

Police Keep Watch In Jersey City Where Negro Girl Fatally Wounded

Police kept extra patrols today in a Jersey City, N. J., neighborhood where a Negro girl was slain by a white man during a racial disturbance Saturday. The suspect was to be arraigned today in the shotgun killing.

In Mississippi a river ferryboat turned around in mid-stream Sunday to bring into custody 25 whites and Negroes who refused to use segregated waiting rooms. Police and sheriff's deputies at Flaquerine, La., arrested the group brought to shore by the ferryboat's captain. Officers said they would be charged with resisting arrest.

Ronnie Moore, a field secretary for the Congress of Racial Equality (CORE), said witnesses told him officers used their shoe heels to break the "passive-resistance armlock" of the group. Officers denied any brutality.

At Lexington, N. C., police stepped between angry whites and Negroes outside a jail where three Negro youths were being held for the slaying of a white man in a race riot June 6.

The Negroes knelt and prayed outside the jail, and then Charles Poole — brother of one of the jailed Negroes — exchanged hot words with white hecklers.

When the white and Negro groups moved toward each other, police quickly took up positions in the middle of the street to keep them apart.

Other integration developments: Tuscaloosa, Ala.: James A.

Hood, 21, one of two Negro students who entered the all-white University of Alabama under federal guard two months ago, quit to "avoid a complete mental and physical breakdown."

Hood, 21, apparently faced imminent expulsion for criticizing state and university officials. He said he hoped to return to the university, but school officials said he could not come back until after a hearing on charges he publicly and unfairly accused officials of trying to get him expelled.

Timber Parcels Sold At Medford District Auction

Eleven parcels of timber containing 23,328,000 board feet were offered at oral auction by the Medford District, Bureau of Land Management on Aug. 8, 1963. Of these, nine parcels of timber were sold at a bid price of \$438,896.90. Two parcels of windthrown timber — 95,000 board feet in Klamath County and 249,000 board feet in Josephine County — received no bids. These parcels will be held open for a period of 90 days, during which time bids for not less than the appraised price will be received.

Purchasers of the nine parcels included Parker Industries, Inc., of Ashland; Timber Products Co. of Medford; Cheney Forest Products and Double Dee Lumber Co. of Central Point; Freeman Higgenbotham, Caveam Lumber Co.

and Brown Bros. Lumber Co. of Grants Pass; M & Y Lumber Co. of Selma; and Superior Logging Co. of Glendale.

The sale price of the parcel purchased by Timber Products Co. was \$175,618.30, and the appraised price \$149,214.35; a sale price of the parcel purchased by Parker Industries, Inc. was \$39,381.35, and the appraised price \$39,094.05; the sale price of the parcel purchased by Caveam Lumber Co. was \$113,735, and the appraised price \$1,063.05. The remaining six parcels of timber were sold at the appraised prices.

Kopag Manufacturing Co., Douglas Fir Plywood, Robert Dollar Co., Crater Plywood, Mt. Fir Lumber Co., Voward Lewis, and K. O. Reedy were also qualified bidders.

On Sept. 12 the Medford District will offer three parcels of timber at oral auction, according to District Manager Donald J. Schofield. The estimated volume is 13,456,000 board feet and the appraised price is \$258,354.90. These parcels are located in Klamath, Jackson, and Josephine counties. One of these consists of windthrown timber resulting from the Columbus Day storm.

Fund Campaign Outlook Good

"Firms in this year's United Fund campaign Pilot Division have been accepting with enthusiasm the first feelers sent out by pilot division representatives and there is some indication that some of the firms' donations will far exceed last year's contributions," Henry Kerr, Pilot Division chairman, said Friday.

The firms number 12 and represent a total of about 2,000 employees. Among them are Cascade Laundry, represented by Ed Jensen; Klamath Hardwoods, Andy Hozzel; Montgomery Ward, Bob Gotshall; Southern Pacific, Earl Votaw; Great Northern, Tom Lamphier; Klamath Lumber and Box, Henry Kerr; Pacific Northwest Bell, Brooks Dickerman; Sears, Roebuck, Bill Ganter; Her and News, Bill Sweetland; Modoc Lumber Company, Lawrence Shaw; Pacific Power and Light, Sam Ritchey, and Weyerhaeuser, Herb Shults.

Firm representatives indicated that a soft sell attitude will be taken this year by employers and solicitors with particular emphasis placed on educating the employees to the need the fund provides for and the exact services given by the recipient agencies.

Some of the most important aspects of this year's campaign are: The fair share giving of one hour a month for a year by pay-

roll deduction, all soliciting will be done at place of employment, no general house-to-house campaign, one campaign in place of several, and a campaign of a one-month duration.

The idea behind the front running Pilot Division campaign, which will run from Aug. 20 to Sept. 20, is to get a chance to try all campaign techniques and to develop better organization for the community campaign, running from Oct. 1 to 31.

"Once the organization is done, it shouldn't take more than two or three weeks to complete the community campaign," Kerr said.

Another reason for the forerunner is to give organizers an opportunity to anticipate the success of the main campaign by the success of the pilot division venture.

The indications received so far are good. For instance three pilot firms already accepted goals 40 per cent higher than last year's contributions.

Firm representatives are planning to have one volunteer solicitor for eight to 10 employees. If this system proves successful it will be carried through the main campaign effort.

The Pacific Power and Light Company and Pacific Northwest Bell again this year will be competing for the coveted "Bean Pot" prize in a little company rivalry.

This type of competition is seen as a good means of bringing some fun into the fund raising.

Firm volunteers already are proceeding in their organization work. Most of them went on a tour of the United Oregon Appeal Agencies in Portland last month to see first hand the agencies supported by local efforts.

The men have also seen a film on United Fund campaign organization narrated by Walter Cronkite. The film is available to any of the pilot firms to aid in organization and give solicitors a better idea of how their job is done.

Herb Shults, rough lumber supervisors at Weyerhaeuser and vice chairman of the pilot division, said his firm is wholeheartedly behind the United Fund idea and pledges its participation at a later date despite the present difficulties of the firms and its employees.

This trip involved a flight of just more than an hour, so communications was no great problem. The President said to use the Jet-Star.

Park Tour Scheduled In Portland

National Parks Service Director Conrad Wirth and representatives from three other governmental agencies will accompany the State Parks and Recreation Advisory Committee and State Highway Department officials on a three-day inspection tour beginning in Portland on Monday, Aug. 19.

The group will inspect facilities and operations of each agency involved in recreational activities as well as consider their future development plans.

Representatives of the governmental agencies, both federal and state, plan closer coordination among all interested agencies in development of Oregon recreation areas. Besides the National Park Service, the other federal agencies involved are the Bureau of Land Management, U.S. Forest Service, and Bureau of Outdoor Recreation.

The bus tour begins in Portland and will be routed up the Columbia River Highway, then south to Bend, Crater Lake, Klamath Falls, Grants Pass and ends at Medford Wednesday afternoon. En route members will inspect development of the Cove Palisades State Park, the Pineville Reservoir Recreational Area, overnight camping units under construction in Collier Park, Crater Lake, Valley of the Rogue and Diamond Lake.

P. M. Stephenson, assistant state highway engineer, and five members of the Parks and Recreation Division of the Highway Department plan to be on the tour.

The Advisory Committee includes Chairman Loran Stewart and members Alfred E. Collier, Klamath Falls; Donald G. McGregor, Grants Pass; Leslie Sparks, Salem; Ernest Fantland, Condon; and George Henderson of Portland.

The other three agency men scheduled for the trip are Eugene V. Zumwalt, assistant director of the Bureau of Land Management, Washington, D.C.; Walter Hopkins, director of the program in recreation research, U.S. Forest Service, Washington, D.C.; and Fred J. Overly, field director, Seattle, Bureau of Outdoor Recreation.

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Nine Killed In Oregon Accidents

Accidents claimed nine lives in Oregon during the weekend. Five persons were killed in traffic crashes, three drowned and one died in a house fire.

Warren Schell, 23, Albany, drowned while swimming in Waverly Lake at Albany Sunday afternoon. His body was recovered.

Dale Hawes, 4, Salem, was killed in a three-vehicle accident on State Highway 22 five miles west of Salem Sunday morning.

The child was in a small bus which was struck from the rear by a car and knocked into the path of a semi-truck and trailer.

Mrs. Joan Hoffman, 49, Redmond, was killed in a two-car, head-on collision on U.S. Highway 97, 12 miles south of Madras early Sunday.

James Kelly, 37, Crescent City, Calif., drowned while swimming in the Rogue River 3 1/2 miles east of Gold Beach Saturday night. His body was recovered.

Bobby Hansen, 44, died of smoke inhalation in a fire at his home at Beaverton Saturday night.

Trena Dummire, 19-month-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Arden Dummire of Oregon City was crushed when she fell from her parents' car at an Oregon City drive-in theater Saturday night. The vehicle's wheels rolled over her.

Two California women were killed in a two-car accident on Interstate 5, 12 miles south of Roseburg Saturday. They were Martha Imfeld, 66, Pacheco, and Josie Burgi, 63, Oakland.

Dale Perry, 32, Oceanside, drowned in a boating accident in Netarts Bay Saturday. His body was not recovered.

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Pesticides Found

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Traces of pesticides have been found in research tests on the bald eagle, America's vanishing national symbol, the Interior Department reported today.

But the department drew no conclusions about whether the pesticide — DDT — is actually harmful to the bird, which numbered only 3,807 in a January, 1962, survey.

Specimens of 25 out of 26 bald eagles tested by the Fish and Wildlife Service contained DDT, frequently used to kill mosquitoes, the report said.

It said that "A marked lack of breeding success in coastal areas... has led some people to suspect that these areas, which are frequently treated for mosquito control, are producing contaminated fish that make up a large part of the eagles' diet."

The department said it is continuing its research into the effect of DDT on the declining eagle population.

Beaverton Firm Registers Stock

NEW YORK (UPI) — Tektronix, Inc., of Beaverton, Ore., said today it has registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission an issue of 340,000 shares of common stock to be underwritten by a group headed by Lehman Bros.

Of the issue, 100,000 shares are to be offered on behalf of the company and 440,000 on behalf of certain existing stockholders.

Proceeds from the 100,000 shares to be offered by the company will be added to working capital.

The company makes cathode ray oscilloscopes in 40 different models for the electronic industry.
