The U.S. Navy Recruiting Station in Klamath Falls announced the recent enlistment of Kenneth Edwin Park, 17, son of Mrs. Opal Marian Dowd, 731 North Eleventh Street, and Darold Lloyd Smith, 2210 Radcliffe Avenue.

Park, a former Clovis, Calif., resident, and Smith, a KU graduate, are undergoing recruit training at the U.S. Naval Training Center, Great Lakes, Ill. The seaman recruits will be granted 14 days leave prior to reporting to their first duty assignments.

Marine Pvt. Richard A. Marks, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Marks of Route 3, Klamath Falls, completed four weeks of individual combat training last month at the Marine Corps Base, Camp Pendleton, Calif.

The training provides the newly enlisted Marine with the basic field and combat skills required of him during his military service.

Under carefully selected instructors, the Marine learns to take his place in the small fighting units, such as the four-man fire team and the 14-man squad.

Charles C. Daniels, 18, son of Air Force Lt. Col. and Mrs. Charles L. Daniels Jr., of Kingsley Air Force Base, was sworn in as a midshipman in the class of 1967 at the Naval Academy, Annapolis, Md., on June 26.

He is undergoing summer training, called "plebe summer," at the academy in preparation for joining the academy's Brigade of Midshipmen in the fall.

The two months of military indoctrination during the summer is designed to teach the new plebes the ways of the Navy and Naval Academy. They are taught

to march, and to wear the Navy uniform correctly. They learn Navy terminology and begin some academic work. When upperclassmen return in September, the new plebe class will be "squared away" and ready to enter its first academic year.

Upon graduation, midshipmen receive a bachelor of science degree and are commissioned ensign in the Navy or second lieutenant in the Marine Corps, Army, or Air Force.

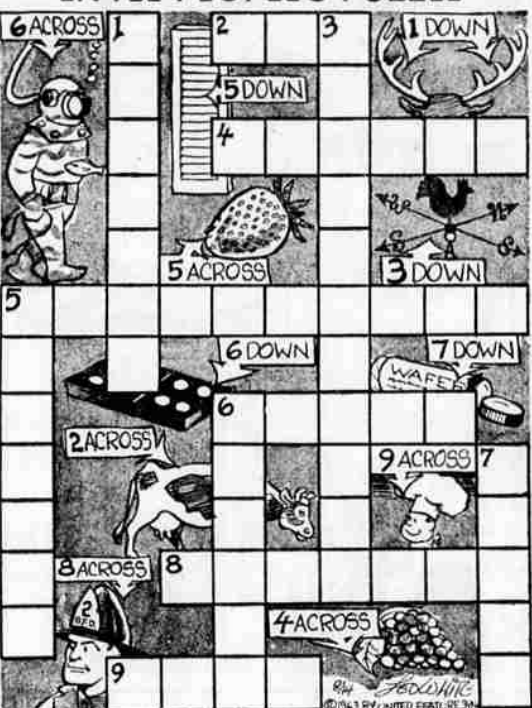

Two Circuit Judges Named

SALEM (UPI)—Appointment of judges to the two new circuit court positions created by the 1963 legislature was announced today by Gov. Mark Hatfield.

Albert R. Musick was named a Washington county circuit judge, and Edwin R. Allen as judge of the new Lane County circuit court.

Musick is married and the father of one child. Allen, also married, is the father of two children.

Musick served in the law firm of Black and Kendall from 1948 to 1962, and was a partner in Castles and Musick, Beaverton, from counter intelligence in World War II.

Allen served in the firm of Reid and Bartle from 1949 to 1953, from 1953 to 1958 served in the judge advocate corps of the U.S. Army, and from 1958 to now was a partner in the law firm of Bartle and Allen.

He served as circuit judge pro tem for 14 days in 1962.

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Portugal Takes Stand

LISBON, Portugal (UPI)—Premier Antonio de Oliveira Salazar pledged Portugal's determination Monday night to hold on to its African territories despite mounting pressure from Western Allies and independent African nations.

In a nationwide radio and television broadcast, the 74-year-old premier said Portugal will defend "to the limit of our human and material resources" its position in Angola, Mozambique and Portuguese Guinea. It was Salazar's first major policy speech in more than a year.

He warned the United States it is pursuing a policy in Africa parallel to that of Russia, Salazar called the Russian policy "coherent and logical" in terms of Communist objectives.

But he said U.S. policy "involves a serious principle of contradiction" because it is bringing about the end of European political influence in Africa and dealing a blow to Western defenses.

The premier repeated last year's threat that Portugal would be "among the first" nations to abandon the United Nations. He brushed off opposition to Portuguese African policies within the United Nations and called the world body a "menace to peace and to the orderly life of nations" since the massive entry of African nations.

Shasta Council Establishes Tax

MOUNT SHASTA — The city council set the tax rate for the coming year at \$1.63 per \$100 valuation. It is set aside as follows: For general fund \$1.20, flood control .20, parks .10, sewers .07, administration .05, library .02, civil defense .01.

The board went on record to ask for bids to install gutters and curbs on two blocks of Alma and Cedar streets. It was emphatic this would end at Ivy.

The council attended an additional \$400 to the chamber of commerce to use in advertising the city.

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Aide Says Nelson In Race

WASHINGTON (UPI)—An aide, congressman by George L. Hinman, Republican national committeeman from New York, who is a Rockefeller political adviser, we're in this thing all the way."

"I just wanted you to know that we're in this thing all the way," the Times quoted Hinman as telling the legislators. However, the accounts said that Hinman was careful not to commit the governor to a specific political schedule.

Hinman, queried about the reports today in New York, said, "All I have to say is 'no comment.'"

But the impression left by Hinman, according to the Times, was that Rockefeller has been assuring Republican legislators in Washington that his chief is solidly in the 1964 presidential race, according to the New York Times.

In a dispatch published today, the Times quoted unidentified congressmen as having been assured that the governor would stay in the fight for the Republican nomination through at least two primary contests — probably New Hampshire and California.

The assurances, according to the Times, were circulated among liberal Republican senators and

man, according to the Times, was that Rockefeller was prepared to contest the California and New Hampshire primaries, at least.

Preliminary soundings by the Rockefeller pulse takers have indicated a good reception for the governor among New Hampshire Republicans. Moreover, Dartmouth College, of which Rockefeller is a faithful alumnus, is situated there, and he has done much for the college.

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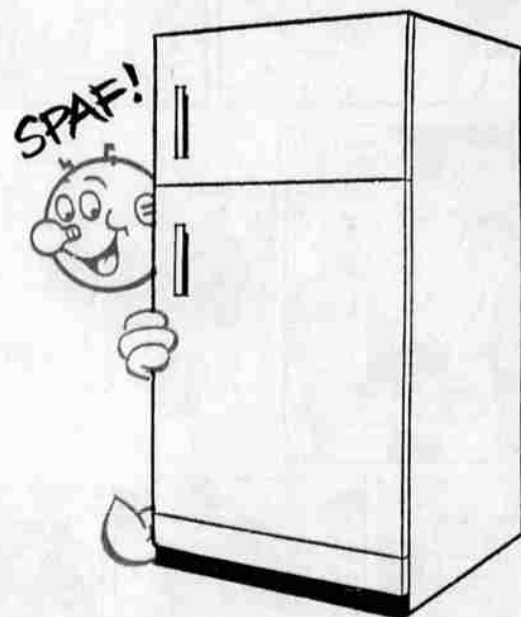
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
