

High Court Refuses To Order School Opening

RICHMOND, Va. (UPI) — A federal appeals court refused Monday to order Prince Edward County, Va., to reopen its public schools, closed in 1959 to avoid a federal desegregation order.

The ruling, which had been awaited for months, said in effect that the Virginia state courts must first rule in the involved case which had its beginning in the early 1950s and was a part of the Supreme Court's historic 1954 school desegregation ruling.

It meant that the rural county, where an estimated 1,800 Negro students have had no formal education training in four years, apparently will begin its fifth year without public schools next month.

The appeals court ruled 2-1 in the case with Justice J. Spencer Bell dissenting.

"It is tragic that since 1959 the children of Prince Edward County have gone without formal education," Bell said in his dissent.

A hearing in the case is scheduled in October before the Virginia Supreme Court of appeals, the state's highest court.

The federal government, which entered the case as a friend of the court, contended the school closing violated the 14th Amendment of the U. S. Constitution.

But the appeals court dismissed the contention that the amendment requires every state and every school district in every state to operate free public schools.

"There is nothing in the 14th Amendment which requires a state, or any of its political subdivisions with freedom to decide for itself, to provide schooling for any of its citizens," the majority opinion said.

West had one of those light opening bids that many duplicate players feel they must make. They are really apt to boomerang when you are short in spades and sure enough West found himself on lead against Waldy's two spade contract.

He opened the ace of diamonds and continued with a second diamond to his partner's king. East led back the seven of hearts. West won with the jack and returned a low heart. East's ace of hearts won that trick and West's king of hearts was the fifth defensive trick.

West led the seven of clubs and Waldy finally got the lead with dummy's king. He needed the rest of the tricks and the queen of spades had to be found.

Waldy decided to wait a while and cashed dummy's ace of clubs. When West played the eight, Waldy led a third club and ruffed it in his own hand. East showed up with the queen of that suit and the queen of spades was located. West had only nine points outside the spade suit. He would have passed the hand out without that queen. So Waldy played West for it and made the rest of the tricks.

Income Tax Plan Revamped

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Kennedy administration Monday revamped its plan for cutting everybody's income taxes. The new plan, effective next Jan. 1, would provide net reductions of \$10.6 billion, phased over a two-year period.

The revised formula compares with the original plan under which individual and corporate income taxes would have been reduced about \$18.3 billion, with the cuts taking effect in three stages—on July 1, 1963, Jan. 1, 1964, and Jan. 1, 1965.

Treasury Secretary Douglas Dillon outlined the new plan in testimony at a closed session of the House Ways & Means Committee.

The three main elements of the revised plan:

—Individual tax rates would range from 14 to 70 per cent. That compares with the present schedule of 20 to 91 per cent and with the original plan to cut rates to a 14 to 63 per cent range.

—The tax rate on corporations would be cut to 48 per cent. That compares with the present rate of 52 per cent and the original proposal of a 47 per cent rate. The first \$25,000 of corporate income would be taxed at 23 per cent, instead of the existing rate of 30 per cent. The original proposal would have cut this rate to 22 per cent.

—Revisions in the income tax structure would yield \$800 million in new revenue, compared with the \$3.2 billion originally proposed, jettisoning many of the original proposals.

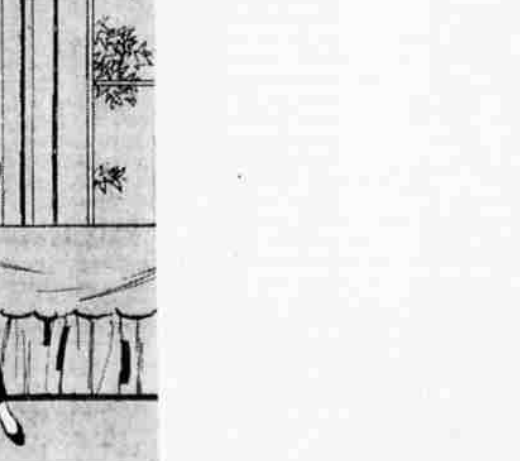
