SALEM (UPI) Next week is "Aloha Week" for 16 Oregon legislators, two state officials, and several wives.

The occasion is the meeting in Honolulu of the National Legislative Conference, Aug. 19-23. At the same time—and place—the Interstate Cooperation Commission will hold its annual meeting.

Many of the Oregonians attending the meetings may travel, eat and be housed at state expense during the week of the conferences.

The state will not pay the wives' expenses. Nor will the state pay expenses incurred by delegates who arrive early, or delay their departure for vacations.

Mahoney also screened the travel allowance of every state agency and department as the various budgets came before the Senate for approval. He refused to approve budgets which had what he

considered an unnecessarily large travel allotment.

Mahoney told UPI "I'm going at my own expense. I told Musa some time ago I wouldn't bill the state for my trip, and in fact I have booked passage back on a Matson liner."

"I don't think this is a junket because the Portland chamber is pushing so hard to get the convention in 1965, and they need conventions."

"But I'm not an idiot. I still question the good of these trips, and I'm paying my own way. I was going to announce that after the trip," he added.

Unemployment List Declines

SALEM (UPI) — Statewide insured unemployment was down 19 per cent from four weeks ago, but up 15 per cent from last year for the week ending Aug. 8, employment Commissioner David H. Cameron said today.

The statewide rate of insured unemployment, at 3.2 per cent, was the lowest level recorded this year.

Areas reporting the highest rates of insured unemployment were Hood River with 8.4 per cent and Ontario with 7.9 per cent, both of which were affected by normal wait for late summer crops.

French-German Alliance Under Fire

PARIS (UPI) — The six-months' old French-German alliance is taking a heavy beating.

Many Frenchmen are asking seriously if much of it is left at all.

The treaty was signed at the Elysee Palace here on Jan. 22 by President Charles de Gaulle of France and West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer. It was sealed by a kiss between Europe's two "grand old men."

Its aim was to end centuries of bloodshed between the two nations that had been pinpointed by history as the "traditional enemies" of Western Europe. In place of fighting each other they were to work together in future as close allies.

But the ink was hardly dry on their signatures when De Gaulle began to find the treaty was not everything he had hoped for.

Adenauer made no secret of the fact that he did not support De Gaulle's veto against Great Britain's admission into the European Common Market.

Then the West Germans refused to bow to De Gaulle's demands that they should bring their farms prices down to the level of those in France to make possible an agreement on a joint agricultural policy for the Common Market.

The farm price dispute still simmers between the two allies. West Germany plumped enthu-

siastically for President Kennedy's plan for an integrated multinational nuclear force inside the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO). De Gaulle flatly rejected it.

When Kennedy visited West Germany and West Berlin in June he received an overwhelmingly spontaneous ovation from the German people that made De Gaulle's visit to Bonn soon afterwards something of a letdown.

Germans Won't Help
Then the Germans refused to cooperate with the French in production of a European tank. Instead, they agreed to a joint tank development program with the United States.

punched still another hole in what was to have been his solid policy front with De Gaulle. He decided to sign the Moscow nuclear test ban pact, although De Gaulle has refused to do so and had urged him not to.

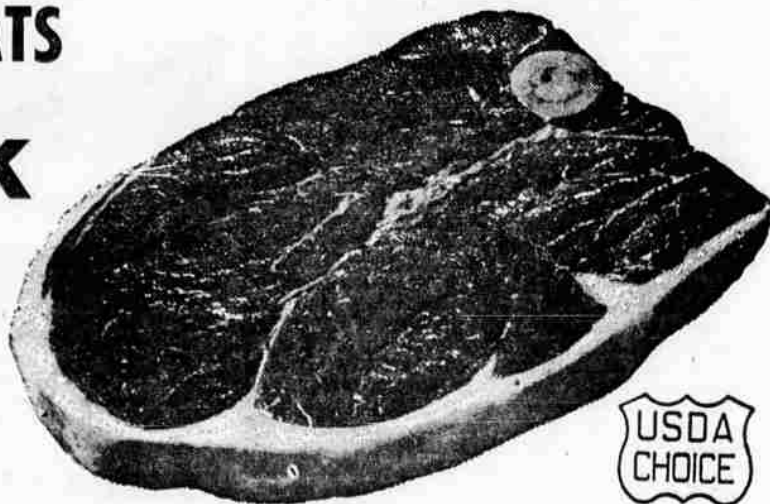

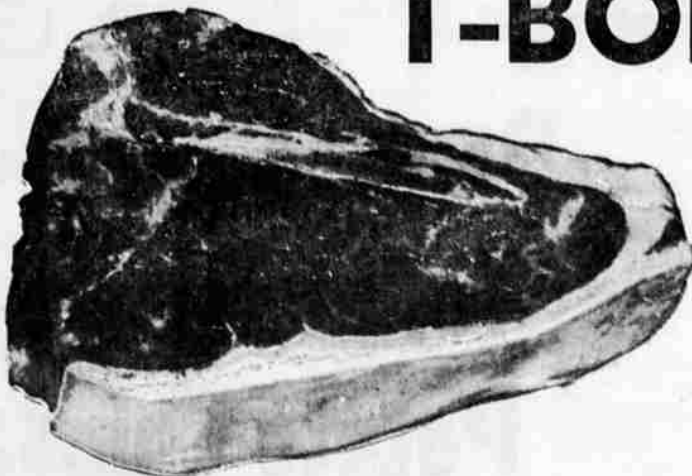
