mets.

Jackson has now beaten New York six straight times without a defeat over the past two seasons and has held the Mets to one run in three games against them this year.

The veteran Cubs right-hander gave up seven hits Saturday, including three by Ron Hunt, as he registered his 13th victory against 10 defeats and snapped a three-game winning streak by the Mets.

Galen Cisco, who suffered his 11th loss in 18 decisions, checked the Cubs on two hits through the first eight innings. He was locked in a scoreless duel with Jackson until Lou Brock led off the ninth with a single and Burton followed with his eighth homer into the upper rightfield stands.

Pitcher Unfurls Brilliant Game

KELLOGG, Idaho — The Klamath Falls Babe Ruth contingent showed its style here Friday night as it downed previously unbeaten Aberdeen, Wash., 3-1 behind the brilliant two-hit pitching performance of Bob Moore and remained in the running for the regional title.

The victory put the Nationals of Klamath into the semifinal game Saturday afternoon against the team which beat them, Great Falls, Mont. The winner of that game played Aberdeen's team for the regional championship Saturday night in a 7:30 game.

Moore pitched one of his finest games of the season. He gave up only one hit in the fourth to John Augustine, the catcher, which drove in the lone Washington run. The other hit was a single in the seventh with two away. Moore struck out 10 in his fine performance against the heavy-hitting Washington crew.

The Klamath team got some able assistance from a pair of Washington errors which enabled the locals to score two of the three runs via the unearned route despite out-hitting Washington by 9-2.

This was the first loss for Washington. They had beaten Idaho, 16-3, Wyoming, 7-2, and Montana, 4-1. Pitcher Mike Alexey lost his first game of the season after winning 11 in succession. It was Moore's 12th victory with one loss.

It was a must victory for the Nationals and they played like true champions. Moore was superb in his role and he had plenty of backing both at bat and in the field. Opposing pitcher Alexey had the Nationals swinging at air most of the time. He whiffed 13 Nationals while giving up the nine hits.

Klamath got a pair of runners on, sandwiched in between strikeouts in the first inning but was unable to score as Alexey struck out the side. Moore got the first batter to ground out back to him and then struck out the next two.

The Nationals got their first run in the second inning. Bobby Williams, who has had a tremendous tournament, led off with a double to left and scored the only legitimate run for the Nationals when Greg Brostherous hit another double right behind him to chase Williams home. He got third on a wild pitch after Arle DeGroot's infield single but died there when Rick Brostherous and Mike McNery whiffed.

Moore, meanwhile, put the first eight batters down in order before issuing his first walk of the game to opposing pitcher Alexey. He got Dan Martin to ground out for the third out.

The top of the fourth found the Nationals scoring the run which gave them the victory. Greg Brostherous led off by grounding out but Alan Meizer hit a tremendous triple to right centerfield. DeGroot tried to squeeze Meizer home and he was caught in a rundown. And when it seemed the third base-

The three ring officials favored Griffith over the Washington, D.C., veteran as follows: referee Arthur Mercante, 6-3-1; judge Joe Armstrong, 8-1-1; and judge Tony Castellano, 6-3-1. The United Press International agreed, 8-2.

Mims' best rounds were the third and 10th. Holly attacked furiously in the 10th and barged Emile about the ring with long-range punches.

Griffith, favored at 4-1, gave Mims such a battering in the sixth round that it seemed Holly might not last the distance. Mims took much punishment in the seventh, eighth and ninth, and brought the fans to their feet with his final-round rally in the 10th.

It was Griffith's 37th victory in 41 bouts and Mims' 24th defeat in 87.

Oregon Tech's Football Fortunes Appear Brighter

The Oregon Tech football coaching staff hasn't been idle this summer, or since last football season ended for that matter. And attesting this fact is that some outstanding gridlers will be coming into the school this fall.

This is the first of a series of short articles on the 1963 fortunes of the Owls and the rebuilding job done by the coaching staff of head mentor Ron Pfeister, backfield coach Howard Morris and line coach Larry Burleson. The Owl coaching staff came in a packaged deal last fall without the benefit of having a chance to recruit for themselves. Thus the Owls had a pretty bad season. But the hope abounds abundantly this season.

The 1963 Owl football squad will field one of the finest small college backfields in the nation. Call it fate or good fortune but the Owl coaching staff has recruited seven outstanding grid stars as potential starters in the Owl backfield.

At the quarterback spot will be Horace Hopson, 5'11" 180 lbs. is a former junior college All-American from Richmond, Calif. Hopson is backed up by Lloyd Smith, a freshman from Coos Bay. Smith was the field general for two seasons at Marshfield High.

The offensive halfbacks spots will be filled by a pair of former teammates at Greys Harbor Junior College. Gerald Luke, 6'1" 190, and Jim Hahar, 6'1" 210, have been tagged the "lightning twins" by former coaches. Both boys combine speed with power and the results are always good.

Griffith Cops Win Over Mims
SARATOGA SPRING, N.Y. (UPI) — Welterweight champion Emile Griffith forced middleweight contender Holly Mims around the ring Saturday night with left jabs and over-hand rights, and won a unanimous decision in their nationally televised non-title 10-round fight.

Griffith of New York, making his first start since winning the 147-pound crown a record third time from Luis Rodriguez on June 8, coupled his forcing tactics with a body attack in a fight that drew cheers from the 4,000 in 70-year-old Convention Hall.

Griffith, 25, and weighing 150 1/2 pounds to 154 1/2 for his 34-year-old opponent, made certain that he gave Mims very little punching room.

There were no knockdowns. However, Mims—who never has been floored nor stopped in his 16-year career of 87 fights, had his knees buckled in the sixth and ninth rounds. And he in turn shook up Griffith in the third round.

Siebert hit his 12th homer in the ninth against Ted Abernathy after Jose Tartabull led off the inning with a walk. The Indians made three sacrifices in the fifth inning to tie the major league record set by Cleveland in 1940 and tied by the Chicago Cubs last season.
