Newspaper Letter Twits Robber Hunt

LONDON (UPI)—A letter writer named "Charlie" who may have been one of the mail train robbers today publicly twitted police who were centering their search on the rural highway used by the most successful robbery gang of all time.

A letter written to the London Evening News accused police of oversteering the amount lost from last Thursday's \$7 million robbery.

The newspaper turned the letter over to police who were searching the farmhouse that was used by the robbers as a staging area and counting house. When the police swooped down on the house Tuesday the robbers had fled with the loot, but they left behind some tell-tale signs, such as the mail sacks stolen from the train after it was ambushed near Cheddington.

"For your information, and to anybody else interested," said the letter to the Evening News "the total gained from this exercise was exactly 2,093,284 pounds 45, 000, 987.20 and a sprained ankle."

"Charlie" complained about reports that the amount stolen from the mail train last Thursday was over 2,000 pounds (over \$7 million).

This was dishonest, said the letter writer, who signed himself merely as "Charlie" and claimed he knew the actual amount that was stolen.

The National Forests in Oregon and Washington sold and harvested record volumes of timber in fiscal year 1963, U.S. Forest Service tabulations show.

A total of 5,509,927,300 board feet of timber was sold and 4,539,801,560 board feet of timber was cut during the year, according to J. Herbert Stone, Regional Forester, Pacific Northwest Region.

The harvest comprises about 40 per cent of the total timber cut from all lands in the two states. Value of the timber sold was \$92,332,869.46 and value of the timber harvested was \$80,238,759.18 (final figures show). The previous year, sales volume was 4,000,000,000 board feet valued at \$80,067,000 and the harvest volume was 4,157,000 board feet valued at \$78,541,000.

About 15 billion board feet of the 1963 volume was in pine stumps sold to Hayden-Newport Chemical Corporation for chemical extraction. The large sale will result in development of a new industry in south-central Oregon.

The Willamette National Forest of Oregon led the region in volume of timber sold and harvested. The Shasta National Forest, harvested 114 million board feet, was next highest. Highest in Washington was the Gifford Pinchot National Forest.

Thomas H. Clayton, son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard A. Clayton of 617 Front Street, Merrill, recently completed basic training at the Naval Training Center, San Diego, Calif., graduating at the weekly Recruit Brigade Review in which some 3,000 men participated.

The nine-week training included naval orientation, history and organization, customs and etiquette, basic military regulations, ordnance and gunnery, seamanship and shipboard routine, damage control, sentry duty and military drill, physical fitness, swimming and survival.

During the training period recruits receive tests and interviews which determine their future assignments in the Navy. Upon completion of the program they are assigned to various stations for technical training.

During the day-long ceremony the recruits were presented with their discharge papers. The ceremony was held at the Crater Lake National Park on Saturday, Aug. 10. Over 300 master mariners representing 114 lodges from 19 states and the Philippine Islands attended the gathering.

The first lodge conferred the first section of 10 a.m. followed by a special steward's luncheon. Following the second section which was conferred by McKean River Lodge No. 105 of Eugene, Gerald Arriaz, worshipful master, a dinner was served.
