Three Indians Held In Pistol-Whipping Case

Three Klamath Indians are being held by police in Chilcoquin today in connection with the pistol-whipping of a 24-year-old Toppenish, Wash., man who was found unconscious in a ditch by a passing motorist, near the Old Kirk Road, Agency Lake Road, early Sunday evening, Oregon State Police have reported.

In satisfactory condition at Klamath Valley Hospital this morning was John D. Whittington, subject of the beating. Doctors were to examine X-rays of the victim later today to determine the extent of his injuries.

Meanwhile, three Indians who were arrested soon after Whittington was transferred by Chilcoquin ambulance to the local hospital were to be arraigned in the Wood River Court on charges not related to the beating.

They were Lewis Harvey Gibbons and Fred Ryan Hunt, both charged with being drunk on a public highway, and Donald H. Hitt Switlik, held on possession of a concealed weapon.

After their arraignment by District Judge Walt Zimmerman, the three defendants, all of Beatty, were to be transferred to Klamath Falls where Whittington was to establish whether or not they were his assailants.

Whittington was discovered in the ditch by a motorist and a companion about 8:45 p.m. They contacted Chilcoquin police who, in turn reported the incident to state police and the county sheriff's office.

Herbicide Testimony Collected

TULELAKE — Testimony taken at the California Department of Agriculture hearing held Aug. 8, at Tulelake, pertaining to the use of 2,4-D or other injurious herbicides, has been forwarded to the California Director of Agriculture, Charles Paul of Sacramento for study.

The hearing in the Sportsman's Hotel, was the results of nine complaints, eight in Modoc County and one in Siskiyou County, on damages to onion crops and yards through use of the weed killers.

Some 60 persons, including agricultural specialists, crop dusters and ranchers attended the all-day meeting.

Consensus of opinion was that the problem was a local one and agreement could be reached here. Damage to onion fields, according to experts, appears to be not too serious.

A Mr. Cohen of Sacramento was hearing officer. Other officials and specialists were Allen Lemmon, chief of the Division of Plant Industry and two supervising officers, John Hillis and Joe Shoemaker, Sacramento; Jess Grisham, Siskiyou County Agricultural Commissioner, Yreka; Loring White, Modoc County Agricultural Commissioner; William Huse, Siskiyou County Agriculture Inspector, Tulelake; LeRoy Smith, Modoc County Agriculture Inspector; Murray Pryor, state herbicide expert, county supervisors and farm advisers.

Also present were commercial crop dusters and other herbicide distributors.

Demurrer Denied

Circuit Judge Don Sanders of Roseburg has denied a demurrer requesting that contempt of court charges against Klamath County Sheriff Murray "Red" Britton be set aside. The date for the trial will be set later.

The sheriff had been cited on the contempt charge by the district attorney's office for allegedly discussing the Robert Huitt case with a member of the jury who had been assigned to the trial, then in session. As a result of the conversation the case was later declared a mistrial.

Huitt, charged with assault with a dangerous weapon, was acquitted during a subsequent trial which ended last week.

County Clerk Charles DeLap said he had not yet been informed that the demurrer was denied.

Judge Sanders was named by Chief Justice William McAllister to preside over the case when the Klamath County Circuit Court requested the supreme court to appoint a disinterested jurist to conduct the trial.

The accident occurred as Routh, westbound, applied his brakes to allow a deer to cross the highway in front of him. A third car, driven by William Richard Morrison, 21, an OTI student, was unable to stop in time to avert collision with the rear of Rice's car. The impact battered the vehicle into the rear of the truck, causing minor damage to it but extensive damage to the other vehicles.
