

Kansas Town Jittery Over Offer To Atheists

STOCKTON, Kan. (UPI) — The citizens of this dusty western Kansas town are having the jitters over a seven-letter word that many of them didn't even know the meaning of until they looked it up.

The word is "atheism."

"Six out of ten persons here couldn't have told you what atheism is," said Mayor L. B. Waller. Stockton's anxiety began last month when Carl R. Brown, 77-year-old former Rooks County legislator and retired farmer, offered 160 acres of his land to an atheist colony.

Brown became interested in the cause of Mrs. Madelyn Murray, the Baltimore, Md., housewife

who carried her protest against required Bible readings in public schools to the U.S. Supreme Court and won.

He offered two 80-acre tracts on the Solomon River to other Americans, Inc., an atheist organization founded by Mrs. Murray.

Mrs. Murray says she has \$100,000 in pledges toward building the atheist colony, including a university, information center, radio station, printing press and home for the aged.

Brown's action jolted the community. Church attendance, which ministers say usually dips 25 percent with the summer heat and vacations, shot up 25 percent. Petitions asking Brown to change

his mind about the land offer began to circulate.

The Rev. Clifford Haukwell of the Christian Church said "what we fear the most is the influence on our public schools."

The minister said if the atheists move into the community and send their children to public schools, the baccalaureate services, prayers that open PTA meetings and other religious observances in the schools would be endangered.

Many Stockton residents, including Mayor Waller, consider the atheist colony "a pipedream" and have taken a hopeful wait-and-see attitude.

"Many don't think it will come

to be," Waller said.

"Have you seen what they (the atheists) plan to do? It will take much more than the \$100,000 they have. Why a sewer system out there could cost that much."

"When Mrs. Murray comes out she may change her mind about the land. I've heard that she's painted a very rosy picture of the site back east. It's poor land — very sandy — with poor improvements and a poor house."

The core of this community's uneasiness was expressed by Waller.

"We might be getting people in here who aren't accepted in any other town," he said. He said most of the letters he has received

from other parts of the nation in support of the atheist center were poorly written and riddled with bad grammar.

"They all sounded like nuts," Waller said. "Just who is coming out?"

Fight Lost By Dictator

MIAMI, Fla. (UPI) — Former Venezuelan dictator Marcos Perez Jimenez, 49, lost an 11th hour legal battle against extradition Friday and was flown to his homeland to face charges he looted the national treasury of \$13.5 million.

Two last-minute appeals, to the Supreme Court in Washington and to state courts in Florida, failed to delay the hour that Perez had fought with all his millions for four years.

A white Avenza airliner took off from the Miami International Airport bound for Caracas where Perez must stand trial.

His attorneys argued that his return meant "certain death."

The final attempts to stay the extradition through state courts delayed the formal delivery of Perez to Venezuelan authorities for more than 45 minutes.

Shortly after 11 a.m. EDT, Supreme Court Justice Arthur Goldberg cut away four years of legal entanglements in Washington, D.C., by rejecting a final appeal for a stay of extradition from Perez's attorneys.

In Miami, U.S. officials moved swiftly to end 248 days — more than eight months — in a Florida jail for the moon-faced Latin American who rose quickly through army officer ranks to rule Venezuela with an iron hand for six years.

The luxury-loving Perez fled his homeland on Jan. 23, 1958, flying to the Dominican Republic where another dictator, the late Rafael Trujillo, gave him haven.

Perez came to Miami in April of 1963 on a temporary visa and later bought a \$400,000 walled-in mansion at Miami Beach where he posted around-the-clock guards for the safekeeping of himself, his wife and four daughters.

Rusk Suggests Russians Remove Cuban Military

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Secretary of State Dean Rusk said Friday Russia could make a "very helpful contribution" to overall improvement in U.S.-Soviet relations by completely withdrawing its military personnel from Cuba, but he declined to make this a condition for East-West talks to follow up the limited nuclear test ban treaty with other tension-easing agreements.

Rusk told a news conference he had discussed the matter of Russian troops in Cuba with Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko during recent Moscow test ban talks and expressed continuing U.S. concern.

The secretary said he did not interpret the U.S. offer in Geneva today to accept such control posts as meaning agreement is imminent but only that it is a subject which appears to be ready for further exploration.

Rusk, in his first news conference since the Moscow talks which brought agreement on the test ban, said he does not foresee new prospects of any "across-the-board" settlement of the broad range of U.S.-Soviet disputes.

But he said his talks with the Russians have led him to believe it is now "worthwhile" to explore with the Soviets some isolated subjects on which further agreements might be reached.

One of the most hopeful of these, he said, would appear to be stationing of observation teams at key rail and highway junctions, airports and seaports to check for and give warning of military movements which might be preliminary to the start of aggression.

Rusk conceded that such observers would not have much to

Aid Asked By Buddhists

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (UPI) — South Viet Nam's Buddhists appealed to President Kennedy and other Free World leaders today to intervene in the bloody dispute with the government of President Ngo Dinh Diem.

The appeal was contained in cables filed at the government post office in Saigon for transmission. It followed the fifth suicide by fire of a Buddhist priest or nun to protest alleged government discrimination.

The latest fiery victim was a 71-year-old Buddhist priest in the provincial city of Hue, 400 miles north of Saigon. He doused his yellow robes with gasoline and set fire to them with a match. Three other Buddhist priests and a nun have died similarly in recent weeks.

In addition to Kennedy, the appeal went to U. N. Secretary General Thant and to several Asian Buddhist associations.

Solons Okay Extension Of Mexican Labor Plan

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Senate has voted a one-year extension of the Mexican farm labor program, but only after approving an amendment saying U. S. farm workers doing similar work must be given the same benefits accorded the Mexican workers.

Under the amendment, U. S. domestic workers must be offered workmen's compensation, housing, and transportation that is comparable to that given to Mexican farm workers.

The Senate vote Thursday was 63-24. The bill now goes down a two-year extension of the farm labor program. Opponents of the measure contended that it aggravated the unemployment situation in this country.

Mexican farm workers are used across the United States, but they are concentrated on large farms in California, Arizona and Texas. The equal benefits amendment drew sharp criticism from Sen. J. W. Fulbright, D-Ark. He termed it a "meaningless gesture" to American workers, but one that had "effectively destroyed" the bracero program.

Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., said many of the lawmakers voting for the amendment, offered by Sen. Eugene McCarthy, D-Minn., did "not know what they're talking about."

West Berlin Police Stop Wall Crowd

BERLIN (UPI) — Club wailing West Berlin police Saturday night quickly dispersed a crowd of 80 demonstrators marching through the city toward a main square on the first anniversary of the death of Peter Fechter, who died on the Communist Wall and became a martyr of East German brutality.

One demonstrator was injured by a policeman's club, authorities said.

Twenty-five West Berlin policemen intercepted the procession on Bulow Strasse in the American sector as the crowd marched on the sidewalk.

Police, in line with the tightest new security measures, acted swiftly to prevent disorder on the anniversary of the death of the refugee when riots were feared.

The 80 demonstrators ran when police went into action and there was no fighting.

The incident took place three miles from the wall. At the wall itself the tightest security measures ever were enforced to maintain order.

Police had reports that West Berlin rowdies who rioted for four hours Tuesday night would try it again on the first anniversary of the slaying of Fechter, 18, who bled to death at the wall.

The crowd of 80 gathered before police barriers erected 100 yards from the U.S. Army's Checkpoint Charlie.

Held back by the barriers the demonstrators shouted "down with the wall" and "down with Ulbricht," in a reference to East German Communist leader Walter Ulbricht.
