False Card Hoists South

Some players never false-card. Others false-card every time they get a chance. The winning technique lies somewhere in between. In addition there are many occasions when a false-card is down-right silly.

South concealed his nice club suit in the bidding and when West got off to a club lead things looked bright indeed. East played the nine and South promptly false-carded himself right out of game and rubber.

South won with the ace of clubs, led the nine of diamonds and finessed. East took his king and looked around for the right lead. A club return appeared hopeless. Obviously West had not led from either queen-jack-ten or king-queen-jack-ten of clubs so South was marked with at least the ace-king-queen of that suit. A spade shift did not look very good either, but the heart suit showed distinct possibilities. East led the two of hearts.

South's jack lost to West's queen and the ace dropped his king. A third heart lead gave East tricks with the ten and eight and left poor South high and dry on the rocks.

If South had simply won the first club with the jack East would have had a tough problem. The three of clubs lead could easily have been fourth best from a suit headed by ace-queen-ten or even ace-king-ten. In either of those cases a club return would be the winner and East would surely have made it whereupon South would romp home.

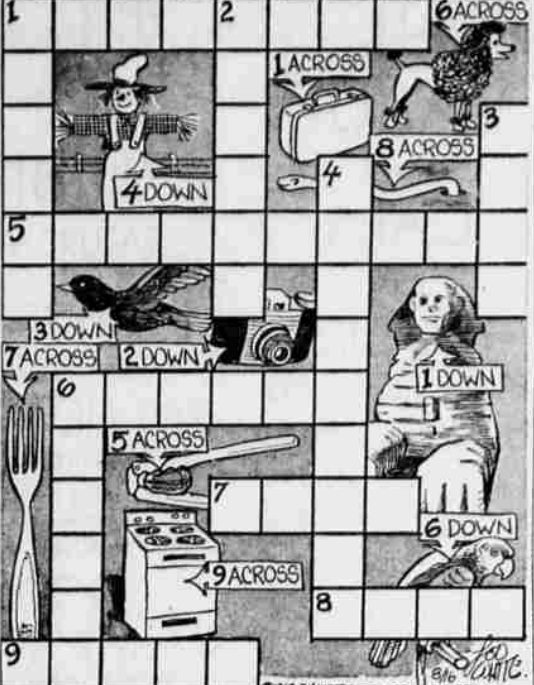

Buddhist Nun Suicides In Protest Of Policies

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (UPI)—A Buddhist nun burned herself to death Thursday in the coastal town of Ninh Hoa, reliable government sources reported. It was the fourth Buddhist suicide in recent weeks in protest to government policies.

Ninh Hoa is about 200 miles north of Saigon, about 200 miles from Hue city where a novice Buddhist priest burned himself to death Tuesday.

Previously, two other nuns—or Buddhist monks—had committed suicide by fire in a growing campaign of protest by the Buddhists who have accused the regime of President Ngo Dinh Diem of religious and political discrimination. The government has denied the charges.

The sources reporting the latest suicide said the nun was named Dieu Quang. They said she was in her early 20's, but others said she was older.

The sources said her charred body was taken away by government officials, following her death about 9:30 a.m.

In Hue city, police cordoned off the Main Tu Dam pagoda, making virtual prisoners of the 150 Buddhist priests, nuns and followers inside.

The government has clamped a virtual but undeclared state of martial law on that predominantly Buddhist city following the Tuesday suicide of 17-year-old novice priest Thich Thanh Tue at the Phuc Duyen pagoda, 3½ miles outside Hue.

Tension was reported high in Hue city, where government troops and secret policemen waded into a group of Buddhists with steel helmets Wednesday and took away Tue's body when the religious group tried to take it into the city for funeral rites and burial at the Tu Dam pagoda.

The government insisted that the rites be held at the place where Tue killed himself, indicating it felt that any religious procession in Hue city in the present state of tension could result in more violence.

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Conservation Center Offers New Approach To Handling Prisoners

SUSANVILLE, Calif. (UPI)—Man and nature are conserving each other in a unique prison without bars near here in a valley ringed by the Sierra Nevada.

The California conservation center, with 1,200 inmates, is a new approach to penology.

Here, social outcasts are learning to take their place in society by protecting and developing California's vast forests and recreation lands.

The center was dedicated this summer to the proposition that inmates—and the state that confirmed them—can help themselves by helping each other.

Learn Fire Fighting
The brick, buff and blue complex sprawls over several acres of a dry, flat, brushy valley. The inmates, in blue shirts and blue jeans, work inside and outside its walls learning how to fight forest fires, build trails, develop fire-

breaks, clear streams, fight forest pests and diseases, replant lands, and perform many other tasks for the state.

The center grew out of the honor camp program. It is the first time the honor camp concept has been applied to a full-fledged prison.

The center will serve as a training ground. From it, men will be funneled out to California's growing chain of conservation camps—now 34—to work in the woods for the state division of forestry.

California pioneered the honor camp system. The Magalia camp is typical. Enclosed only by a low split-rail fence, its wooden buildings nestle in the trees. Its 200 inmates live

in dormitories and work in open shops, fields, or deep in the forest.

Crows Board Buses
When a fire call sounds, crews board a bus, armed with axes, picks and saws, for what may be days and nights of dirty, exhausting and dangerous work. The pay for inmates is \$15 a month.

The conservation center's job is to fill these camps with men who are trained and conditioned for the heavy work.

The center is constructed of huge quadrangles, enclosing yards that will be planted with grass. The building walls are the only walls. There are no guards in gun towers.

Nor are there bars. The men live in dormitories, which also serve as units for counseling. There are 200 corrections and forestry officers.

Statistics have proved the value of the honor camp program. Many of its carefully-selected inmates have returned to society as responsible citizens. Only a few inmates have chosen to walk away. The same success is forecast for the center.

Deer Picture Painted Dark
MOUNT SHASTA—Deer hunters of Mount Shasta are growing apprehensive that sport is going to be more difficult than usual this fall. It is stated that deer appear fewer and feed less abundant than usual. The latter despite little dry weather to date.

One man stated "It hasn't been good growing weather."

Others state the lack of forage is due to a chilly spring rather than lack of moisture. Still another hunter believes it is due to mental attitude of life in general. He stated that many hunters were disappointed on other things, and let it frame their outlook on deer.

But all admit the fishing had been exceptional this spring and when one had good fishing he always had the same kind of sport on deer.

It will be interesting to observe results when deer hunting opens.

DOG FANCIERS SHOW SLATED
Dog owners desiring to enter their pets in the Klamath Dog Fanciers Annual Dog Show, Saturday, Aug. 31, at the county fairgrounds have only until Aug. 20 to submit their entries. Dave Penny, show chairman, said Friday.

Last year, more than 68 entries representing 12 states competed for prizes which went to the best dog of each breed. In addition, a special prize was awarded to the best local dog in the show.

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Sheriff Probes Rancher Death

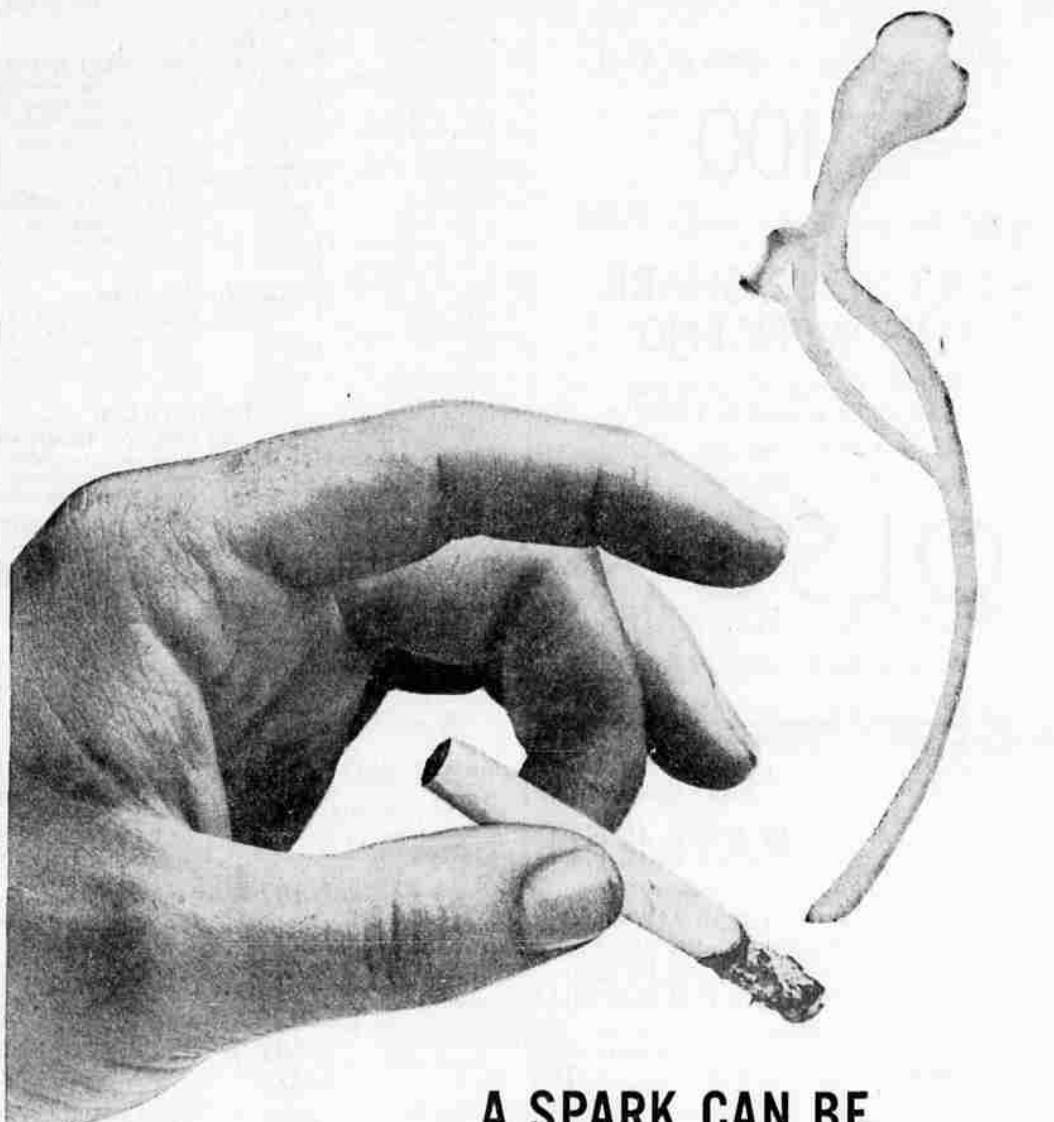
BEND (UPI)—Sheriff's officers from three counties are continuing their search of leads into the death of Philip G. Reinhardt, 72, whose body was found Monday in a canal near here.

An autopsy indicated Reinhardt died from a blow on the side of the head. He was a prominent rancher in the Powell Butte area.

Officers said Reinhardt left his home the night of Aug. 5 and headed across a field. He had \$60 on him that was not found. His body was found in the canal caught in a wire fence a week later.
