The Joplin team won in tournament play over Wray, Colo., 6-1, lost to Des Moines, Iowa, beat Wray again, 8-2, topped Williston, N. D., and beat Oskaloosa, Iowa, 9-1. So they also have one loss coming into the series.

The other teams entered are Frankfurt, Germany, the European entry; Atlanta, Ga., Oak Lawn, Ill., Tulsa, Okla., Oakland, Calif., Puerto Rico, Frederick, Md., and Klamath and Joplin. The Klamath-Joplin clash will be Tuesday at noon.

Joplin is one of three repeating teams back. Tulsa and Oakland also have been to the World Series before. Puerto Rico is the first territorial team ever to appear in the series.

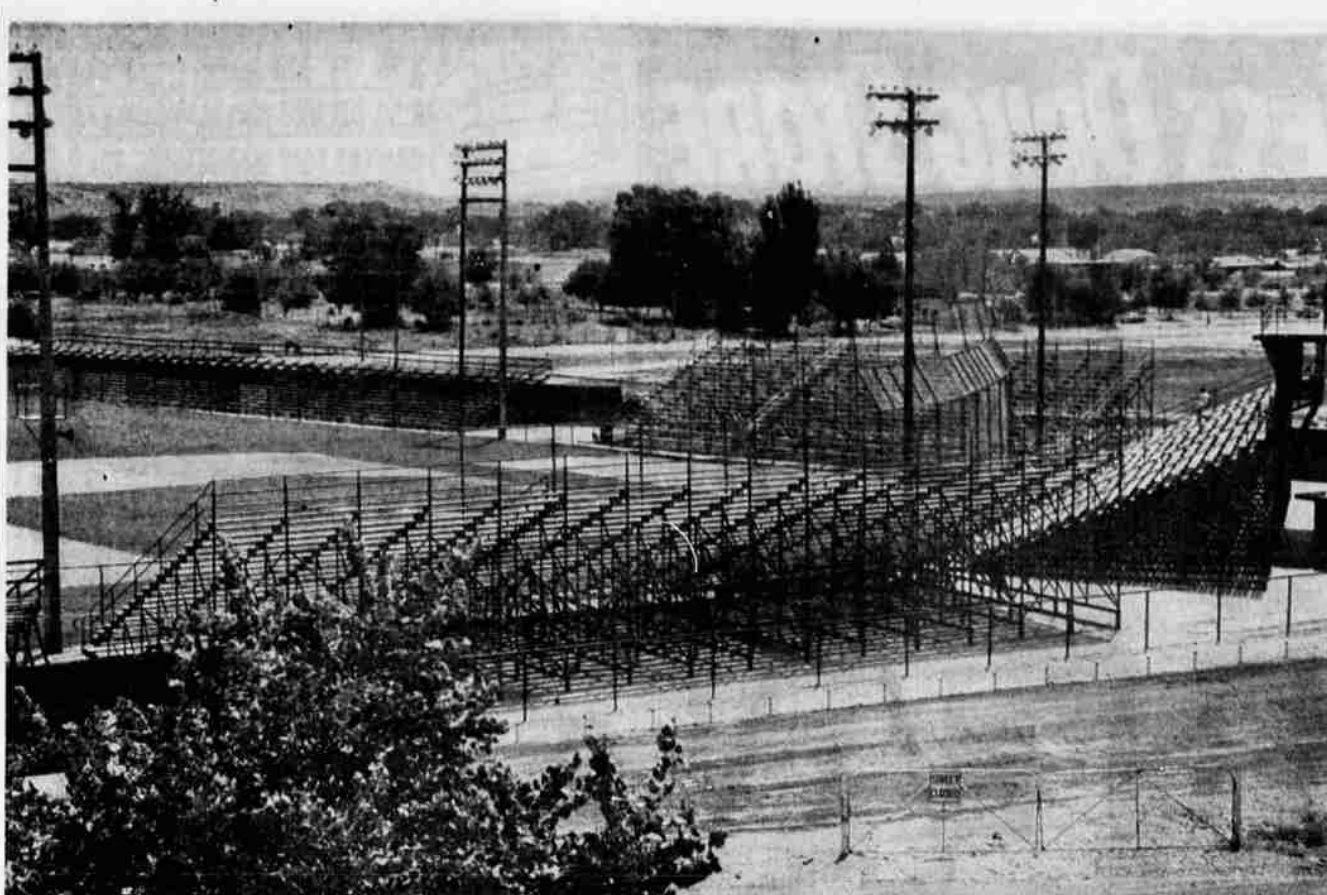
Other first pairings will pit Farmington against Germany in the first game, Atlanta against Oak Lawn, Ill., Puerto Rico vs. Frederick, Md., and KF-Joplin.

The Klamath players will be housed in homes with people of Farmington. It is called the "foster parent" plan and the headquarters there claims there aren't enough boys to go around for the number of parents who wished to house one of the players.

The boys will have side trips during their stay after arriving Sunday. A big program is slated Sunday with guest speaker Jack Campbell, governor of New Mexico, there to kick off the tournament. He will also throw out the first ball.

The youthful ballplayers will have an opportunity to hear and meet former New York Yankee pitching great Lefty Gomez. Mrs. Babe Ruth also will be there to greet the players.

Drawing Slated Today

Final tally of application for antlerless deer permits received by the game commission prior to the deadline at 5 p.m. last Monday, Aug. 5, showed 16 game management units oversubscribed which will necessitate a public drawing to determine successful applicants for these units.

The drawing is set for 10 a.m., Wednesday, Aug. 14, at the game commission's Portland headquarters, 1634 S. W. Alder.

A last-minute rush by hunters prior to the deadline brought the total applications received to more than 54,000, several thousand more than was received a year ago.

As usual, popular hunting areas filled well over the unit permit quota. These include Clatsop, Clatskanie, Fort Rock, Grizzly, Klamath, Maupin, Maury, Metolius, Ochoco, Paulina, Rogue, Sherman, Silvies, Trask, Warner, and Wasco. Drawings will be held on these 16 units, and unsuccessful applicants will be assigned second or third choices wherever possible. If all three choices are filled, applications will be returned for refiling in one of the unfilled units.

Hunters who filed applications by the filing deadline for any of the remaining units or special hunts will automatically receive a permit of their first choice. When all applications received by the filing deadline are processed, permits for unfilled units will be filled on a first come, first served basis.

Summer Baseball Program Being Established For College Students

ST. LOUIS (UPI)—Bob Stewart, art, "to provide summer baseball for college players."

Organized baseball was signing players at high salaries, because of bonus competition, on the basis of their college records. Stewart explained the foundation was conceived to set up a league for the "acid test" of college players before the majors gambled on signing him.

"The league provided a place for a college player to learn from a coach other than the one he played under in school," said Stewart. "Here, too, a kid learns whether he has it or not."

Stewart said the founders realized that once a boy was 17 to 18 years old there was no further competition other than that offered by the colleges for him to try.

Age Group Maligned

"I feel the 16 to 21 year old age group is the most maligned in our country today," said Stewart. "We keep the kids off the labor market. There's no place

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for them to be employed and accept responsibilities or play ball."

The foundation, and the Central Illinois Baseball League in particular, was originally aimed at "fitness through fun."

"We looked on this as an avenue to take kids somewhere in this area and run summer camp programs in physical fitness," said Stewart. "At the same time, the boys working as counselors would be gaining valuable experience toward play with organized baseball."

The foundation received a gift of \$50,000 from the major leagues to conduct a pilot league in Central Illinois for colleges, freshmen, sophomores and juniors. The program is supported and endorsed by the executive council of the National Collegiate Athletic Association and the U.S. Baseball Federation.

"We would go into an area and tell community leaders we would need \$2,500 from them along with playing facilities and living quarters for the players," said Stewart. "The toughest part of the job was to obtain summer jobs for our players, since they would be taking jobs from the community's own young people."

Players receive no pay from the league in order to maintain their amateur status.

Stewart pointed out "most of our kids are from middle-class and lower middle-class families. They need the money from summer jobs for school and, God knows, that's a problem all over the country."

"We now have a set of standards for league organization in the future," said Stewart. "We should organize four leagues next year covering the country."

"The amazing thing is that the people we worked with in organizing this year's league are already talking about next year," Stewart commented. "They've

been great to our kids, having them to their homes for dinner, getting them dates and accepting them as part of the community."

"We achieved our end," said Stewart. "Organized baseball has had a good look at these kids and the boys themselves know whether or not they're ready for professional ball."

Owls Get Gridders With Good Speed

Hustle and plenty of it will be the key to the Owl 1963 football squad. Coach Ron Pfeister will have five boys that can cover 100 yards in less than 10 seconds and that is really hustling!

The five boys, all outstanding track stars, will trade their track shoes for football equipment this fall. All five have previous football experience and promise to provide the OTI fans with thrills right from the first kick-off.

Bob Thorne, a freshman from Pendleton, is one of the fastest of the five. Thorne clocked a 9.6 while a senior at Pendleton High. He was ranked the number one high school sprinter in the Northwest. An injury in late spring sidelined young Thorne before the State A-1 track meet. However, the injury has healed and Thorne is preparing for action this fall. He will probably see this action at the split-end position.

OSU, UCLA Ink Football Pact

CORVALLIS, Ore. (UPI)—Oregon State and UCLA have signed a home-and-home football series for 1967 and 1968, it was announced today.

The two teams, who haven't played each other since 1958, will meet in Los Angeles Nov. 4, 1967, and in Corvallis Nov. 9, 1968, Athletic Director Spec Keene said.

Signing of the two games was seen as a possible significant step in Oregon State and Oregon joining with the current Big Six. The two Oregon schools were members of the defunct Pacific Coast Conference and have been independent since the PCC breakup. Relations between UCLA and the Oregon schools were strained at the time of the breakup.

A junior college transfer from San Francisco will be one of Thorne's speedy teammates. Claude Skiles is a 9.6 sprinter. While attending San Francisco City College, Skiles broke the league record for punt returns. He also holds the school scoring record. With two years' college experience Skiles will be a welcome addition to the Owl squad.

In the backfield Coach Pfeister will use Gerald Luke, a 9.9 sprinter from Greys Harbor Junior College. Luke is a 6' 100 lb. halfback who made first team "All-America" honors his last year at Greys Harbor.

The defensive unit will be strengthened by the speed of Gary Wald. Wald, a freshman from Central Point, will fill a defensive halfback spot. He has run the century dash in 9.9 seconds.

The only veteran to OTI of the "fast five" is John Marichich. Marichich was ineligible last football season but performed for the Owl track squad. He has one year junior college experience in football and has best time of 9.7 for the 100-yard dash.

These five boys promise to be real crowd pleasers. Their fast-action ball playing will provide thrills for the OTI fans. The Owls open their 1963 season against the semi-pro Seattle Ramblers on Modoc Field Sept. 21.
