Two-Room School Gives Sound Education To 36

Council Planned For Math Teachers

A group of 36 pupils in Fort Klamath will get a sound fundamental education in grades one through six thanks to two dedicated teachers.

Mrs. Frank Strahan enters her 21st consecutive year of teaching when school opens on Sept. 3. Mrs. Strahan will teach grades one through three, and Mrs. Hollis Kizer grades four through six.

Prior to six years ago, Mrs. Strahan taught five grades in a one-room school. The sixth grade was added and Mrs. Kizer joined the staff.

The school has two classrooms and enrollment is expected to be just about the same this year as last. Mrs. Strahan will have 17 in her classes and Mrs. Kizer the remaining 19.

During the past summer, much remodeling and renovating work has been done to the classrooms. The interiors have been completely redecorated, new desks have been installed in Mrs. Strahan's rooms, replacing the old ones.

Mrs. William C. Martin will begin her ninth year as school bus driver. She covers a territory that ranges from the southern boundary of Crater Lake National Park to near Chiloquin. She began driving bus in 1951, continued to 1956 and then resumed the job in 1959.

The present school board consists of Elmore Nicholson, chairman; Mrs. William Brown and Mrs. Edwin Scott.

Denies Charges

PNOM PENH, Cambodia (UPI) — Cambodia Saturday denied charges by Thailand that it had massed troops along the Thai border. Secretary of State for Information Chan Seng said Thailand was trying to camouflage its own troop concentrations in the same area.

Mathematics instructors and specialists from throughout the country will gather at the University of Oregon Aug. 22-24 for the 23rd summer meeting of the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics.

The three-day session will include talks by noted speakers, approximately 30 section meetings for educators at all grade levels, exhibits and demonstrations. Wendell C. Hall of North Eugene High School is general chairman of coordinating and planning for the conference.

Arthur S. Fleming, university president, will welcome delegates and Dr. G. Polya, Stanford University, will present the first major address at the Aug. 22 general session. His topic is "Choosing Instructional Problems."

Other conference speakers and their topics will be Andrew M. Gleason, Harvard University, "Information Theory"; Raymond H. Wilson, National Aeronautics and Space Administration, "The Importance of Mathematics in the Space Age"; Dr. John H. Furby, author and lecturer, "Countdown for Tomorrow"; and Thornton Page, Wesleyan University, "Public Understanding of Science and Mathematics."

University of Oregon faculty members participating in the conference will be Clarence W. Schminke, assistant professor of education; Eugene Maier, associate professor of mathematics; A. F. Moursund, head of the Department of Mathematics, and George Struble, assistant professor of mathematics and research associate, Statistical Laboratory and Computing Center.

Local math teachers in charge of various phases of the meeting are Scott D. McFadden, Kenneth Kienzie, Vernon Kerley, and William Best, all of Eugene; Allen Benwick and Wilma Wilson, Springfield; Belle W. Smith, Junction City; and Stella Holt, Cottage Grove.

Highlights of the conference will be a reception from 8 to 9 p.m., Thursday, Aug. 22, in the ballroom of the Erb Memorial Student Union; a banquet Friday, Aug. 23, and a Saturday luncheon, both to be held in the student union.
