120 Suffer Food Poison

ORCHARD LAKE, Mich. (UPI)—All but four of 120 religious pilgrims treated for suspected food poisoning after a church outing at the seminary here have been released from the hospital.

The pilgrims, mostly women over 50 years of age, were taken to hospitals in Pontiac, Brantford, Ont., and Paris, Ont. The four still under treatment were listed as in "fairly satisfactory" condition.

They were among 800 persons who attended a dinner at the seminary Sunday and heard Richard Cardinal Cushing speak at Marian Day exercises. Cardinal Cushing was not stricken.

The four women were all at Brantford General Hospital. They were identified as Mrs. Mary Fedorowicz, 69; Mrs. Martha Prok, 76; Mrs. Pearl Kolaz, 75, and Mrs. Anna Baack, 74, all of Buffalo, N. Y.

Rev. Stanley E. Milewski, an official of Orchard Lake schools, said the pilgrims had stood for two hours in the sun listening to the cardinal.

"The sun and the excitement may have had something to do with it," he said.

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Slaughtered Beef Plan To Be Tried At Auction

LAKEVIEW — An experiment will be conducted through a new feature at the 24th annual Rotary Livestock Auction of FFA and 4-H livestock on the night of Sept. 2 at the close of the Lake County Fair and Roundup. Slaughtered beef will be sold as well as the usual live steers, lambs and hogs. The purpose is the education of the young people in the fact that live animals do not always grade out the same after slaughter as they did alive. A market price will be the basis for the auction of the slaughtered beef.

A year ago, following the auction, a demonstration of slaughter grade as compared to live grade was conducted by the extension service and the FFA adviser through the cooperation of Bond Brothers abattoir at Lakeview. Steers from the sale were used and it was found that one of the champion steers which had graded prime while alive was determined to be low choice grade. In contrast, another champion steer had graded choice on the hoof but was found to grade prime after slaughter. Just four steers will be used in the experiment this year.

A total of 12 steers, 15 hogs and 15 lambs can be sold as individual animals in the auction.

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Pulp Industry Members Like Future Prospects

OLYMPIA, Wash. (UPI)—Members of the Pacific Northwest pulp and paper industry are taking a look at the future and they like what they see.

An economic survey prepared for the Northwest Pulp and Paper Association envisions a 65 per cent increase in western market demands in 12 years. Paper production is expected to reach nine million tons in the same period—double what it is now. Pulp production is expected to show a similar increase.

Under the direction of H. DeWayne Kreeger, former state director of commerce and economic development, the survey was prepared by John A. Guthrie, professor of economics at Washington State University, and the university's economist, William Iulo.

But while forecasting burgeoning growth in the next decade for the industry in Washington and Oregon where it makes up 10 per cent of all manufacturing, the report points out there are other factors that have to be watched.

Total pulp and paper production in the U.S. is expected to increase 85 per cent—paced by the fast growing industry in the southern states and in British Columbia, as compared to 65 per cent in the west.

Growth in the other areas was listed as the principal factor that could limit expansion in Washington and Oregon. Other possible brakes were competition from substituted products, water supply requirements and undue increases in production costs.

One factor that could influence

the export production of Oregon and Washington is the pulp mill constructed recently at Sitka, Alaska, for supplying Japanese demands. Others are competitive domestic demands and a competition from British Columbia mills.

But regardless of the competition, Guthrie and Iulo roughly estimated sales in 1975 would reach 1.5 million tons annually.

Lake Adopts School Idea

LAKEVIEW — An exchange of educational and cultural exhibits and eventually that of students and maybe teachers will be effected through an affiliation between Lakeview High School and the Henry Henderson Institute Secondary School of Blantyre, Nyasaland.

The affiliation has been approved by the American Friends Service Committee, according to Mrs. John Orr, local representative, and is in the interest of broadening international understanding.

Laura Waterman, teacher at the high school here who serves as liaison for the school group acting on the program, has received a letter from Barbara Scheffelin, a teacher at the institute with the report that school activities have begun there and there will be a long vacation in October, which is the hottest month in that country. The school has 200 students.
