POLLY'S POINTERS Use Top-Of-Stove

DEAR POLLY—Instead of heating the kitchen by constant use of the oven in summer, I bake the biscuits on top of the stove in a preheated heavy aluminum or iron skillet. I place the biscuits on a cake cooling rack in the bottom of the skillet and cover the pan. I leave the burner on high heat for 5 minutes. Then I reduce the heat and brown the biscuits. Biscuits will be tender and your kitchen will remain cool.—R. M.

GIRLS—I was so intrigued with this idea that I could not wait to do it right but did it wrong and it still worked. My cake cooling rack is square and my skillets are round. The neighborhood hardware store was out of round racks so I improvised a bit. I put my square rack in a heavy aluminum baking pan but did not turn the gas flame quite as high as I would have with an iron skillet. After the biscuits were on the rack, there was no top to fit over the big pan so I used aluminum foil shaped around the top edges of the pan. Even with all the hints I took with R.M.'s hint, I had biscuits baked in no time with no mess, no fuss and no hot oven and kitchen. I used packaged biscuits. This seems particularly good for just a few biscuits for one or two people and where one might hesitate to heat the entire oven for such a wee bit of baking.—POLLY

DEAR POLLY—Last summer I was caught at our country place with two young grandchildren and no lights due to a power failure during a storm. With a match I

melted a few drops of wax from the bottom of candles into the bottom of two wide-mouthed peanut butter jars, set the candles in and held each in place for a few seconds until the wax set. Presto! Instant light. If the candle is taller than the jar, cut off to the right size before setting it in the jar. I now keep some, all ready for just such emergencies.—MRS. R. E. B.

DEAR POLLY—To solve the problem of sun dresses sliding off coat hangers, I insert a thumb or upholstering tack at each end of a wooden tanger.—MRS. R. K.

DEAR POLLY—Summertime and ice cream bars go hand in hand. It sometimes is a problem to get the bar out of the paper bag without losing the handle or half the chocolate covering. Open the end of the bag, blow it up as you would a sack. The bar will slip out easily.—MRS. B. S.

DEAR POLLY—Divided plastic cutlery trays are handy but it is so annoying to have them slide out of place when pulling out the drawer in which they are stored. A small piece of floral clay on the bottom of the tray keeps it firmly in place. But, it is easy to remove for cleaning.—H. K. E.

ers wash 1.5 billion pounds of laundry in 44 million washing machines. At least 200 million washer loads are done per week at home.

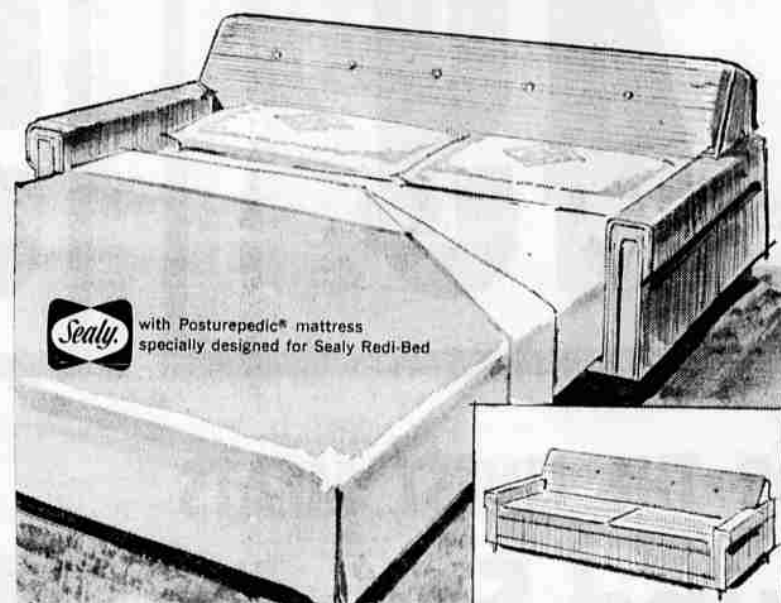

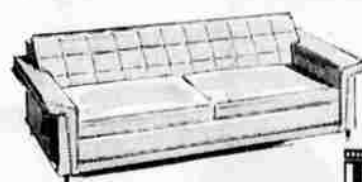

German Chancellor Occupies Unique Position

In a park-like setting in Bonn stands a three-story residence of clean, white lines and quiet elegance. It is called the Palais Schaumburg.

In its withdrawn setting only the soldiers of the West German Republic standing at the gates give it the appearance of more than passing importance.

Garvey Given Jail Sentence

John J. Garvey was sentenced Wednesday to six months in county jail for writing and passing at least eight worthless checks in this area.

Garvey originally had been scheduled to go on trial Monday in circuit court for the charge, but changed his plea to guilty.

He was sentenced by circuit court Judge David Vandenberg Wednesday.

The district attorney's office said Garvey had been in this area for about three weeks before passing the checks, made out for a total of about \$210. He was arrested in June.

But it is, in fact, the official residence of the West German chancellor and from it to a degree which would have been deemed impossible 25 years ago radiates an influence over the decisions of every major western power.

It may be the force which determines whether President Charles de Gaulle of France decides to seek a second term.

It, more than France, will determine the future course of the European Common Market.

And in these days of cautious hope for a world more at ease with itself, the United States will take careful soundings of opinion at the Palais Schaumburg before proceeding further in any effort to reach agreement with the Soviet Union beyond the present partial nuclear test ban treaty. For Germany is the prize of

Europe, and remains as it has been through modern history the key to European stability.

For De Gaulle, who sealed his Franco-German accord with a kiss for Chancellor Konrad Adenauer, the course of events since last January has been a disappointment.

In the preamble to the accord approved by the West German Bundestag the Germans made clear their continued devotion to De Gaulle's own grand designs for Europe.

The German decision to become a signatory to the partial test ban agreement was over De Gaulle's opposition and led to laments in French newspapers that France now stands isolated.

In its agricultural policies for the Common Market and in its desire that Britain also be brought

into the European community, West Germany also stands in stubborn opposition to De Gaulle. And these are the conditions which may convince De Gaulle that he and he alone can guide France through the immediate years ahead.

In the years since the West German Federal Republic came into being in 1949, the United States carefully has nurtured West German public opinion. A neutralist, or pro-Communist, Germany could determine the fate of the whole of Europe.
