

Eddie Butler To Give Benefit Organ Concert

To benefit the Air Force Aid Society, the Kingsley Field Officers' Wives' Club is sponsoring an organ concert by Eddie Butler Sunday 2:30 p.m. Aug. 25, at the Kingsley Field Theater.

The public is invited, as well as Air Force personnel and their dependents.

Such selections as Gershwin's "Rhapsody in Blue," "Clair de Lune," and a medley of Viennese waltzes are to be part of the program.

Tickets are available at the Derby Music Company, First Federal Savings and Loan and the Klamath County Chamber of Commerce and will go on sale at the Base Commissary Aug. 14 and 15 and at the Base Exchange Aug. 15.

All proceeds from the concert will go to the Air Force Aid Society, which is concerned with the welfare of Air Force personnel and their dependents.

The society assists Air Force personnel whenever the American National Red Cross and other welfare agencies are unable to offer their services. It operates on funds received from its annual membership drive and voluntary contributions from service personnel and civilians.

Butler, volunteering to present this benefit concert for the Air Force Aid Society, has played the two largest organs in the world during concerts at Atlantic City's Convention Hall and at Philadelphia's Wanamaker Department Store.

Beginning his study of piano at the age of 4 and organ at 7, he became a member of the American Guild of Organists at 14, then the youngest person to join the guild.

Butler said he has been invited to give sacred concerts in St. Peter's Basilica, Rome, and in the Cathedral of Our Lady of Guadalupe, Mexico City.

Benny Goodman began his musical career with orchestras on Lake Michigan excursion boats, according to Britannica Book of the Year.

Mothers Reminded To Observe Safety

Dear Ann Landers: Today is the saddest day of my life. I'm amazed that I can sit down and write a letter after what I've been through, but perhaps it will be good therapy.

This morning we buried my three-year-old niece. Betsy was a beautiful, bright-eyed darling with golden curls. Last week when we saw her at a family picnic she was full of fun and laughter. Everyone adored her.

Today Betsy is dead because her mother left a bottle of pills in the medicine cabinet. The little girl, thinking the pills were candy, ate every last one of them. My sister-in-law found Betsy lying unconscious on the floor and rushed her to the hospital but it was too late.

It is heartbreaking to lose a child because of carelessness is too much to bear. Please print this letter for other mothers to read. It may save some precious young lives.—AUNT MAE

Dear Aunt Mae: It is baffling that some mothers will carry a sweater to school when the weather unexpectedly turns cold yet these same mothers will leave cleaning fluid in pop bottles, pills that look like candy on bathroom cabinet shelves and loaded guns in closets.

Every mother who is reading these words should check shelves, drawers and closets for potential instruments of death. Remember that a large bottle of aspirin, if taken all at once, can kill a child. Remember, too, that children can climb on chairs and wash basins, and reach top shelves. The only safe place for medicines (and guns) is under lock and key.

Thank you for writing, Aunt Mae. It's good to be reminded of what we think we already know.

Dear Ann Landers: I am 17 and going with a boy 19 who works in a minor capacity for my father. My father never liked Alex but he never told me I couldn't go out with him.

Last night Alex came by to take me to a baseball game. I was shocked when I saw him. His hair, which was always slicked back, had a definite curl. You might say it was actually

kinky. I asked him what he did to it and he said his sister gave him a permanent.

My folks discussed Alex's hair this morning. My dad gave me no orders but he did say, "I think that kid is nuts." Do you feel the hair job is reason enough to stop going with him?—PIE FACE

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Reds Still In Moon Race

MOSCOW (UPI) — The Soviet Union Monday marked the first anniversary of the first group space flight with indications it still is shooting for the moon.

Reports published abroad have said the Russians would like to withdraw from the race to the moon, which the United States hopes to reach with a manned-flight by 1970.

Official Soviet sources here, however, have given no indication the Kremlin intends to lessen its efforts in the space race.

Articles in the official press Sunday and today underscored the Soviet space program in connection with the dual flight a year ago of Maj. Andrian Nikolayev and Lt. Col. Pavel Popovich.

It was on Aug. 12, 1962, that Popovich was launched into a parallel orbit with Nikolayev, who had been sent aloft the day before. The two cosmonauts, accomplishing the world's first tandem space flight, both landed Aug. 13.

A second Soviet group space flight was achieved last June by Valery Bykovsky and Valentina Tereshkova, the world's pioneer space woman. They set new records for duration and distance in the cosmos.

A smaller-sized American flag, more suitable for display, is now being prepared by the Veterans Administration for use at veterans' burials, R. J. Novotny, manager of the Portland VA regional office, said recently.

Mail Fraud Trial Dated

PORTLAND (UPI) — Trial of seven Chicago and Los Angeles area men on mail fraud charges in connection with promotion of the Lake Valley subdivision in Eastern Oregon was set for Nov. 25 in Pendleton.

Federal Judge John F. Kilkenney set the new date following arguments on motions by the defendants to dismiss a 17-count indictment on the ground it was vague and uncertain. The judge took the arguments under advisement.

The court agreed to try the case in the Pendleton district after attorneys for the seven defendants indicated they would prefer it there.

The indictment was returned last May 31.
