Furniture Talk

more than a new thing else, can set the tone of a room's decor. But where do you begin to create a color scheme? How do you choose colors?

The answer to these questions will, of course, vary if you are starting a room from scratch, or if you must use existing colors. In a bare room, you have free rein. The best rule is to start with a basic color that you like personally, one you can live with for a long time. You can use this color either as the background, in draperies, walls and floor coverings, or as the key color in a major piece of furniture, usually the sofa.

Monochromatic color schemes have been popular in recent years — that is, the use of varying shades of the same color, such as beige used with cocoas and browns and rusts. But there is also a current swing toward bolder colors and sharper contrasts in colors. The choice here is again a personal one. However, it's often wise to use dramatic, strong colors in things you can change without great expense or trouble, such as wallpaper, accessories or smaller pieces. Choose major pieces, such as sofa or sectional, in colors you won't tire of.

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'See America First' August Flower Show

Participants and spectators alike are looking forward to the Northside and Klamath Falls Garden Club sponsored flower show, "See America First" on Wednesday, Aug. 23, in the city library auditorium.

Heading the flower show committee are the club presidents, May Phinney, Klamath Falls Club, and Mrs. Arnel Stump, Northside Club. Show chairmen are Mrs. Bernard Valk, Klamath Falls, and Mrs. George LaSalle, Northside.

In addition to the horticulture and artistic displays there will be a silver tea and plant sale to which the public is invited during the hours of 2 o'clock to 3 p.m.

Exhibits in Division I, horticulture, briefly outlined will include in classes one to eight, roses, one bloom or cluster according to type; gladioli, one spike large, double or butterfly or miniature; dahlias, one bloom, no foliage; dailies, one stalk no foliage; lilies, one stalk.

Annual displays will include asters, three blooms; bells of Ireland, one spike; bachelor buttons, three blooms; calendulas, three stems; cosmos, three stems; larkspur, one spike; nasturtiums, three blooms; marigolds, three tall stems; petunias, one stem; zinnias, one large bloom or three lilliput.

In the perennials section, carnations, three blooms; daisies, three stems; phlox, one stem; chrysanthemums, one spray; snapdragons, one spike; gaillardia, three blooms.

Other perennials or house plants may also be entered.

Titles for the artistic design in Division II include Mt. McKinley, all white design; Wai-kiki, a beach design; Mardi Gras, depicting the carnival spirit; The Great Plains, using grains and grasses; China Town, San Francisco, arrangement in Oriental manner with fresh-cut plant material; Virginia City, individual interpretation of a ghost or mining town; the Redwoods, arrangement of Sequoia or other needled evergreens, with fresh-cut plant material; the Rockies using rock or weathered wood and with dry or fresh material; Mohave, a desert scene; Williamsburg, a Colonial bouquet type arrangement; Greenwich Village, an abstract design with accompanying card of explanation.

Junior exhibitors in Division III will be judged in age groups. Their horticulture displays will be zinnias, one bloom; bachelor buttons, two blooms; petunias, one stem; marigolds, one stem; nasturtiums, three stems.

Artistic designs for juniors are the Navajo country, suggesting Indians; Cape Cod, a fishing scene; Disneyland, with card

grasses for winter bouquets.

The meeting was followed by a coffee hour with Mrs. C. C. Heidrich as hostess. Members were reminded that the next meeting will be Oct. 7.

General rules for flower shows will be observed. Exhibitors may enter as novice, amateur or advanced with but one entry in each class. Entries will be received from 8 o'clock until 10 a.m. on Wednesday, Aug. 23. Advance registration will be open at the city library auditorium from 3 o'clock to 5 p.m. on Tuesday, Aug. 27.

Containers for horticulture will be furnished, except for the bloom cycles.

Judging will begin at 10:30 a.m. on Wednesday morning.
