Eagles Lose Fullback Peaks As Injuries Begin To Hit

The Philadelphia Eagles, who were known around the National Football League circuit last year as the "broken bone brigade," are at it again.

Fullback Clarence Peaks, the Eagles' leading ball-carrier in 1960 and 1961, suffered an elbow injury in the Eagles-Baltimore Colts clash last Saturday night. Although Peaks was originally expected to be out of action for three weeks, further examination showed a chipped fracture of the ulna bone on the left arm.

As a result the Eagles, whose staggering injury list last year was a major factor in the club's plunge to the Western Division cellar after a second-place finish in 1961, will lose Peaks' services for approximately six weeks.

The Detroit Lions inserted flankerback Terry Barr at quarterback in Monday's workout. The reason for the move was to provide a back-up man for Earl Morrill in case of injury. Morrill, the Lions' regular signal-caller, was injured in Saturday's game with the Cleveland Browns. Detroit also placed rookies Pete O'Brien, Karl Kasulke and Don King on waivers.

View Game Films
Coach Al Sherman of the New York Giants, who meet the Lions in the first game of a double-header at Cleveland Saturday night, was particularly pleased with the play of veteran back Hugh McElhenney in Saturday's game with the Chicago Bears after viewing game films Monday. Another veteran, Alex Webster, also was praised by Sherman.

The Cleveland Browns' head

coach, Blanton Collier, also spent Monday watching game films and said he was "much more encouraged" over the team's progress. He added that the defensive line did "an exceptional job" in last Saturday's Browns-Lions game.

Although coach Buddy Parker's Pittsburgh Steelers were soundly whipped by the Green Bay Pack-

ers last Saturday night, Parker was philosophical about the defeat. "You don't spot the champions two weeks of practice and a game and expect to beat them," he said.

In other NFL developments the Baltimore Colts released Dave Yohn, second-year linebacker, and the Los Angeles Rams cut six rookies—Gerald Barto, Dick Faris, Earl McQuiston, Walter Kirk, Dennis Murphy and Harold Daniels—in addition to veteran Clancy Osborne.

FCAC Begins In Ashland

ASHLAND (UPI)—The Fellowship of Christian Athletes Conference, one of three being held in the United States this summer, opened Sunday at Southern Oregon College. It runs through Friday.

Some 450 athletes from throughout the western U.S. are expected to attend.

Other participants include UCLA track coach Duffy Drake, ex-football player Don Moomaw and Dan Towler; football coaches Jim Owens of Washington, Paul Durham of Linfield and Len Casanova of Oregon; basketball star Bob Pettit, and former pitcher Bob Feller.

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Mentor Denies Rigging Of Game

ATLANTA (UPI)—Wallace Butts, former Georgia athletic director, broke down in tears Monday and again denied a Saturday Evening Post story that said he conspired to rig the 1962 Georgia-Alabama football game.

Sobbing audibly and his body shaking, Butts was led from the witness stand, and a five-minute recess was declared in the trial of his \$10 million libel suit against the Post.

Butts buried his head in his arms on a table and sobbed uncontrollably. His wife and three daughters, sitting nearby, also were crying, and his attorney had difficulty controlling his emotions.

Testimony from the onetime coach came as the second week of the trial got under way and as direct testimony drew near an end in the case.

The trial was scheduled to resume at 10 a.m., EST today, and is expected to be concluded Wednesday at the latest.

Returns To Stand
John Carmichael, Atlanta real estate and insurance man, was scheduled to resume testimony.

William Schroder, attorney for Butts, said Carmichael may be his last witness.

Carmichael is the boss of George Burnett, the Atlanta man who said he was accidentally cut into a long distance call between Butts and coach Paul (Bear) Bryant of Alabama last September. Burnett's notes were the basis of the Post story of last March which said Bryant and Butts conspired to rig the game.

Bryant has a separate \$10 million libel suit pending against the magazine.

Butts broke down on the stand when his attorney read a Post editorial which said Butts and Bryant "fixed" the game. He asked Butts if the editorial, or any part of it, were true.

"No sir," Butts replied. "And I'd like to explain. It is not true. Then Butts began sobbing."

Asks About Finances
Post attorney Welborn Cody concluded his cross-examination of Butts with questions about his financial condition. He produced a financial statement Butts signed July 17, 1961, which listed the coach's assets as \$203,988. The attorney asked Butts to explain the financial statement in the light of trial testimony in which he said he had been unemployed and "financially insolvent" since the Post story came out.

Butts replied that there had been a "big change" in his finances since the time of the statement. He said some stock he owned had gone down in value, that he had sold other stock, and borrowed all he could on \$80,000 in life insurance policies.

Cody questioned Butts closely in his cross-examination on such Butts enterprises as real estate, orange groves, fruit juices, scotch whisky, loan companies, restaurants and coffee vending machines.

Earlier, Butts testified that telephone calls he made to Chicago beer distributor Frank Scobey were for "business reasons," including one on the day of the controversial game between the two schools. Scobey has been identified by the Senate racketeering committee as a man who beat heavily with a gambling syndicate on football games and horse races.

Former All-America football players Charley Trippi, who gained fame when Butts was Georgia coach, and Lee Roy Jordan, a center on the Alabama team last fall, supported Butts' denial of the Post story.

Trippi said he did not think Burnett's notes amounted to anything and added that he would have torn them up.

Explains Calls

Doug Jones Wants \$300,000 To Climb In With Liston

NEW YORK (UPI)—Doug Jones said today he believes he should get "about \$300,000" if he fights heavyweight champion Sonny Liston for the title on home television in December.

New Yorker Jones, who is ranked second only to gaudy Cassius Clay among contenders by both the World Boxing Association and The Ring magazine, rubbed his small black mustache reflectively and added:

"It isn't the money itself. It's just that I don't like to be undervalued. I understand they're willing to pay Liston \$300,000, and since it takes two to tango, I should get the same."

Well-spoken Doug added that the money itself wasn't too important because: "After I take the title from Sonny I'll make a fortune as champion."

Was he sure of taking the title? "I can beat any man in the world," he admitted frankly. And of course that includes Liston.

Managed By Furrier
Doug, 26 and carrying about 180 pounds on his six-foot frame, was chatting in the walnut-paneled office of his manager, Alex Koskowitz, manufacturing furrier, in the garment district.

A reporter reminded Doug that matchmaker Teddy Brenner of Madison Square Garden wanted him to fight Liston in December 1964 for the right to the December shot at Liston.

"That's out!" exclaimed Doug Koskowitz—a stocky, black-haired alert man of 52. "I've turned down the Garden's offer of \$100,000 for a Sept. 20 fight with Terrell."

Then Koskowitz angrily asked why Jones should be forced to fight the lower-rated Chicago skydiver when Jones already was rated second only to top-contender Clay of Louisville.

"I'll fight anybody," explained Doug. "But not if Alex objects to the opponent."

"And I do object," said the manager. "After all, besides your ranking, both you and Terrell fought Zora Folley. You knocked him out in the seventh round last December. But Terrell had a hard time out-pointing him on July 27 at the Garden."

Discusses Weight
What would Doug weigh if he challenged Liston? Sonny scaled 215½ on July 22 when he again knocked out Floyd Patterson in the first round at Las Vegas, Nev.

Doug replied: "I was 194 for

my last fight on June 14, when I outpointed Billy Daniels at Teaneck, N. J. That was the heaviest for any of my fights—and it was too heavy. I was a little chunky that night. For Liston I'd come down to about 185 and be very fast.

Why did Doug figure he could take the heavy crown from Liston, after having failed to win the then-vacant light heavyweight title in a fight with Harold Johnson of Philadelphia in May 1962?

"Because I'm much better now than I was then. I learned, for example, in the Johnson fight that I've got to get off faster with my punches than the other fellow—whichever he is—and I can do it now. Certainly I'm faster than Sonny, and he's a very good fighter. No, I've never

been stopped in my 27 bouts, and was floored only once—in the first round by Folley."

Doug disclosed that he and wife Shirley are expecting another child in October. They already have a 6-year-old daughter, Theresa.

Athletes Send Sternberg Hello

ASHLAND (UPI)—Some 50 delegates attending the Fellowship of Christian Athletes Conference said "hello" to injured University of Washington pole vaulter Brian Sternberg Monday night.
