Delay Offered

The U.S. Marine Corps' special 120-day delay program, which allows a man the opportunity to enlist now and remain at home for up to four months, is still available, Sgt. Robert Wenkheimer, local recruiter, announced.

A man who enlists under this program cannot be drafted because he is enlisted in the Marine Corps reserve and given orders to report for active duty on the date of his choice.

There are no reserve meetings or drills to attend during the delay period. Men who enlist in this program have the advantage of fulfilling four months of their military obligation and earning an increase in pay before reporting for active duty.

Goldwater Says Ban May Open Gap In Missile Defense

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., said today the limited nuclear test ban treaty may well be opening "a possible fatal gap" in U. S. defenses against enemy missile attack.

In a prepared statement, the GOP presidential front runner said that "if this treaty really means that we must abandon efforts to defend ourselves against attack by ICBM, then I would say that we have a clear challenge to the security of this nation."

Such a challenge, he added, "flatly refutes the President's claim that no segment of our national security will be sacrificed should we approve this treaty."

Goldwater took specific note of President Kennedy's Aug. 1 news conference in which he said that the problem of developing a defense against a missile may be beyond the technical feasibility of both the United States and the Soviet Union.

The President said that the difficulty in developing an anti-missile missile involves the questions of selecting the real ICBM from among decoys, and of targeting, more than it does the problem of

developing a nuclear warhead that can blow up incoming rockets.

Goldwater said this news conference statement in effect "seemingly sentenced to death" U. S. program to build an anti-missile defense. He added that there should be "iron clad assurance that anti-missile development will not be inhibited by the treaty or by the president's personal pessimism."

His statement came as Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara told the Senate Foreign Relations Committee's test ban hearings that the treaty will not hurt U. S. efforts to develop an anti-missile missile.

McNamara said that "the best present judgment" is that U. S. efforts to design an anti-missile defense "are comparable in magnitude and success with those of the Soviets."

U.S. Missile Inadequate

He said that "any deployed system which the Soviets are likely

to have in the near future will probably not be as effective, and most certainly not more effective, than the Nike-Zeus." And, he pointedly added, "It should be noted that the U. S. decided not to deploy the Nike-Zeus because its effectiveness was inadequate."

McNamara added that "one important point stands out in connection with the antiballistic missile. The ABM problem is dominated by factors unrelated to the treaty — by reaction speed, missile performance, traffic handling capacity, and capacity for decoy discrimination."

"A fuller understanding of the (communications) blackout phenomenon — which would result from tests prohibited by the treaty — might at most permit some reduction in the number of ABM radars required per ABM site."

Thus, the secretary concluded, "with or without a test ban, we could proceed with the development of an ABM system."

Goldwater said that Kennedy's news conference statement cast serious doubts "upon our defense capabilities and potential as part of his consideration of this treaty. These doubts must be explored here, fully and finally, lest we vote not for peace but for destruction."

The senator, a member of the Armed Services Committee whose members were sitting in on the treaty hearings, noted that the Nike-Zeus missile already has successfully knocked down Atlas missiles in Pacific Ocean tests.

He conceded it was a "primitive defense" at this stage, but all effort should be pushed to improve it. Goldwater said there were strong indications the Soviets were far ahead of the United States in this field, "vastly aided by the successes of their recent atmospheric tests."

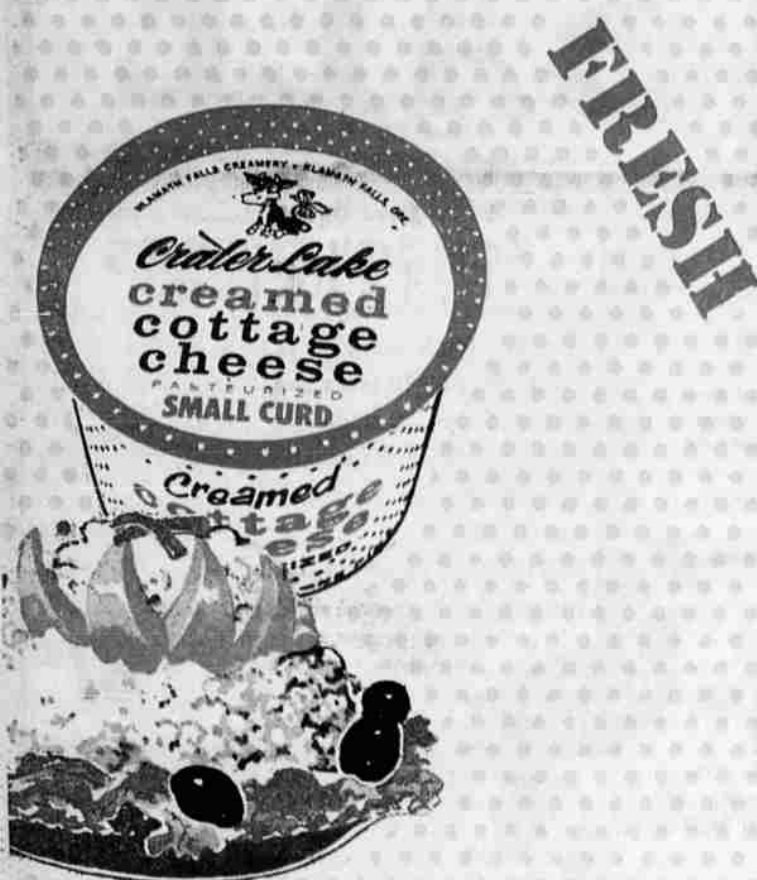
Even a limited missile defense system "can provide some deterrence, can complicate the enemy's

targeting and will offer a measure of protection to the United States," Goldwater asserted. "Now, before it is too late, is the only time we may ever have to make sure that this proposed partial test ban is not opening a possibly fatal gap in our defenses. Our very life as a nation is at stake in this."

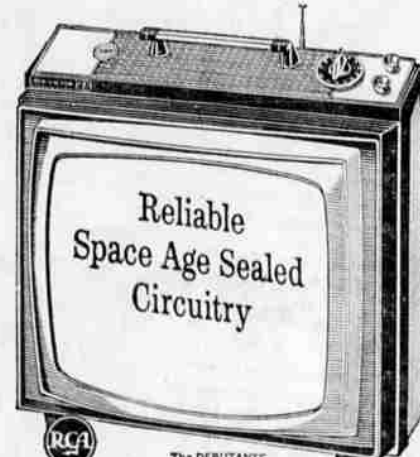

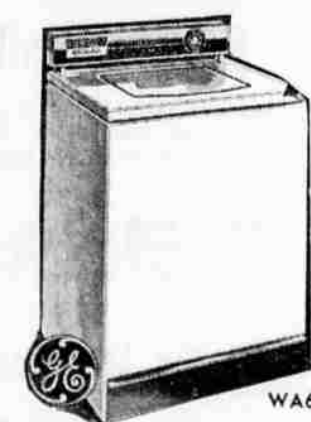
