Dear Ann Landers: I am writing this letter from a TB sanatorium—the last place in the world I ever thought I'd be. My doctor sent me here last month after a routine check-up. They tell me I must stay here for at least six months. I don't see how I can stay away from my family that long.

My husband is trying to keep house and cook. Our daughters are 10 and 12 years of age. We have no relatives in town we can turn to. My mother has troubles of her own so I can't ask her to come from Lincoln and take on my family responsibilities.

I'm worried that the girls aren't getting the proper food. And I can imagine what their clothes look like. My husband has been trying to hire help, but so far he's only been able to get a woman to come in twice a week.

I feel good, have a fine appetite and am completely rested. I'm sure I could get along well if they would just let me out of here. Please help me, Ann. My family needs me. — ABSENT MOTHER

Dear Mother: The state in which you live has a compulsory TB treatment law. If you were to leave the hospital against medical advice while you still have an active case of TB you would be compelled to return.

Even if there were no law you should be eager for treatment. You would be doing your family no favor if you returned and risked infecting them.

Check the social service department at the hospital. They will be able to help your husband get the assistance he needs. If there is no such department there, call the Family Service Association.

And the best thing you can do for yourself and your family is to be a patient patient. The few months you spend in the sanatorium will give you many added years of health and contentment.

Dear Ann: Two years ago we built a beautiful patio. But we can't use it on weekends—we

must sit inside, with doors and windows shut. Why? Because our next door neighbors have put in a swimming pool.

Saturday morning the screaming begins. It continues until Sunday night. Last weekend I counted 13 children and 10 adults in their pool. The din is nerve-shredding.

Our summer has become a nightmare. Is it fair that older people must get into a car and back the traffic to escape the noise of next door neighbors? What can we do? — FORMER HOME LOVERS

Dear Former: Explain the situation to your neighbors as you explained it to me. If they make no effort to cut down the noise the police may have to decide if they are disturbing the peace.

Meet Slates GOP Chiefs

EUGENE (UPI) — Two men mentioned prominently for the 1964 Republican presidential nomination, Gov. Nelson Rockefeller of New York and Sen. Barry Goldwater for Arizona, will be here Oct. 12 for the Republican Western States Conference.

Both men are scheduled to speak, but at different locations, and no debate between them is likely, a spokesman said.

Both Rockefeller and Goldwater are expected to be on the Oregon presidential primary ballot next May 15.

Lowell C. Paget, Oregon GOP national committeeman, said Rockefeller would be honored by a reception and luncheon at noon. Goldwater will be guest of honor at a reception and dinner in the evening.

Goldwater's speech is scheduled for the Lane County fairgrounds and Rockefeller's tentatively for the University of Oregon Student Union building.

Gov. Mark Hatfield of Oregon will keynote the conference Oct. 11. Delegates from 12 western states are expected.

Refuge Picks C. Markley

ALTURAS—Melvin Nail, temporary manager of the Modoc Fish and Wildlife Refuge in Alturas announced this week that Chet Markley of Red Rock Lakes Refuge, Mont., will take over as refuge manager in Alturas Aug. 15.

Markley has served for 24 years with the Fish and Wildlife Service and has been manager of the Wheeler Refuge in Alabama, the Tennessee Refuge in Tennessee, the Stillwater Refuge in Nevada, and the Red Rock Lakes Refuge.

Previous to his service with the Fish and Wildlife he worked in the National Park Service at Yosemite, the Grand Canyon, and Mesa Verde National parks. He was a ranger and chief ranger with assignments as park forester, fire chief and in charge of wildlife.

Markley is a graduate of the New York State College of Forestry at Syracuse University with majors in forest recreation and game management. He has also had a semester of graduate work at the Roosevelt Wildlife station, Syracuse University, and is a graduate of the Allegheny School of Natural History, N.Y.

Markley replaces Paul Steele who was refuge manager here for two years. Steele was transferred to the district office in Boston, Mass., July 1.

Chet Markley and his wife Jean will make their home at the wildlife refuge. Their married daughter Myrna lives in San Francisco and their son Chester Jr. is a student at the Montana State University.

Swim Pool Integration Finds Little Success

At 3 p.m. one day this week, the largest public pool in Atlanta had just 15 swimmers. One was a Negro.

No one paid the young Negro any attention except the white youth with whom he was swimming. They seemed to be having fun.

On the surface, all was calm, but nearby a police cruiser was parked. The officer-driver relaxed on a bench, sipping a milkshake. Inside the bathhouse, another policeman manned the ticket booth.

This was the first summer of swimming pool integration in Atlanta. Results: No serious incidents but pool attendance had dropped at least 50 per cent. Pools, formerly open in the evenings, were closing at 5 p.m. Integration groups were urging their white members to use public pools to prevent them from becoming "re-segregated."

Heated Issue
Few desegregation issues have generated more heat than efforts by Negroes to take a cool dip in the old public swimming hole.

Nashville, Tenn., is taking its first steps at getting pools back in operation after "wade-in" closings in 1961. They have been open for desegregated learn-to-swim classes this summer.

Segregated pools still operate at Tallahassee, Fla., and Chattanooga, Tenn., despite demonstrations. Negroes occasionally swim at a "white" pool in Knoxville, Tenn., without incident.

A number of cities have abandoned public parks to escape pool desegregation. In Memphis, Tenn., one of the cities that closed pools, Negroes this week filed a motion in federal court demanding that pools be reopened on an integrated basis.

In Jackson, Miss., pools failed to open this summer after an integration order.

Closed Two Years
Pools were closed two seasons ago in Jacksonville, Fla., and Negro efforts to get them reopened have failed.

In Lexington, N.C., where a service station attendant was killed and a photographer wounded during racial troubles in June, pools were closed after less than a week of integrated operation. The closing came after two barrels of oil were dumped into the pool one night.

Albany, Ga., sold its public swimming pool to newspaper publisher James H. Gray, who is operating it on a private and segregated basis.

Pools at Birmingham and Montgomery in Alabama are closed, and this extends in Montgomery to all parks and recreational areas.

Ex-Dictator Left Mark On Venezuelan People

Whatever the rascalities of one-time Venezuelan dictator Marcos Perez Jimenez, the plump and pompous former army colonel left his mark upon Caracas and upon its people.

It has been nearly five years since he gathered his family about him and fled to the Dominican Republic in the face of the same sort of violent revolution by which he himself had risen to power.

But in Caracas the people still

refer to him familiarly as "P.J." "P.J." built it," one may remark.

And the reference might be to the broad highway which sweeps up to Caracas from Maiquetia Airport, or to the magnificent modernistic buildings of the University of Caracas.

Or it might be to the gaudy, skyscraper apartment buildings which "P.J." built as a slum-clearance project but which quickly became merely vertical slums under conditions of anarchy worse than that from which its inhabitants came.

Ironically, that district meant to be a monument to Perez Jimenez today is called "January 23rd," commemorating the date

of his fall. "P.J." left Venezuela \$400 million in debt despite its oil riches which pour \$3 million a day into a country whose population is only about six million.

And beyond the monuments of stone and steel which Perez Jimenez left behind, few of these six million had benefited.

But besides the hatred which he also left behind, one may also detect a note of grudging admiration.

In those references to "P.J.," For in many a Latin American nation the successful swindler is regarded as no great criminal.

Former Argentine dictator Juan D. Peron retained millions of followers despite looting his country of amounts whose estimates run as high as \$600 million.

A one-time Cuban minister of education made off with \$172 million and aroused no great indignation.

In Rio de Janeiro, U.S. citizens urgently wanted by Uncle Sam to answer for a fast shuffle with the dollars of American investors travel freely in the best cafe society.

Perez Jimenez himself was the first such former high-ranking figure permitted to be extradited from the United States. Other guests have included Fulgencio members of the Trujillo family of the Dominican Republic.
